## Historical Society Sponsoring Fallasburg Fall Festival

October 13 and 14 the West Central Michigan Historical Society will sponsor a real old-fashioned two-day event called "Fallasburg Fall Festival," held throughout Fallasburg Park and the adjoining Fallasburg Pioneer Village, located 3½ miles north of Lowell. The society's Museum is located in the village's one-room school-house.

The festival will begin at 10 a.m. each day. Over 60 booths from craftsmen and artists, antiques, antique cars, flea markets, educational displays, etc., will be on exhibit and/or for sale. Continual musical performances will take place, with a Fall flower show planned.

A variety of lunch booths will be available, but all are encouraged to bring a picnic lunch and enjoy the beautiful Flat River and Fallasburg Park. Participants will be in colorful old-fashioned attire.

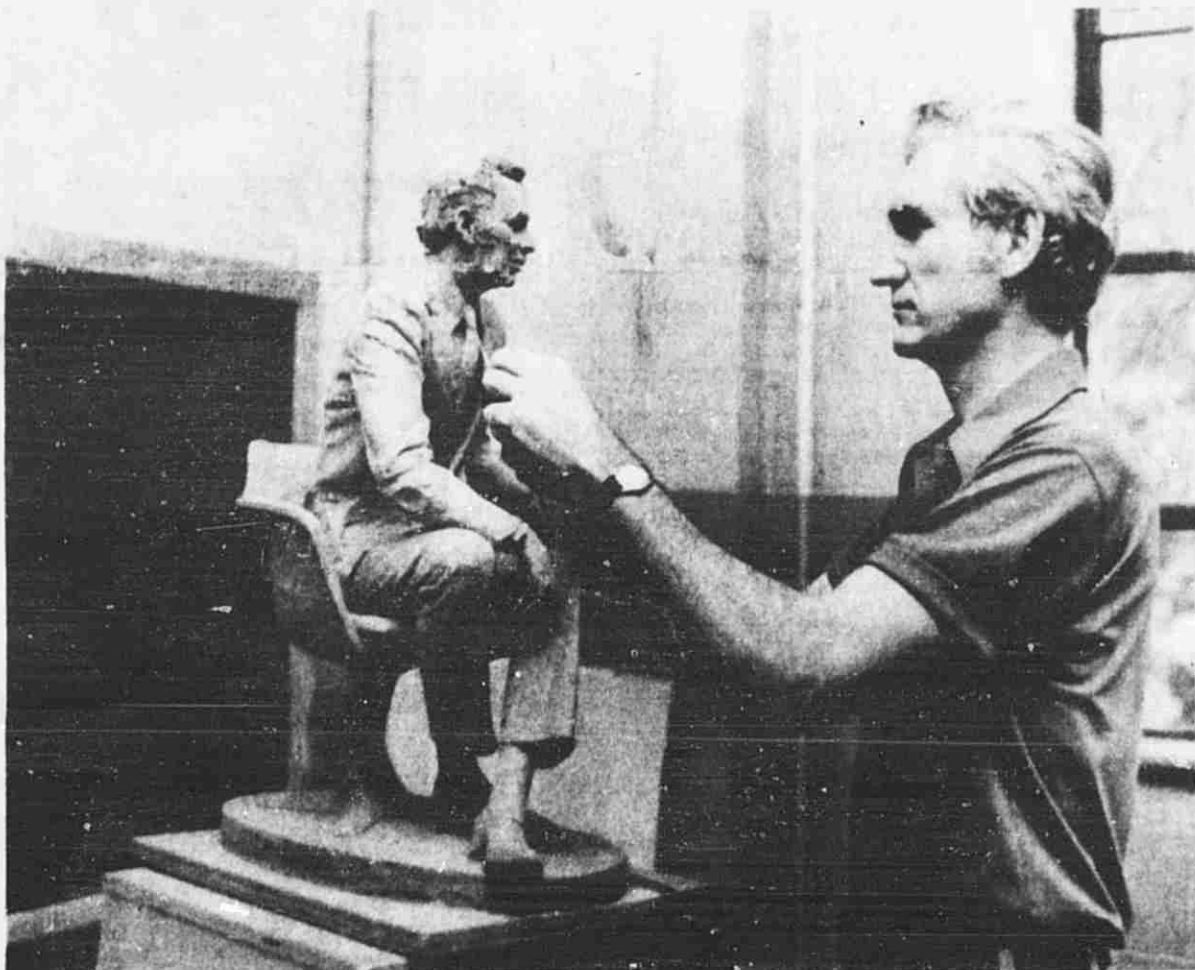
In the evening, at 7 o'clock the booths will close and a box social will be held. Terry Buck, who received

## Commission Renowned Sculptor

In a special tribute to the founders of Amway Corporation, the independent Amway Distributor's Association has commissioned internationally renowned sculptor Charles C. ## Storm Damages Tanis Motel

A tree downed by last Thursday morning's storm, heavily damaged the Tanis Motel on East Fulton at the West City limits.

