Gets More Money Meeting Is Set

The City of Lowell has received word from Representative Gerald R. Ford that the Department of Housing and Urban Development has granted an additional \$117,345 to the previously announced \$411,054 bringing to \$528,399 the amount available from federal funds for Lowell's \$1,900,000 program of separation of storm water from the sanitary sewer system.

The City Council will meet Monday, July 31, at 7:30 p.m. to act on the grant and the program.

The proposed program to separate storm water from sanitary sewers will include construction of new storm sewers, some new sanitary sewers, some water mains, curbs and gutters, and surface restoration and improvements.

At the regular meeting of the City Planning Commission Monday night, July 24, the members unanimously voted to recommend to the Lowell City Council that they proceed with the storm water-sewer separation program.

The order, placed last fall, has been a long time in the making, but students who have placed down payments on the books, may pick them up at the high school today (Wednesday, July 26) between the hours of 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Cherry Creek Eyes Opening

Cherry Creek Nursing Home, located at the end of North Center Street in Lowell, is well along in its construction and an October opening is planned, according to Gow Ramjeet, administrator. Licensed by the State of Michigan Department of Public Health, the home will fulfill a long felt need in this community.

Designed of red brick with a charcoal gray mansard roof, the 122 bed facility will provide both basic and skilled nursing care. Of steel and concrete construction, the building will be 95 percent fireproof. All wood trim and shingles will be treated, making them fire resistant. A fire sprinkling system is being installed under State guide lines.

Built in a square with a half acre court yard in the center, the windows of each of the sixty-one rooms will look out upon the beautifully landscaped court-yard or onto the landscaped grounds surrounding the building. Each two bedrooms has a full bath between the two rooms. All doorways are wide to allow the passage of wheelchairs. Rooms will also be equipped to permit the plug-in of television sets and telephones, if the occupant desires.

Two large day rooms will have color TV and various games for entertainment. A physical therapy room, including a whirlpool bath, and occupational therapy room, which will have a registered occupational therapist on a part time basis, are just two of the many features of the facility to provide the best care possible for the patients. The services of a licensed barber and beautician will also be available. Ramjeet revealed that Lowell's own Bernie Bedell will be manning the barber chair. A large kitchen and spacious dining room will be serving attractive and nutritious meals planned by a registered dietitian.

Besides the reception area and general offices, there is a waiting room with rest rooms for the comfort of visitors and guests.

A small chapel-like room where patients may go for a quiet period of reading, meditation, or a visit with their minister is another thoughtful addition to the home.

Forty full-time and thirty part-time employees will be needed to perform the many duties required. In addition to licensed practical nurses, there will be three full time registered nurses, enabling a registered nurse to be on duty at all times.

A non-ambulatory patient requiring the therapy of a hot bath will not have to be lifted into the bath, a procedure that can be difficult for both patient and nurse. Here, a patient can be wheeled to one of the four special bathrooms, gently eased onto a chair lift and by pressing a button, the chair moves over the bath tub and the patient lowered into it.

Other well designed areas are the two nurses stations.

Each station affords a clear view of two hallways which means that all four hallways can be observed at all times. A calling system, including flashing lights above the patient's door will signal the nurses station that a patient needs help.

Medical, dental, and optical services will be provided by Orval McKay, M.D., Donald Gerard, M.D., Harold Myers, D.O., H. R. Mueller, O.D., and R.E. Reagan, D.D.S.

Accepting Reservations

Reservations are now being taken and Ramjeet urged that anyone wishing further information should call 897-7388. He also stressed that they wish to give priority to persons in the Lowell area. In every aspect of this development, he said, "our main concern is in seeing that the patient receives the finest nursing home care." Both private-paying and medicaid patients will be accepted.

Guild Forms

Commenting on the community's need for a nursing home, Ramjeet said that "the nursing home also needs the community." Although the home will render the major care and comfort of the patient, it is often the little things that can be done by family and friends, augmented by volunteers, that go to make up the difference between the routine of day to day living and one leavened with the happier moments that can be given by the thoughtful acts of those who care.

Acknowledging this fact, a group of women have already formed a guild which will be the nucleus in the recruitment of volunteers. The seed of the idea was planted within the Lowell Woman's Club but has grown and now includes representatives from churches as well as the community at large, It is hoped that high school students may also want to participate in the project.

Lansing Ruling Allows Local Bodies To Act

Local governing bodies may approve the sale of spirits for consumption on the premises, in addition to beer and wine, by resolution if they act before August 30, 1972, under a ruling by the Attorney General.

As a result of this ruling, many cities, townships and villages, now circulating petitions to place the issue of liquor by the glass on the November ballot, may win approval of the local legislative body without a vote of the people.

The attorney general's opinion pertains to a new law, Public Act No. 115 to 1972, which allows a vote on the liquor issue every two years instead of four as in the part

The amended law makes possible the approval of local governing bodies within 60 days after the effective date of law, which was July 1, 1972.

In many instances, licensees in a village or township, are completely surrounded by areas where on-premise liquor sales are legal, and indications are that a number of local boards and councils will act favorably just as county boards of commissioners have in approving Sunday liquor sales in 10 additional counties since the first of the year.

The Michigan Licensed Beverage Association has warned licensees not to discontinue their petition drives to place the issue before the voters, as the filing deadline is September 5, and they cannot be certain of a favorable vote by the local governing body.

Begin Construction On Boat Ramp

The Waterways Division of the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has begun construction of a new boat ramp and public access on the Grand River near Ada. This new ramp is expected to give area fishermen and boaters greater accessability to the Grand and Thornapple Rivers. Plans call for two concrete ramps


and parking for approximately 50 cars and trailers.

When the ramp was first proposed the Ada Township Board expressed concern over the location of the toilet facilities, but the vault-type units will be on high ground away from the water. The township board was also concerned about the traffic into and out of the boat ramp area. The board feels that there should be better means of ingress and egress, with lanes designed for turning. Although considering the request, the DNR has not made any plans regarding the problem.

It was pointed out to the DNR that old pilings still remain in the Grand River from an old bridge near the site of the construction. Officials from the DNR do not expect these pilings to present a problem but are at-tempting to make arrangements to have them removed.

Samplings of fish in the Grand and Thornapple Rivers were taken near Ada a few years ago. Results from the tests indicate an abundance of bass, northern pike, catfish, panfish, and some walleye. The new boat ramp will give anglers an opportunity to fish the rivers easily and close to home.


