CUBANS UPHELD.

Recognition of the Insurgents Is priation bill. Favored by Congress.

The Tariff Bill Defeated in the Senate-Important Measures Considered in the House-Daily Summary of Proceedings.

Washington, Feb. 26.-Senator Mor rill offered a resolution in the senate yesterday to take up the tariff bill, but it was defeated by a vote of 33 to 22.

After the announcement of the vote Senator Morrill stated that he would make no further attempt to get up the bill; that it was hopelessly defeated, and it was perfectly obvious that the republican party was in a minority in the senate. Senator Sherman said the gress that the government of the bill did not belong to any party. Its only merit was to furnish \$40,000,000 additional to the revenues of the government. It was a bill to provide for an occasion. He declared that it was a disgrace to the country and to civilization that the government of the United States was now spending \$30,-000,000 a year beyond its income. The Cuban question was taken up, and Senators Morgan, Lodge, Stewart and Call spoke in favor of recognizing Cuban belligerency.

Washington, Feb. 27 .- In the senate yesterday Senator Allen (Neb.) offered a substitute for the pending Cuban resolution. It authorizes and requests the president to issue a proclamation recognizing the independence of the republic of Cuba. Senator Carter (Mont.) in speaking on the tariff bill charged the republicans in the senate and house with deserting the republican national platform on both the tariff and money questions, and with taking their orders from the white ouse, where a democratic president is in command. He said he believed that the protection of American industries was necessary to American prosperity, but the free coinage of silver was equally essential and the two would hereafter go hand in hand.

Washington, Feb. 28.-The cause of Cuban independence had strong advocacy and support in the senate yesterday in a speech delivered by Senator Vest (dem., Mo.). He spoke of Spain as a toothless old wolf, sitting at the door of the cave of the despotism and grinning at the procession of free republics; denounced the declaration of Capt. Gen. Weyler, and asked whether the senate should sit silent and dumb while the Cubans were butchered into subjection to the Spanish queen. The Business Situation Shows No Material Improvement New York, Feb. 29 .- R. G. Dun & Co.

in their weekly review of trade, say: "In some quarters business gains at the west, rather than at the east, but there is no general change for the better, although hopefulness still predominates. Foreign affairs grow more pacific, public opinion turns more resolutely toward sound money but the want of sufficient demand for the products of great industries still retards actual improvement. Strikes of some importance in garment making and kindred lines affect trade in Chicago and Balti-more, but there are fewer labor difficulties than usual, as existing conditions warn

than usual, as existing conditions warn wage-earners that controversies at this time are unwise. Speculative markets show little life. The volume of business does not improve. Exchanges through the principal clearing houses show 19.7 per cent. gain over last year, but the month's comparison with 1893 is the only instructive one, and shows a decrease of 20.7 for rectruary. "Wheat has taken a flight upward, advancing 35, conts for case and 25, for May. vancing 3% cents for cash and 2% for May, with rumors of foreign supplies as the only basis. Estimates of wheat in farmers hands are lower than jast year, but still indicate, with visione stocks, a supply much beyond probable needs. Cotton has been weaker, with only fair receipts, the important decline in goods having much in fluence. The price of middling uplands de-clined a sixteenth, and preparation for a large increase of acreage is still reported

The market for textile goods is disappoint-ing. Woolen mills are receiving consider-able orders for goods, but business for the future does not mend. The feature in the iron market has been the large demand for wrought and cast pipe. Large orders for structural work are received at Chicago and expected at the east, as building plans are unusually large, but sheets sell slowly and rails very little.

Washington, March 3 .- The debt statement shows a net increase in the public debt, less cash in the treasury, ring February of \$15,978,76 interest-bearing debt increased \$75,-252,350. The non-interest-bearing debt decreased \$115,886.50, and cash in the treasury increased \$91,115,228.38. The total cash in the treasury was \$558,-811,830.91. The gold reserve was \$100,-000,000. Net cash balance, \$162,707,-006.65. In the month there was an increase of gold coin and bars of \$68,002, 641.89, the total at the close being \$167,-695,998.46. Of silver there was an increase of \$1,843,641.33. Of the surplus, there was in national bank depositories \$24,394,556.83, against \$14,803,803.55 at the end of the preceding month.

SPAIN IS SORRY.

And Hastens to Make an Apology

Complete Reparation Is Offered for the Insult at Barcelona-This Move Tends Greatly to Relieve

Washington, March 3.-A cablegram from our minister to Spain, Hon. Hannis Taylor, received early on Monday morning, informed Secretary Olney that the Spanish government had promptly disavowed any responsibility for the unfortunate riot at Barcelons on Sunday, during which a mob made a vicious assault on the Amer ican consulate. In addition to an expression of deep regret over the occurrence, the government offered to make complete reparation Secretary Olney laid the dispatch be fore President Cleveland early Monday morning and on his return to the department he gave it to the press. The dispatch follows:

Spain Apologizes.

"Minister of state has just called to express deep regret that mob has insulted Barcelons consulate—breaking windows—and offered complete reparation. He informed me that government on its ways metion had taken every presention. own motion had taken every precaution to guard legation and my residence. I have asked no protection."

Prior to the receipt of the dispatch, messages reporting the assault on the Barcelona consulate had been received from both Minister Taylor and Mr. Herbert Bowen, the consul at Barcelona. Senor Depuy de Lome, the Spanish minister, also was informed of the news and he waived ceremony and called on Secretary Olney at his residence Sunday to express, in advance of instructions, the regret of his government over the occurrence. These in dications of the desire of the Spanish government to make every amend for the insult on the consulate were carefully considered by the president and Secretary Olney at the conference Monday morning. They were convinced that no affront had been given for which the government was responsible and it is understood that Secretary Olney has sent a dispatch to Minister Taylor instructing him to make known to the Spanish authorities the appreciation of this government of their prompt disavowal of the insult.

The incident is believed in official circles to be practically ended with Spain's repudiation of any responsibility for the attack of the mob and her evident desire to do all that is possible to make amends satisfactory to the United States.

Spain's Only Course.

The news of the Spanish disavowal was read with interest by the senators and representatives. Senator Gray (dem., Del.), of the foreign relations committee, said that course was the only one for Spain to pursue. He added it was not the place of the United States, a big, strong nation, to become excited over the ebullitions of the people of Spain, but calmly and dispassi-nately to do our duty without regard to anything that might be done by the prople of certain communities in Spain.

It is the cutting of a canal 400 feet wide from thorized a favorable report on the De-Lake Superior to the St. Mary's river below the 20-foot fall of the rapids, and getting an unlimited water power, with Lake Superior as a millpond. The company that is to carry out the plan has already a canal completed and supply ing lower from the lake on the Canadian side of the river, but proposes to make the canal here the largest water power generator in the United States, with one exception, and at a cost vastly less than that one.

Already two large mills for the manufacture of paper are in operation at the Canadian Sault, and the largest mill in the world is to be built on this side to use a part of the power to be supplied. A warehouse to hold 10,000 tons of pulp is now being put up at the present

The Michigan Carbide company, organized by Chicago men, has been incorporated with \$1,000,000 capital, and will put in works for the manufacture of acetyline, while the power company has had applications for power for the same purpose from newly organized acetyline companies in Illinois, Minnesota and Missouri.

The Pusey-Jones company, of Wilmington, has made a contract to build on the Canadian side of the river one of the largest shops for the manufacture of paper mill machinery in the country. The company now here, and which controls the water power canals, is understood not to be in the paper trade trust. As yet, however, it makes only pulp and not finished paper.
