# Death Takes Retired Teacher, Taught Here Twenty-three Years



A retired Lowell High School teacher and civic leader for many years, Mrs. Gladys I. Doyle passed away January 23 in Dearborn, Michigan, at the age of 84.

She was born in Munith, Jackson County, Michigan, December 28, 1889, and received her education from a Mason High School and the University of Michigan.

In 1908 she came to Lowell, and was united in marriage September 8, 1915 to Charles Doyle, who passed away in 1943.

Joining the Lowell Public School's staff in 1943, she retired in 1956, moving to Dearborn several years lat-

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Very active in community affairs, Mrs. Doyle served as president of the Lowell Literary Club, Lowell Women's Club, Kent County Federation of Women's Clubs and Women's Society of Christian Service.

She served as local chairman of the Red Cross for seven years, and served the Lowell School's Board of Education for 11 years.

# **Concerned Officials** To Discuss Erosion

Concerned officials from Michigan's 83 counties will meet in Lansing February 4-6 during a legislative conference held by the Michigan Association of Counties.

Among the areas to be discussed is the new state soil erosion act which could possibly stymie county road and sewer construction throughout the state. Earl Rogers, Engineer-Director of the County Road Association of Michigan, will discuss the effects of the act with B. Dale Ball, Director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture and a Department of Natural Resources Official.

Another area of prime concern to county commissioners and officials is collective bargaining within sheriff's departments.

"Because counties are relatively new and inexperienced in the field of collective bargaining we must try to come up with some sort of guidelines for counties. This session is a start in that direction," said MAC Executive Director A. Barry McGuire.

In addition to the regular scheduled meeting, county officials will have the opportunity to meet and directly question directors of representatives from 13 state agencies covering areas of vital concern to county government

The three day conference is expected to draw more than 400 county officials to the Olds Plaza Hotel.

# **Belding Receives** Lewis Cass Medal

Marshall C. Belding, 2696 Orange Avenue, Cascade, has a distinct honor in being the first local Mason to receive the Lewis Cass medal.

The Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of Michigan, has designated the years 1974 and 1975 as "Lewis Cass Years" to commemorate the outstanding contributions this eminent Mason has made to Capitular Masonry, as well as the State of Michigan, over 84 years of service.

Cass was Michigan's first Grand Master of Masons, the charter High Priest of our first Royal Arch Chapter, the first Grand High Priest, Territorial Governor for 18 years, U.S. Senator from Michigan, Minister to France, Secretary of War in the Jackson cabinet, Secretary of State of the Buchanan administration, and in 1848 was the Democratic nominee for the Presidency of the United States! Truly such a service is worth honoring and emulation.

To commemorate this standard of high service, Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masonry is bestowing on each Companion who is newly exalted during these two years, a beautiful medal to keep as his very own. And Marshall Belding is the first in Kent County and counties contiguous to it, to have this honor.

### **BILLS NOT ITEMIZED CAN DELAY MEDICARE PAYMENT**

Submitting medical bills that are not itemized can delay payment of claims under the medical insurance part of Medicare, according to Raymond C. Backus, social security district manager in Grand Rapids.

"If the patient uses the 'payment-to-you' method of medical insurance payment," Mr. Backus said, "his claim cannot be paid unless he submits an itemized bill of services from his doctor-or other medical provider.

The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills and many other medical expenses of people covered by the program. Claims are handled two ways-by the "payment-to-you" method or the "assignment" method.

"The patient is required to send in an itemized bill of services only if he uses the payment-to-you method," Mr. Backus said. "If the patient and his doctor agree to use the assignment method, the doctor sends in the claim and Medicare payment is made directly to the doctor."






Pastor Warren Holcomb and the congregation extend a welcome to all for these special services. Those who like especially good gospel music will enjoy this quartet.

# Wildcats Upset Red Arrows


The Northview Wildcats, in non-league action last Tuesday, upset the Red Arrows 59-47. Northview's excellent defense held Lowell to 10



I would guess that very nearly one million dollars was spent for that super fancy edifice of learning that could have been applied to the implements of learning and teachers wages.

Instead we have musical parking lots, cassette recorders for private listening, electric typewriters for 6th, 7th or 8th grade typing classes that can't be followed up with continued training until the eleventh grade. wall to wall carpeting, even in the cooking class rooms, open beam ceiling, throw pillows to lay on the floor with, etc., etc., etc.,

It seems very apparent to me that someone was much more concerned with an extremely impressive display of lavish interior appointments than they were

with furnishing students with a higher standard of education by settling for a more spartan building. To you Mrs. Kehoe, and the rest of the Lowell area axpayers, I say I am sorry for not being a good watch

As for going through channels I had my fill of that when Mr. Kelly and Mr. Sinke informed my wife, myself, and Rev. Carpenter that they had a "social duty" to administer punishment and that they were not really concerned with what effect their actions were having on my son and his family.

When I placed this before the school board, nothing was accomplished to alleviate the situation. On the positive side of the ledger, I feel that the dis-

respect and distrust my children and I have for the Lowell school administration has generated a rather fine degree of respect and understanding between my children and myself While I am not naive enough to believe that either

my children or myself are paragons of virtue, I do feel that we are making progress towards being better citizens in spite of the examples set by our school administration

I am, however, reasonably certain that if this letter is published, my children will be in constant difficulty in school because I spoke out. The teaching staff of our system is another matter.

I have had the privilege of becoming rather well acquainted with several members.

My impression is that in the majority of cases they are sensitive, concerned, well informed people who have settled in the Lowell area to take advantage of being able to be closer to their students, than is possible in a larger school system.

In my estimation they are doing a marvelous job working with our youngsters, in spite of the administra-

Carol, I too, wish someone would roll back that rug and examine the dirt that has been swept under it for much too long a time.

As a final indicator, when our school was host to the district choir evaluation, the administration could not tear themselves away from their "Christmas Party" to make even a token appearance.



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
