Original date had been November first, but Manager Bacon stated that notices to property owners would not be in the mail for another week and would give very little time to meet the November deadline.

Trooper Shot;

Funeral services for Michigan State Police Troope Steven B. DeVries, 32, of the Niles post, were held Saturday morning, October 14, at the Fulkerson Park Baptist Church in Niles.

Burial was made in Chapel Hills Memorial Gardens in Grand Rapids.

Full department military honors were given at the service. In addition, Navy honor rites were held at the burial for the slain officer who was a veteran of the naval service and a member of the Naval Reserve.

Pallbearers were his brother, Tpr. David DeVries, of Ionia, Troopers Hugh Thomas and William Smith, of the Niles post, Tpr. Gene Roberts, of Grand Haven, Tpr. David Balash, of Plymouth, and a Florida policeman friend Lanny Tolley

DeVries was fatally shot Thursday, October 12, south of Niles where he had made a patrol stop of a suspect linked to an armed robbery of a Niles bank en \$38,700 was taken only minutes earlier that day.

Arrested Friday, was the suspect in the shooting, Kenneth E. Oliver, 33, of Detroit. He has been lodged in the Berrien County jail under Federal and State charg-

The car Oliver was driving at the time of the shooting was found abandoned later Thursday morning south of Niles about a mile north of the Indiana border.

DeVries was the twenty-eighth State Police officer to die in the line of duty in the 55-year history of the department and the fourteenth officer to die by hostile gunfire. The last two officers to die in line of duty were Troopers Charles Stark and Gary Rampy of the New Buffalo post who were fatally shot during a patrol stop last December 31 near New Buffalo. The gunman in that case was fatally wounded when he tried to escape pursuing troopers.

DeVries was born at Grand Rapids, graduated from Lowell High School in 1959, and served in the Navy beginning that year for 46 months, 36 of them overseas.

He joined the State Police in February, 1965, and after two years at the Jackson post, was transferred to Niles in May, 1967.

Survivors include his wife, Ardena, two sons, Steven, 5, and Lance, who will be one year old this month; his brother, David; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow DeVries of Rockford, formerly of Lowell.



The sun peeped now and then from behind dark clouds dusting the leaves of trees resplendently dressed in yellow, gold, bronze and red accented by the dark green of pines. Leaves were beginning to carpet the forest floor and there was the rich, sweet smell of the

We did finally locate the campsite and also an old abandoned saw-mill whose crumbling foundations of the several buildings were all that remained to give evidence of what once had been a scene of great activity.

But now, all was quiet-and there in the woods on that October day, the rest of the world and all of its oblems seemed very remote. Until the eye spies a beer can . . . civilization came crashing in—the illusion was shattered—and our covered wagon disappeared



\$50 Wheels, And Troubles

When I returned to Baldwin from Chicago in '66 I told my friends in Chi-town that I was going to buy a \$50 wonder; you wonder if it will run.

Michiganites are noted for buying broken down, smoke belching, oil burning, gas eating, rusted out, wired together \$50 Wonders. Many of these cars have holes in the floors, rocking seats, mufflers wired to the ex-haust, and doors that either don't stay shut or it takes a Hercules to open them. Their owners baby them, cuss 'em out, and tenderly run them into the ground. When these relics are on their last legs their owners drive or tow them to the nearest junk yard and go out to buy

I purchased my \$50 Wonder from Jake, a Shade Tree Mechanic in Idlewild, for \$15. It was a '57 Mer cury with a frozen engine and four flat tires. It took me six hours using a tripod jack that wouldn't lock and a ratchet jack that didn't lock to put on the four tires. The next day someone stole the radiator, the next

Jake then picked up a '56 Merc for five green ones and put the engine into a sixty Ford, but it wouldn't run. We used an eight foot tripod made out of logs with a chain fall to pull the '56 Merc engine out of the Ford and place it into my '57. I exchanged my two barrel carburetor with the one in the '56 engine and it never failed to start after that, even when it was 30 below.

It was ready to roll, the Merc was, although it had its little problems. The radiator leaked, as did the engine and transmission! The speedometer band went wild and started to scream, before it disappeared.

Have you ever driven 55 miles, eight below zero without a heater? I did for several months until a friend of Publication and service shall be gine and transmission! The speedometer band went

I was stopped in Ludington one time by an officer of the law. I could have received a fistful of tickets. All he saw was a blue cloud of smoke going down the street. One taillight out, bad brakes, no turn signal and one headlight. "It's all right officer." I said, "I've got the headlight on the back seat." "That's a good place for it," he said and let me off with a warning.

I owned the Merc from July '66 to March '67. It would never pass a safety inspection. But it was all mine, all paid for and to me good transportation. That is why on that eventual Sunday in March of '67 I left Baldwin for Houghton, Michigan, a good 500 miles away. It was a hairy trip for every few miles I'd stop and check the radiator for water, the engine for oil, and the ransmission for fluid. I was five miles from Munising and saw a service station. Stop for gas and check the oil? No, I'm only five miles from Munising. Five miles or a lifetime?

Another mile went by when the engine started to knock like someone was hitting it with a sledge hammer pulled over, a mistake I'll forget. The engine stopped running and try as I might it wouldn't start again. I got out of the car and raised the hood. Checked the oil dip stick and there was a drop on its tip. I checked the other side, nothing! I went around to the other side and saw a blue cloud of smoke belch out of the oil breather. I knew somehow, being 150 miles from Houghton, that, that was the end of that. I had the Merc towed into Munising, hitchhiked to Marquette, and caught a bus from there to Houghton. Arrived there at five a.m. Mon-

The following week I bought another \$50 Dollar Wonder, a '60 Mercury.

per quarter. Other users with a private water supply shall be billed on the basis of individual determinations to be made by the City Manager subject to approval by the City Council. (C) Domestic users shall be billed the minimum charge of four dollars and eighty cents (\$4.80) for the quarter ended September thirteenth of each year to al-

low for sprinkling water to be returned to the ground. (D) Other than domestic users may be billed on an adjusted basis to be determined by the City Manager subject to standards of such rules and regulations as may be established under the provisions of this article and approved by the City Council to allow for water consumption not returned to the sewerage system. (E) Effective November 1, 1972, there shall be a
