Sewers Plague Council

A lengthy agenda filled three hours at the regular Lowell City Council meeting on Monday night, April 2. Formal action on a recommendation by the Lowell City Planning Commission to the City of Lowell to vacate the platted but undeveloped portion of North Street east of Jackson Street to Division Street and also that part of Grindle Drive, abandoned following relocation, was tabled to allow for notification of adjoining property owners and for publication of such action.

Council denied a request by John Ramjeet, administrator of Cherry Creek Nursing Home, for permission to erect a permanent type fence along the north line of the facility, from Center Street to Gee Drive.

Since some City property would be involved, the erection of a permanent type fence was believed not to be in the best interests of the City.

Two requests for sewer extensions were considered and a public hearing was set for the first Council meeting in May to determine the necessity for an additional 300 feet of sewer on James Street. The other request would involve running sewer east on M-21 "about across from the A & W," manager Blaine Bacon stated. No action was taken at this time on the latter request.

The adoption of an amendment to the resolution passed at the last council meeting reflected a lower share of City support to the Kent County Library Sys-tem. The revised figure is now \$4,268.73 and is the result of a letter protesting Lowell's higher assessment, Bacon explained, and meant a saving of about one thousand dollars.

After some discussion among council and representatives of the Lowell Board of Education, present at Monday night's meeting, the council voted to allow the school to connect to the existing eight inch sanitary sewer now servicing Root-Lowell Manufacturing Company. Bids for the sewer extension will now have to be re-submitted as the previous bid was for a ten inch sewer which engineers had recommended. Two versions (the City's and the School's) of what the City had agreed to pay relating to the cost of installing a 10inch sewer rather than an 8-inch, and higher than anticipated construction costs weighed in the decision. The 8-inch sewer will take care of sanitary sewer needs of Root-Lowell and the School, but would not allow for any further hook-ups.

A reversal of a council decision (to retain the engineering firm of Williams and Works for inspectional services on the sewer project) by the Kent County Department of Public Works, caused Councilman James Hall to express displeasure over the DPW action and wished it to be so noted. Mayor Anderson explained that the DPW does have the right to maintain the inoject infough the contract between the City and the Kent County Department of Public

It was also revealed that the DPW action had brought a threat of possible termination of future services being rendered by Williams and Works. Concern over this resulted in the passage of a resolution stating the City's desire to continue its retention of Williams and Works in all other engineering problems.

Announcement of an electrical rate increase by the

Lowell Light and Power Company was made by Manager Bacon with the increase to be effective in June bill-

April 16-20 will be clean-up week in Lowell with the possibility of another in May.

In recognition of Michigan's great water resources, the council adopted a resolution proclaiming April as Stream Appreciation Month, as designated by the Michigan Grand River Watershed Council. The special event of the week will be a 225 mile canoe trip beginning at Muskegon Center and ending at Grand Haven. Communities are also encouraged to promote their own streams and park cleanup programs.

The matter of dogs running loose, causing citizen complaints to the City was discussed. Slow response by the County to pick up strays, but the added expense for the City to maintain their own dog warden, both pose problems for City fathers.

Approve Emergency Medical Services

The Emergency Medical Services grant proposed by the Kent County Sheriff's Department was approved by the Kent County Board of Commissioners Tuesday.

This program will call for three emergency medical units to render immediate aid at auto, industrial, and farm accidents and to those stricken with serious ill-

It may be 4 to 6 weeks before the program is fully implemented, but utilizing a federal grant, fifteen men will be hired to man the units. Also radar units will be purchased to help curb the rising accident rate in the

The Board of Commissioners should be commended for responding to the needs of all the people of Kent County by providing emergency medical services.



Mt. Clemens Man Crews Work To Free



A number of law enforcement agencies, as well as fire departments, were responsible for the rescue of a Mt. Clemens man from his wrecked car Sunday night. Richard Cory, of 38990 Pineridge, was westbound on I-96 when he swerved and slammed into the bridge pillar at Whitneyville Avenue.

