Council Meets

Due Date Extended

At Monday night's Lowell City Council meeting, members concurred with City Manager Blaine Bacon's recommendation for a resolution to move the due date for imposed charges for the Storm Water-Sewer Separation project ahead one month.

Affected property owners will now have until December first to pay their assessments if they wish to avoid interest charge. Original date had been November first, but Manager Bacon stated that notices to property owners would not be in the mail for another week and would give very little time to meet the November deadline.

Trooper Shot; Was Lowell Man

Funeral services for Michigan State Police Trooper Steven B. DeVries, 32, of the Niles post, were held Saturday morning, October 14, at the Fulkerson Park Baptist Church in Niles.

Burial was made in Chapel Hills Memorial Gardens in Grand Rapids.

Full department military honors were given at the service. In addition, Navy honor rites were held at the burial for the slain officer who was a veteran of the naval service and a member of the Naval Reserve.

Pallbearers were his brother, Tpr. David DeVries, of Ionia, Troopers Hugh Thomas and William Smith, of the Niles post, Tpr. Gene Roberts, of Grand Haven, Tpr. David Balash, of Plymouth, and a Florida policeman friend Lanny Tolley.

DeVries was fatally shot Thursday, October 12, south of Niles where he had made a patrol stop of a suspect linked to an armed robbery of a Niles bank when \$38,700 was taken only minutes earlier that day.

Arrested Friday, was the suspect in the shooting, Kenneth E. Oliver, 33, of Detroit. He has been lodged in the Berrien County jail under Federal and State charges.

The car Oliver was driving at the time of the shooting was found abandoned later Thursday morning south of Niles about a mile north of the Indiana border.

DeVries was the twenty-eighth State Police officer to die in the line of duty in the 55-year history of the department and the fourteenth officer to die by hostile gunfire. The last two officers to die in line of duty were Troopers Charles Stark and Gary Rumpy of the New Buffalo post who were fatally shot during a patrol stop last December 31 near New Buffalo. The gunman in that case was fatally wounded when he tried to escape pursuing troopers.

DeVries was born at Grand Rapids, graduated from Lowell High School in 1959, and served in the Navy beginning that year for 46 months, 36 of them overseas.

He joined the State Police in February, 1965, and after two years at the Jackson post, was transferred to Niles in May, 1967.

Survivors include his wife, Ardena, two sons, Steven, 5, and Lance, who will be one year old this month; his brother, David; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow DeVries of Rockford, formerly of Lowell.

Auto Accidents Are Investigated

Three separate automobile accidents were investigated last week by the Lowell Police Department; one a personal injury mishap and the other two involving property damage.

A property damage accident, October 13, at the intersection of Riverside Drive and Elm Street occurred when a car driven by Keith Wynne Johnson of Lowell backed into a car owned by John W. Blanding, also of Lowell.

No citations were issued by the investigating officers, but Johnson was indicated for improper backing.

Another property damage accident, the same day, happened when the vehicles owned by Donald Jack Minzey of Grand Blanc and Ronald LeMoyné Chesebro of Lowell collided at the intersection of Main and Monroe Streets. No citations were issued.

A personal injury accident was investigated Saturday at the corner of West Main and Church Streets. A car driven by William Joseph Bollock of Grand Rapids was waiting at the intersection to make a left turn into Church Street, when it was hit in the rear by a car driven by Ida Belle House of Sparta.

Mrs. House's car was then hit in the rear by a car driven by Jerry Roger Bouwman of Grand Rapids. No one was seriously hurt.

Bouwman was issued a citation for failure to stop in the assured clean distance ahead.

Veteran's Day, Monday, October 23, finds the Lowell merchants paying tribute to the servicemen of the area. See the special servicemen's edition in this issue.

