BOUNTY TAND BILL.

We are glad to find that Gen. Stoughton's bill to extend the Bounty Land System to soldiers and sailors of the late War, and to their widows

The bill provides that all honorably public lands of the United States, or JOHN KOPF, if discharged on account of wounds received or disabilities incurred in the line of duty, then the term of enlistment shall be deducted from the time heretofore required to perfect the title. In case of the death of any person who would be entitled to a homestead under the provisions of the first section of the act, his widow, if unmarried, or in case of her death or marriage, then the minor orphan children shall be entitled to all the benefits enumerated in the act, provided such person died during his term of enlistment. The whole term of enlistment shall be deducted from the time heretofore required to perfect the title. Every private soldier and every seaman, marine, and officer, who served ninety days, and now inscribed on the pension rolls, are entitled to the benefits of the act.

THE LATE accident on the Hudson River R. R. at New Hamburg, N. Y. was one of the most horrible occurrence of the kind we ever saw chronicled. The accident was caused by the collision of two trains which unfortunately met on the bridge. The locomotive of the train going north collided with an oil car of the other train which immediately took fire, and soon caused a scene of horzor. Some thirty or forty passengers were burned to death. The affair is being investigated. It is time these Railroad tragedies were attended to.