## Emergency Units On The Road

Last week the Kent County Sheriff's Department unveiled four new police cars. These are not ordinary police cars, however. They are the result of County and Federal Funds combined in a selective enforcement-emergency medical services grant.

Known as Emergency Units (E-Units for short), they are manned by a team of highly trained deputies and are equipped with the latest medical and rescue gear. The new units will be dispatched to the scenes of personal injury accidents, heart attacks, and industrial, farm, and home accidents.

While not on emergency medical calls, they will be involved in traffic control throughout the out-county areas. The E-Units will be writing tickets as they will be clocking speeding motorists.

Special credit should be given to Sheriff's Deputy Larry French for his part in organizing the program, and Dr. Raymond Lang for providing the training for the men.

The Kent County Board of Commissioners as well as the many citizens who supported the program should be commended for their part in making Kent County a safer place to live.

## Former Area Man Killed In Crash

A former Lowell resident, Roger Duane Stevens, 32, was killed early Saturday morning, September 2, in a two-car crash, two miles east of Cedar Springs on 18 Mile Road.

Also killed was Donald Potter, 23, of Gowen, driver of the car in which Stevens was a passenger. Critically injured was the driver of the other car, Sally Trader, 29 of Cedar Springs.

Investigating officers said the collision occurred as the Trader car was eastbound and in the process of making a left turn when the Potter car, also eastbound, attempted to pass on the left.

Stevens, who resided on Route 1, Cedar Springs, graduated from Lowell High School in 1960.

Funeral Mass was said Tuesday morning at St. Charles Catholic Church of Greenville, with interment being made in the Church's cemetery.

Stevens is survived by his wife, Joyce; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Emerson Stevens of Lowell; his grandmother, Mrs. Iva MacIntyre of Lowell; two sisters, Mrs. Alyn (Gladys) Fletcher of Plymouth and Mrs. Charles (Janet) Boerema of Grand Rapids; and a brother, Ronald of Grand Rapids.

When the sky is clear, observations of the Moon, Venus, Jupiter, Mars and other celestial objects will be permitted through the Observatory's two telescopes.

There is no charge for the open house activities, which are sponsored jointly by the Chaffee Planetarium and the Grand Rapids Amateur Astronomical Association.

Hitting the rail, as she went over, nine stitches were required to close the gash on her knee.

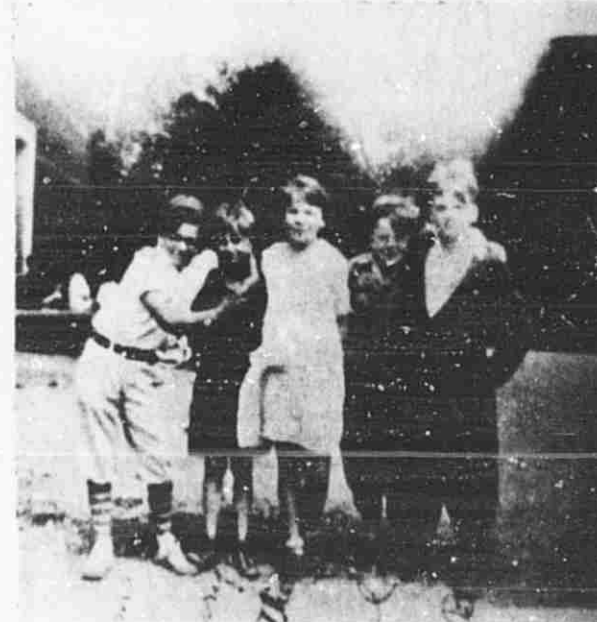
## FIRE CALLS...

## Nicest Spot Was Baguio, During Summer Stay

#### GREETINGS!

Well, I have had a wonderful two months in the Philippines, so now upon returning I would like to share with you some of my experiences.

On the flight from Detroit to San Francisco I met a Filipino who was returning—Chito. During our 12 hour layover his relatives there in San Francisco took us around the town. With typical Filipino hospitality they took us to their home and fed us—dingruen. I found it very delicious, but later, to my dismay, discovered I had eaten blood soup.