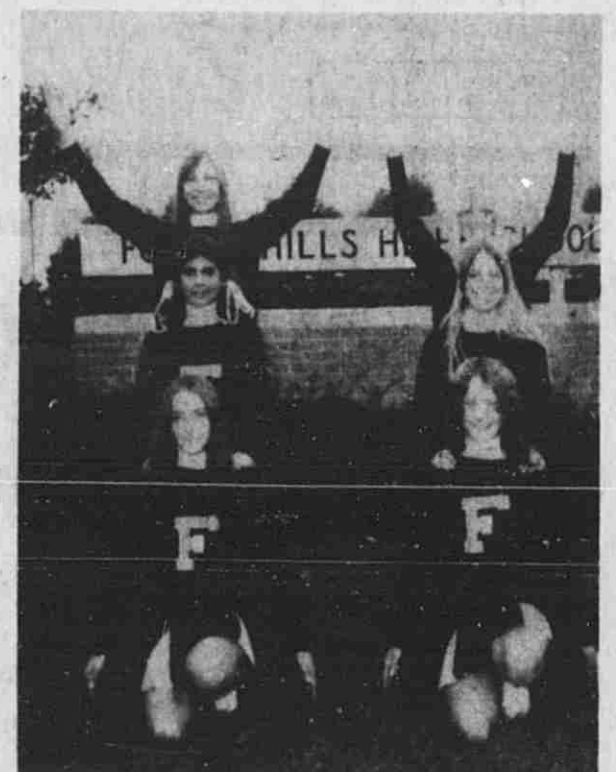

A Ride To Reality

The sun peeped now and then from behind dark clouds during the leaves of trees resplendently dressed in yellow, gold, bronze and red accented by the dark green of pines. Leaves were beginning to carpet the forest floor and there was the rich, sweet smell of the fermenting humus.

I was enjoying all of this as I sat resting on a log, marveling at the work of some eager beavers who had built a dam across a stream.

I had arrived at this particular spot after driving a distance of some ten miles—though it seemed more like 30—back into the woods in the Huron Mountain area of the Upper Peninsula. Four of us in a pickup truck equipped with four-wheel drive had bounced over our way over roads (I questioned that repeatedly!) which would never be mapped on an AAA itinerary. At every turn, one or the other of the feminine half of the foursome would ask some femininely logical question such as, "Oh, you're not going to try that one, are you?"—but of course, we did. At one point we had to stop while "Lewis and Clark" sawed a tree in two which had fallen across the road.

After jouncing along a little further, we came to a stream over which were two narrow planks—a bridge—they called it. As the truck edged across, I shut my eyes and thought of the "Big Mac." Exhilarated by success, we pushed on—modern pioneers in a covered wagon with a 350 engine.

The purpose of this little journey was to find the site of an old hunting camp where our friend and driver had hunted many years ago. We did finally locate the campsite and also an old abandoned saw-mill whose crumbling foundations of the several buildings were all that remained to give evidence of what once had been a scene of great activity.

But now, all was quiet—and there in the woods on that October day, the rest of the world and all of its problems seemed very remote. Until the eye spies a beer can... civilization came crashing in—the illusion was shattered—and our covered wagon disappeared like Cinderella's coach.

We climbed into the pick-up and I braced myself for the ride home—and to reality.

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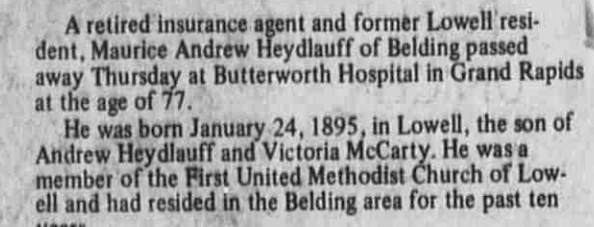

Maurici's Moments

\$50 Wheels, And Troubles

When I returned to Baldwin from Chicago in '66 I told my friends in Chi-town that I was going to buy a \$50 wonder; you wonder if it will run.

