
'Spill-way' Whirlpool Claims Two Lives

Two young men, Ted Alan Jones, 21, and Frederick C. Nordstrom, 22, both of Grand Rapids, lost their lives last Friday afternoon when they were caught in a whirlpool while swimming near the dam north of Low-

The treacherous whirlpool made diving operations impossible until Sunday. Lowering of the water level had been started on Saturday and the bodies were recovered Sunday afternoon.

Kent County Sheriff's Department divers reportedly retrieved the bodies from the same spot where they went down after Jones apparently was caught by the tremendous suction of the whirlpool and Nordstrom had attempted to save him. It is believed they were caught in a cavern or hole under the dam and were unable to escape.

The old Consumers Power dam, now belonging to Kent County, was reportedly checked on the Wednesday prior to the drownings and nothing unusual was found. However, area residents have reported that the level of the Flat River above the dam had fallen sharply in the last few days. Kent County Drain Commissioner, Frank Bouma, stated that "No Swimming" signs have often been placed in the area of the dam but were always town down.

The fate of the dam is, as yet, undetermined.

Immunization Clinic Set

There will be a Kent County Health Department Immunization Clinic at the Nazarene Fellowship Hall on Avery Street, located at the back of the Nazarene Church. The clinic will be held once a month at this temporary location, and will be transferred to the Lowell Community Center as soon as that building is completed.

The Health Department recommended that immunization for measles, rubella, and smallpox be given at any age over one year. Diptheria, whooping cough and polio immunization may begin after three months of age. Tuberculin skin testing normally is not given under the age of ten months. Parents are urged to keep the immunization levels of their children up to date, either through their family physician or the Health Department clinics.

The first clinic will be held June 12, at 9 a.m. Immunizations will be given for Diptheria, Whooping Cough, Tetanus, Measles, German Measles, Polio, Small-

Tuberculin skin tests will also be given. A Health Department Nurse will be in charge of the clinic.

Third Runway To Be Built

Bids will be opened June 15 for construction of a new runway at the Kent County Airport the Michigan Commerce Department's Aeronautics Commission announced today.

The 3,900-foot east-west runway will be built north of the airport's terminal building and will serve small aircraft. It will be the airport's third runway.



AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "ZONING ORDINANCE OF ADA TOWN-SHIP' NO. 1010661 ADOPTED OCTOBER 10, 1966,

AS AMENDED. THE TOWNSHIP OF ADA ORDAINS:

Section 1. Chapter XIV of the Ada Township Zon-ing Ordinance is hereby amended by the addition of a new Section 14.04 at the end thereof to rezone certain lands to P-1 Planned Development Zone and provide the following restrictions on its use, such Section to read as follows:

Section 14.04. DESCRIPTION AND PURPOSE. The zoning classification of the following property consisting of 57.2 acres is hereby changed from its former classification to "P-1" Planned Development Zone, and the Township of Ada Zoning Map is amended accord-

That part of the Southwest ¼ of Section 28, Town 7 North, Range 10 West, Ada Township, Kent County, Michigan, described as: Commenc-ing at the Southeast corner thereof; thence North 0 degrees 00' East 1160 feet, more or less, along the East line thereof to the Souther ly line of the Grand Trunk Western Railroad right-of-way; thence Westerly 2210 feet, more or less, along said railroad right-of-way line; thence South 0 degrees 00' West 220 feet; thence South 42 degrees 00' East 200 feet; thence South 24 degrees 00' East 200 feet; thence South 6 degrees 00' East 180 feet; thence South 2 degrees 00' East 335 feet; thence North 88 degrees 00' East 140 feet; thence North 45 degrees 00' East 230 feet; thence North 45 degrees 00: East 230 feet; thence North 72 degrees 00' East 70 feet; thence Southwesterly 261.54 feet along a 333.0 foot radius curve to the left, the long chord of which bears South 40 degrees 30' East 254.87 feet; thence South 63 degrees 00' East 50 feet; thence South 32 degrees 00' West 410 feet more or less, to the South line

of said Section 28; thence Easterly 1580 feet, more or less, along said South line to the place (a). USE REGULATION. The premises described in Section 14.04 may be used for residential develum ownership or in accordance with an approved pla in accordance with the development plan and schema-tic plan dated March, 1971 and approved by the Town ship Planning Commission which plans are hereby incorporated herein by reference. A copy of the Master Deed required by the Horizontal Real Property Act or a copy of the approved plat chall be filed with the

(b). HEIGHT REGULATIONS. The height of any building shall not exceed thirty-five (35) feet or two and one-half (2½) stories, whichever is lesser.

(c) AREA REGULATIONS. No building or structure, nor the enlargement of any building or struc-ture shall be hereafter erected unless the yards, lot area and building coverage requirements and dimensions provided and maintained in connection with such build ing or structure are in compliance with the require-ments and dimensions set forth in Section 14.03 or in the development and schematic plans referred to in subsection (a) above, whichever is more strict, and, in addition, the following specific requirements shall be

(i) PARKING. A minimum of two and one-half (2½) parking spaces shall be provided for each dwellng unit, and a total of twenty percent (20%) of the entire premises shall be devoted to parking space.

(ii) SEWAGE. All units shall be connected to the Ada Township sewage disposal system pursuant to the terms and conditions of the ordinance governing said

(iii) STREETS. All streets shall be constructed as shown on the development and schematic plans referred to above, and surfaced with bituminous asphalt or concrete in accordance with the requirements of the Kent County Road Commission, and as soon as 50 dwelling units have been constructed on the premises a street shall be constructed providing ingress and egress directly to the premises from State Highway M-21 over and across the Grand Trunk Western Railroad tracks. The crossing across said railroad tracks shall be constructed and maintained in accordance with the rules of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

(iv) GREEN AREAS AND LAKE. There shall be developed and maintained upon the premises a lake approximately 1.15 acres in size and green areas as shown on the development and schematic plans reas shown on the development and schematic plans re-ferred to above. A plan for the management, mainten-ance and operation of the lake and green areas shall be filed with the Township prior to construction. Filing of the Master Deed required by the Horizontal Real Property Act or a copy of the approved plat which contains provisions consistent with the requirements of this Ordinance shall satisfy this requirem

(v) DWELLING UNITS. A total of not mon than 457 dwelling units shall be constructed on the premises and shall be located and constructed in accordance with the development and schematic plans referred to above.

(vi) UTILITIES. Underground utilities shall be provided for all utility services necessary for the buildings to be constructed on the premises. Section 2. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance
