AUSTIN BLAIR.

The Alabama case is now with Great Britain; its settlement is her task. As she deliberately inflicted injuries upon our commerce, and deliberately prolonged the rebellion, satisfaction for these wrongs should be as deliberately made. The United States makes no entangling alliances with other Powers. This is her traditional policy—at once her duty and her coronet; and that is to-day the attitude of President Grant. He does not propose to take advantage of the difficulties of a friendly nation. Unlike France, which interfered to establish a new empire on our southern frontier, and unlike England, which exerted all the influence of her aristocracy in favor of the rebellion at a moment when the cause of the Union was doubtful, the President relies upon the sense of justice of the English ministry and the English masses, believing that they will seize the first fitting occasion to close up the only remaining cause of difference between people speaking the same language and animated by the most fraternal feelings toward each other.

Very soon we shall have another complication arising out of the Franco-Prussian war. Who shall be King of the French? Will Napoleon be restored, or will the House of Orleans be re-established? King William is undoubtedly for Napoleon, while Gambetta, Trochu, Thiers, and others, Republicans and Conservatives, are counted for the Orleans interest. It is noticeable that in these speculations the people seem to be entirely ignored; but they will be satisfied with a master placed over them by foreign bayonets?

The Duke of Aosta has formally accepted the Spanish crown. The New York Commercial commiserates the Duke and says: "That unfortunate Italian youth, whose head is going to ache beneath the pressure of the Spanish crown, is at present engaged in bidding his friends and kindred a harrowing farewell. He leaves his happy home for a foreign shore, where, if there is no danger of being devoured by wild beasts or flayed alive by savages, he at least runs the chance of undergoing mental tortures that would rob even death of its terrors."

The weakness of the new party movement is apparent in the scarcity of its followers. In Illinois the course of the Chicago Tribune has been approved by but one Republican paper. In Ohio the only supporters of the movement are the Cincinnati partisans of Mr. Cox. With but a half dozen exceptions the Republican press of the West are a unit in their support of the Administration.

There is one great inescapable sin which the enemies of General Grant will never forgive him, and that is—being President of the United States.

Vote on the Amendments. The returns from thirty-three counties show a majority for impartial suffrage, and we have hope that it is carried. The first and second clauses of the railroad act are carried. The following are the footings of the returns so far as received: Amendment relating to salaries, yes, 23,577; no, 55,870; majority against, 31,693. Impartial suffrage amendment, yes, 36,317; no, 35,018; majority for, 1,302.

Amendment authorizing the Legislature to regulate railroad charges, yes, 56,667; no, 38,836; majority for, 48,031.

Amendment prohibiting the consolidation of competing lines of railway, yes, 51,217; no, 40,078; majority for, 14,139. Providing for the payment of railroad bonds, yes, 36,435; no, 63,720; majority against, 27,281.

60 Indians of the Oceana reservation have just received patents for lands.

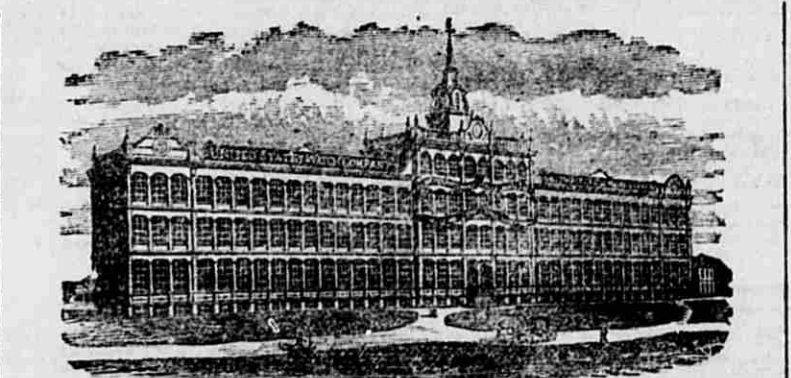