Michiganites are noted for buying broken down, smoke belching, oil burning, gas eating, rusted out, wire-together \$50 Wonders. Many of these cars have holes in the floors, rocking seats, mufflers wired to the exhaust, and doors that either don't stay shut or it takes a Hercules to open them. Their owners baby them, cuss 'em out, and tenderly run them into the ground. When these relics are on their last legs their owners drive or tow them to the nearest junk yard and go out to buy another.

I purchased my \$50 Wonder from Jake, a Shade Tree Mechanic in Idlewild, for \$15. It was a '57 Mercury with a frozen engine and four flat tires. It took me six hours using a tripod jack that wouldn't lock and a ratchet jack that didn't lock to put on the four tires. The next day someone stole the radiator, the next night the muffler disappeared.

Jake then picked up a '56 Merc for five green ones and put the engine into a sixty Ford, but it wouldn't run. We used an eight foot tripod made out of logs with a chain fall to pull the '56 Merc engine out of the Ford and place it into my '57. I exchanged my two barrel carburetor with the one in the '56 engine and it never failed to start after that, even when it was 30 below.

It was ready to roll, the Merc was, although it had its little problems. The radiator leaked, as did the engine and transmission. The speedometer band went wild and started to scream, being I'd disappeared.

Have you ever driven 55 miles, eight below zero with out a heater? I did for several months until a friend of mine made me get it fixed.

I was stopped in Ludington one time by an officer of the law. I could have received a fistful of tickets. All he saw was a blue cloud of smoke going down the street. One taillight out, bad brakes, no turn signal and one headlight. "It's all right officer," I said, "I've got the headlight on the back seat." "That's a good place for it," he said and let me off with a warning.

I owned the Merc from July '66 to March '67. It would never pass a safety inspection. But it was all mine, all paid for and to me good transportation. That is why on that eventual Sunday in March of '67 I left Baldwin for Houghton, Michigan, a good 500 miles away. It was a hairy trip for every few miles I'd stop and check the radiator for water, the engine for oil, and the transmission for fluid. I was five miles from Munising and saw a service station. Stop for gas and check the oil? No, I'm only five miles from Munising. Five miles or a lifetime?

Another mile went by when the engine started to knock like someone was hitting it with a sledge hammer. I pulled over, a mistake I'll forget. The engine stopped running and try as I might it wouldn't start again. I got out of the car and raised the hood. Checked the oil dip stick and there was a drop on its tip. I checked the other side, nothing. I went around to the other side and saw a blue cloud of smoke belch out of the oil breather. I knew something, being 150 miles from Houghton, that that was the end of that. I had the Merc towed into Munising, hitchhiked to Marquette, and caught a bus from there to Houghton. Arrived there at five a.m. Monday morning.

The following week I bought another \$50 Dollar Wonder, a '60 Mercury.

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Central's Homecoming, 1972, '2001-A Space Odyssey'

"Class of '73 Presents: 1972 Homecoming Court." So said the leaflet that was passed out during last Friday's Homecoming Game between the Kenowa Hills Knights and the FH Central Rangers. And, in the spirit of Kubrick's film, Central's Homecoming festivities this year were indeed a visual experience. For a week the Central Campus had become a fantasy land, a place where kings rule, girls wear long dresses, martians walk the halls, and huge men sit at the controls of a futuristic computer. And even a disheartening loss of 7-6 against Kenowa on Friday night's culmination of events failed to stifle the excitement.