Fifteen hours later we arrived in the Philippines at Manila International Airport. Wow! When I stepped off that DC-8 it was like stepping into an oven. It was so hot I felt like climbing back on that airplane. After twenty confusing minutes we finally got through customs. My family grabbed me as we went through a long line of waiting foster parents. My family consisted of three brothers and two sisters and my parents, my mother is very pretty. My home was in Quezon City, the capital of the Philippines. My father owns a concrete products company. In my house we had four maids and one chauffeur, that is how all the well-to-do families live.

The other life style in the Philippines is poverty. There really isn't any middle class.

The first difficulty I encountered was, of course, understanding their language—Tagalog, which I never really got the hang of. Just about everyone speaks English though, so there was really no great barrier, except I hated to answer the phone. My brother, Mike, was really something else. He liked to tease me by calling me up on the intercom and talking to me in Tagalog. There are many sights to be seen in Manila and Mike took me to see a great majority of them. We went to Forts, museums, cathedrals, and parks. One park in particular was very beautiful—Rizal Park, which is named after their national hero—Hose Rizal.

Quite often beggars would approach me on the streets—calling me Americano—or Joe, they assumed I was wealthy. Even children under 10 years of age would ask me for money or cigarettes. Almost everyone there smokes and it isn't unusual to see small children smoking.

The food in the Philippines is mostly seafood. It took me a while to get used to it—but I loved the fruits that they have there. One of their national delicacies is balert—something I could never force myself to try. Balert is a fertilized egg which has a half-formed embryo inside. It is eaten hot with salt. I really couldn't take that! My dad was a lot of fun—he liked to cook and often roasted his own peanuts. When I was talking on the phone he liked to tease me by giving me handfuls of peanuts—which I couldn't eat.

The nicest spot I went to while in the Philippines was Baguio. Baguio is a popular summer resort in the mountains. It's just a small town but the climate is great and the market places are exciting. I bought a lot of souvenirs there and had fun arguing with the shopkeepers over prices.

I had the most wonderful summer in the Philippines and I want to thank everyone who helped to make it possible for me to go.

## Off-Campus Classes Saves Trip Downtown

Grand Rapids Junior College will offer off-campus classes this fall at various outlying school district high schools. The program is a result of a coordinated effort between Wendell Shroll, J.C.'s Dean of Continuing Education, and community education directors in the participating school districts.

Schools planning off-campus classes include Godwin, Rogers, Grandville, Jenison, Rockford, Lowell, Middleville and Caledonia.

Last winter a pilot off-campus psychology class at Rockford generated sufficient enthusiasm to prompt Shroll to plan the program's expansion.

## Wheat Program Changes For 1974

Major provisions of the 1974 Wheat Program have been released by the Secretary of Agriculture, Earl L. Buttz. This announcement was made by Don Diehl, State Executive Director of the Michigan State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office. With wheat producers getting ready to plant their 1974 crop, Diehl emphasized the importance of their becoming familiar with the new provisions of the 1974 Wheat Program. Of primary importance is the target price concept in the new farm bill recently passed by Congress. The bill provides a target price of \$2.05 per bushel for 1974 and 1975 wheat. What this means specifically is that if the average market price during the first five months of the 1974 marketing year for all wheat farmers is \$2.05 or more, there will be no Government payments. If the market falls below \$2.05, the difference will be made up with a Government payment. The payment, if any, will be determined on the basis of the size of the farm allotment and farm wheat yield times the market and target price difference. Diehl noted that no acreage will be set-aside in 1974 and the conserving base requirement has also been eliminated. Also, there will be no limit on the acreage of wheat that can be planted but, he emphasized again, payments, if any will be based on the farm allotment and not the planted acreage. County ASCS offices will soon notify wheat producers of their 1974 allotments.

An amusing incident was reported about one of the Armours, the great beef and pork packers of Chicago, traveling in Spain. "He was taken by a grandee of Madrid to see the national sport. When the bull came in, he sank to his knees and refused to move. Then the director called the torador and inquired as to the cause of the trouble, and the torador replied, "Ah, Senor, ze bulls 'ave seen ze great Armour of Chicago sitting with your excellency, and zere is no fight left in him!"  
 There were several reports of murders, and hangings for the dastardly deeds, the descriptions usually graphic and specific, as noted in the following which took place in Houghton, Michigan:  
 John Salo and Ivar Pairola, who came from Minnesota a week ago, were murdered Sunday night at Joseph Simmo's temperance saloon on the road from Hancock to Calumet. The jagular vein and carotid artery were severed in both men by stabs from a knife. Nat Hergoner was also dangerously stabbed, but will recover. Simmons kept an unlicensed saloon and a disreputable place! There is no clew as to who did the deed."

