

Norm Discusses Antiques On Paris Television

Norm Borgerson, well-known Lowell antique dealer, appeared on Paris Television Saturday, March 24, while attending the famous Paris Antique Fair.

During the TV interview, the news caster commented that this man, from the small American City of Lowell, is one of the oldest and most successful antique dealers in the U.S.A. and one of the few American antique dealers who still makes regular buying trips to Europe.

Norm attributes the success of the business to the genius of his wife, Leona, who passed away in January. She started the business in their home 35 years ago.

Norm observed that Europe, with its longer history, has more antiques than America, however, American antiques are just as good in quality as European antiques and in just as much demand. He stated that former Americans were the big buyers of antiques, however, within recent years the picture has changed, with the Europeans now becoming more interested. In fact, Norm stated "prices on some antiques are higher in European shops than in American shops."

Commenting on the European economy, Norm stated that employment is very good. However, inflation is more severe than in America and wages are lower. Many European workers are on a six day working week. He observed that most European food prices are much higher, with the exception of bread and wine.

Meat, eggs, and chicken prices are higher, with cheese costing about the same, and fish prices somewhat lower than in America.

Mr. Borgerson's purpose in going to France was to attend the Spring Antique Fair in Paris. He spent most of his fifteen days there shopping for antiques, and purchased two truck loads.

There are no experience or training requirements in the Rural Carrier examination. Applicants must be physically qualified to perform efficiently the arduous duties of the position.

Substitute rural carriers are used primarily to replace regular rural carriers on sick leave or vacation. Some routes may involve Saturday work, depending upon the number of hours required weekly to serve the different routes.

Substitute rural carriers must furnish and maintain at their own expense vehicle equipment necessary for the prompt handling of the mail, but they are given an equipment maintenance allowance. They must have a valid state driver's license and a safe driving record. Applicants must have reached their 18th birthday on the date of filing applications.

Leaves must be bagged, newspapers and magazines must be bagged or tied, brush must be bundled and tied for one man to handle and not longer than six feet.