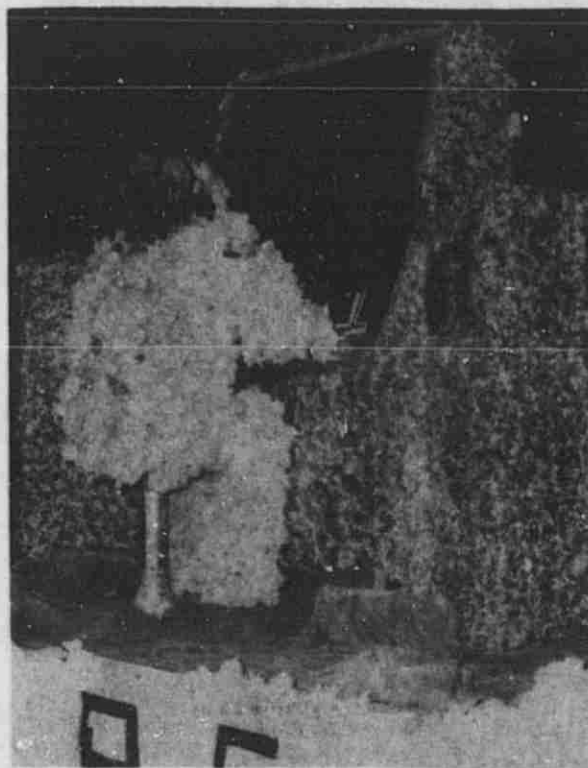

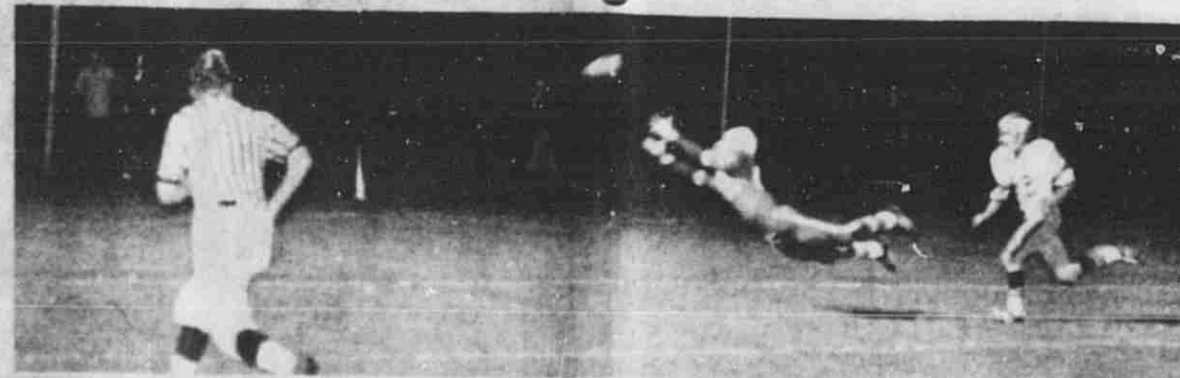

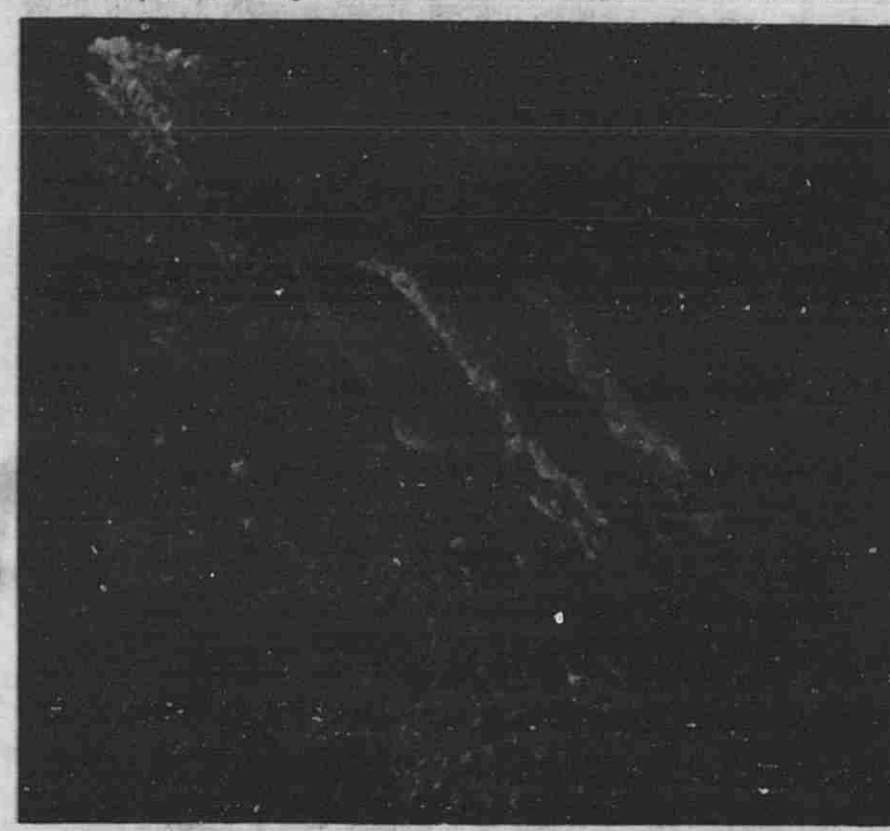