Mr. Richard Bush of Williams and Works then presented the proposed plans for sidewalk construction on Foreman Street. Cost for the project would be \$9,426.00 for approximately 2,620 feet of walk, 5 feet wide, and 4 inches thick.

 Mr. David Miller of the Lowell School Board asked about the walk being installed in front of the new Middle School, and proposed that that portion of walk be deleted from the plans at this time, or that the School Board be given an option to discuss the matter. The School Board had understood that the sidewalk would be installed only from the railroad tracks on the north side of Foreman Street to the east property line of the Middle School.

Another discussion followed in which it was decided that the School Board would be given the option of placing the additional section of walk in the most heavily traveled area adjoining the rest of the installed walk, east of their property line at a later date.  
 Mr. Bush was requested to report back at the next regular meeting with a firm price from Volkiers Construction Company, who is doing the sidewalk construction for the Storm Sewer Separation Project.

Bids were then opened for a new City pickup truck and read in the order received.

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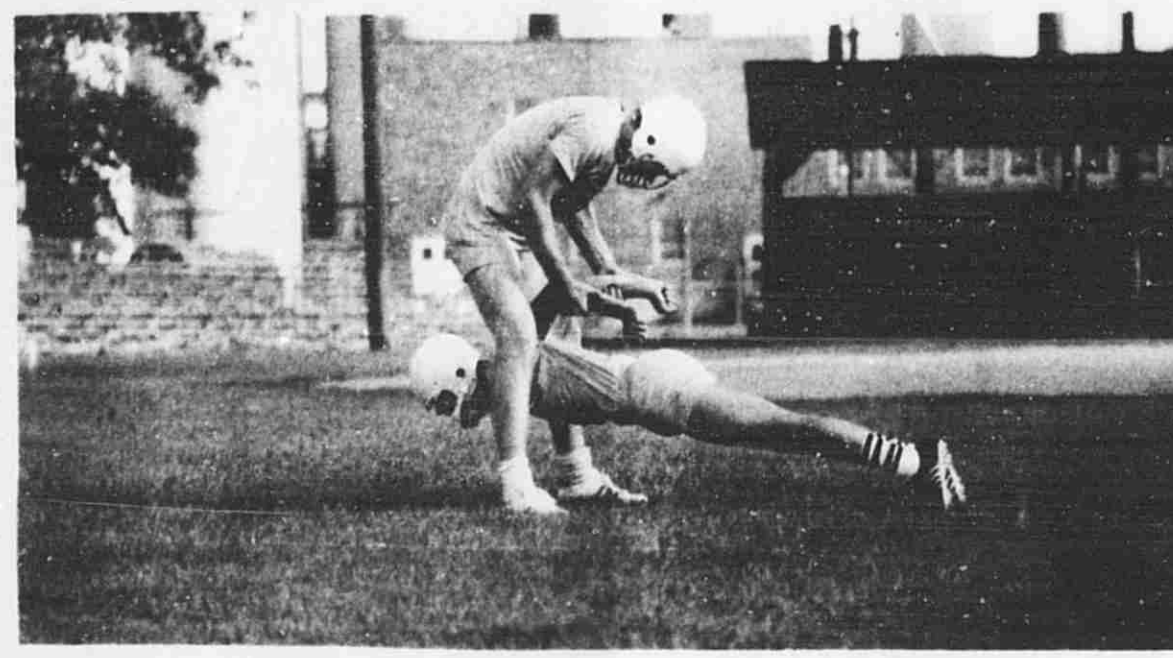

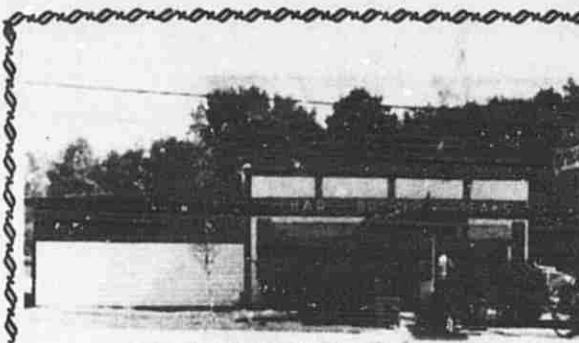