According to witnesses the vehicle had been traveling at a high rate of speed and was swerving prior to the accident. The Emergency Medical unit, and the Cascade Fire Department were first on the scene and were unable to free Cory from the wreckage. An Emergency Unit from Grand Rapids with a doctor arrived on the scene as well as two ambulances from Bud's.

Realizing that Cory would not be freed with the available equipment, the rescue squad from the Grand Rapids Fire Department was dispatched. After an hour and 15 minutes Cory was finally freed from the demolished 1962 Chevrolet.

No Agreement Reached On 'Bus Runs'

Although not in complete agreement, the Lowell Board of Education Monday night took a step toward returning to single bus runs for the next school year when they okayed the purchase of three new buses.

In spite of the possibility of losing some bus driving personnel who may not drive next year if deprived of the additional income of double runs, and also despite the more costly method of operation, the board weigh-ed the pros and cons against the educational advantage to the students (and the more efficient operation in case of a weather emergency) and voted to return to a single starting hour for all buildings and single runs.

It is expected that the new budget will allow a higher rate per hour for bus drivers to partially compensate for the loss of pay through additional driving time.

Even though the overall expense will be somewhat greater, the majority of the board members apparently felt that the advantages far offset the disadvantages

Falling In Some Areas

One phase of education which is gaining momentum all over and is particularly successful in our own system, is the use of student help from the high school and junior high to work with elementary children who need additional individualized attention.

Single busing will make this source of one-to-one help available to more students than is now possible with the double run situation.

Dr. R. D. Siegle, sitting in for absent Board President Robert Reagan, stated that while all children are educable, he felt that lately our system was falling down in some areas of elementary education and that if going to single bus runs would make more of this cross-age education possible, then it should be done.

Supt. Leonard Sinke spoke up saying he wished that all the board members would take time to visit in the elementary grades to see the student help in operation, adding that the program was a two-way street in that the older "helping" students also received a great deal of benefit themselves while aiding the younger ones.

At the present time, approximately 100 junior high students are involved in the program and approximately 30 senior high. The number allowed to participate in the senior high next year is expected to at least double since one restriction requiring the aides to be members of the Future Teachers' Club in the high school has now been removed. Any student deemed capable by his teachers may sign up for the program next year.

Low Bidder

The low bids of Royce Ford for three bus chassis and Ward Body for three bus bodies were accepted by the board, with the dissenting votes only reflecting opposition to the single run change.

Allows Variance

The board officially voted to allow a variance in the policy banning overnight trips for mixed groups to permit the senior class to go to Cedar Point on their senior trip. The results of the trip will be discussed at a later date to determine whether the board actually wants to change its policy or will stick with exceptions to be voted on each year.

Working Policy

Gary Gilbert, head of the high school's cooperative work program, spoke to the board presenting an operational handbook for its approval. The purpose of the handbook would be to state the policy of the workschool program so that the students involved would know in black and white what is expected of them and what they can expect of both the school and their em-

Several changes were also suggested by Gilbert,

1. Students not be allowed to work for their parents unless there is a third non-related party directly involved in work supervision and evaluation. 2. The program be limited to two year participa-

Weed control is important to successful strawberry growing, according to Michigan State University horticulturists. Weed control (or lack of it) can affect production, fruit size and duration of your home straw-

berry planting. The three general methods for controlling weeds are: hand hoeing, mechanical cultivation and herbicide pro-

grams. Hand hoeing is usually the most practical method for backyard strawberry growers. Make your first hoeing after planting and as soon as the first weeds come up. Then, if not using herbicides,

cultivate after heavy rains, or about every two weeks as new weed seedlings emerge. In addition to cultivation, chemical herbicides, such as chloroxuron, DCPA and diphenamid, may be used. These are available as sprays or in granular form, and