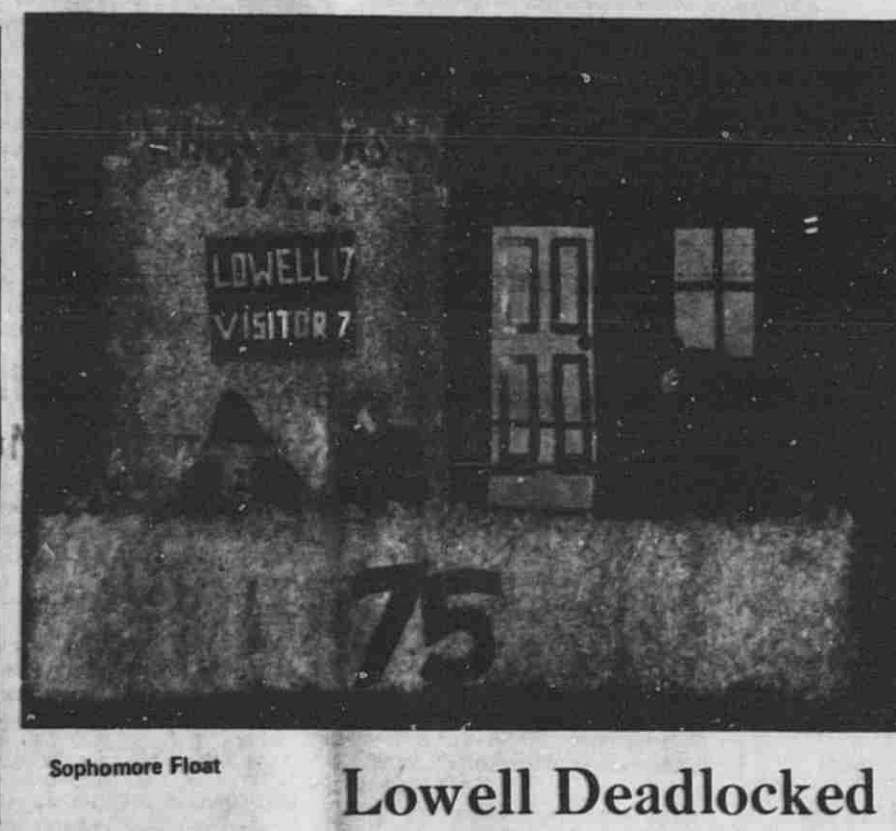
John Piper (35) converges on a Sparta receiver as Rusty Steffens (87) makes contact.

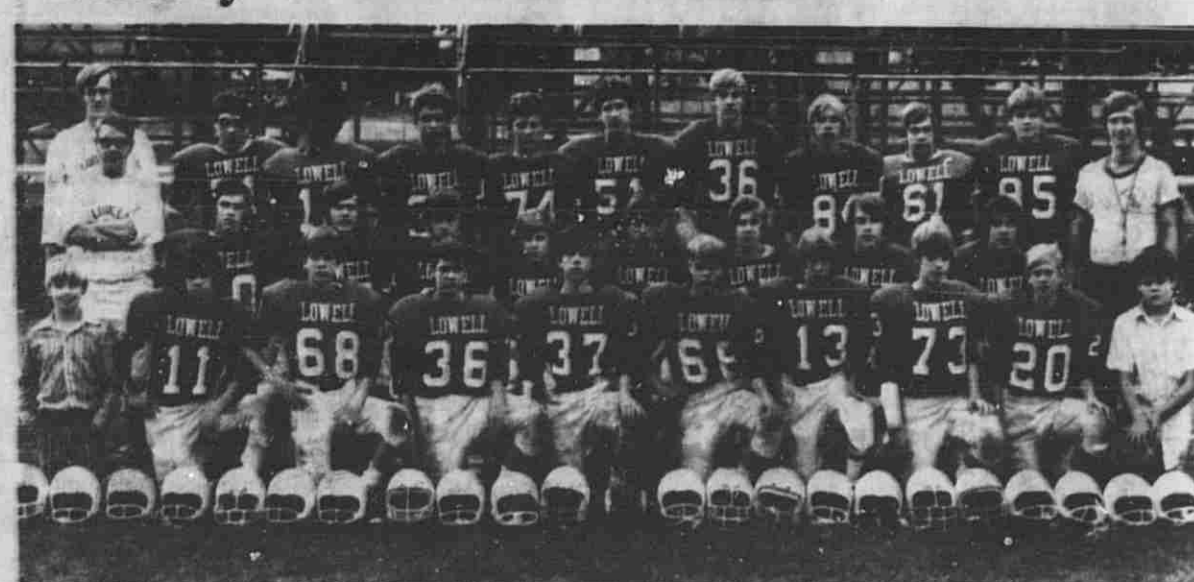

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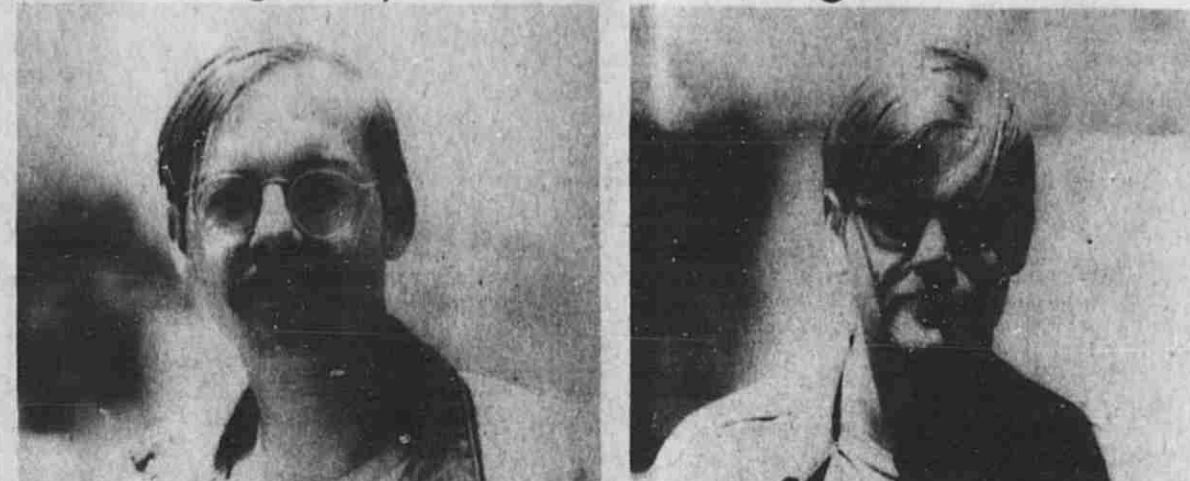
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Klug Boys in Korea Together
