The Effect of Light on Small Pox.

Among the many investigations
now being made of the chemical ac-
tion of light, there are none more in-
teresting or important than those
which are directed to the observation
of its effect on the health. It has
been observed by Dr. Weber that
the sensibility of the skin is very
much increased in those parts of the
body which are always exposed to
the light, and this difference has even
been measured by that eminent phy-
sician. This remarkable fact is espe-
cially observable on persons suffering
from small pox, the severity of the
skin disease being visibly augmented
if the patient be not confined in a
dark room. Dr. Waters has recently
published a paper on this subject, in
which he states that if the room be
darkened so that not a single ray can
enter it, the effect is to arrest the dis-
ease at the papular or vesicular stage;
it never becomes purulent, and the
skin between the vesicles is never in-
flamed or swollen; liquor sanguinis
is not changed into pus, nearly all
the pain and itching are absent, and
the small is, if not entirely removed,
greatly diminished. Another advan-
tage, important in a therapeutical
point of view, is the assistance given
to medicines, the absence of light in-
creasing the excretory powers of the
skin.

The Chicago Relief Bill has passed the Senate by a vote of 20 to 17, and has gone to the House, and has been referred to the Committee on Ways and Means. It will undoubtedly pass the House.

Senators Chandler and Ferry have struggled hard to defeat the bill, and for their efforts they have the honest thanks of the people of their State, and it need not seem strange if the time may come when the country, at large, will see the wisdom of their action, and the folly of those who have advocated the bill. A bad and dangerous precedent is now firmly established.

It is asserted and will undoubtedly be proven that Charles A. Edmonds, Commissioner of the State Land Office, has been engaged in a very small but dirty business, viz. causing false reports to be circulated through a transient circulating medium, attacking in a most disgraceful manner, the character of a rival candidate for office, Mr. E. H. Porter, of Lansing. Edmonds has been arrested, and will be tried at the next term of Court.

SOLDIERS—Remember that the meeting of the Soldiers and Sailors Association of this State, will be held in Detroit, on the 9th day of April. All who can do so, should be present at that meeting, as it will be of great importance to every "boy in blue." Several prominent officers are announced to be present, among whom are, Gens. Sheridan, Burnside, Meade and Hooker.

The work before the State Legislature is being rapidly disposed of, and were it not for the appointment bill, the Session would be ready to close very soon.

The Appropriation bill passed the Senate on Wednesday last week. It places Ken in the Eighth District with Louie, Barry, Clinton and Montcalm Counties.

The House bill differs from that of the Senate and the matter is now in the hands of the Conference Committee. The Committee is making slow progress, and has not yet reported, but will undoubtedly be heard from to-day (Wednesday). The work of relieving is creating a good deal of excitement among the workers.

It is said that the Stokes bill of exceptions fills 700 pages of legal cap, and cannot be read in less than two weeks. It is to be regretted that so much time must be wasted on account of such a guilty wretch. Stokes ought to pay "blind man's bluff," with the Sheriff. The sooner such men become silent partners of the Sexton, the better for those they leave behind them.

Mr. S. M. Hewitt, the great temperance lecturer, died last week at Meriden, Conn. Mr. H. was a powerful speaker, and his death is a public loss.

The Postmaster General has appointed Mrs. Emma I. Kipp, to the position of Postmaster at Raymond, Montcalm county, vice Jerome L. Reynolds, resigned; also, Mr. John B. Steffey, to be Postmaster at Crystal, Montcalm county, vice Anson L. Smith, resigned.

IN BLACK AND WHITE

We have been requested by the Northern Michigan Agricultural and Mechanical Society to insert in the columns of the JOURNAL, the following resolution, which were adopted at the recent meeting of the Directors at Pontiac:

Being fully convinced that the action of the State Society, in regard to the time fixed for holding the next fair, has been unjust and that the intention of the N. M. A. & M. Society has, on the contrary, been most kind and honorable, we cheerfully give room to the preamble and resolutions, that our readers may see and judge for themselves.

WHEREAS, A communication has been received from the State Entomological Society calling our attention to the fact that the State Agricultural Society has adopted the same week for its fair as that selected by the union fair at Grand Rapids, and

WHEREAS, It has been ascertained by the President of the State Agricultural Society and reiterated by the Secretary through the Michigan Farmer, that the time adopted by the Northern Michigan Agricultural and Mechanical Society and the State Entomological Society for holding the Union Fair, viz. the 16th of September, 1872, and five following days occurs on the same week on which this (the State Agricultural Society) has held its fair nine out of the last ten years; and

WHEREAS, This statement is calculated to produce the impression that it was the object of this Society to interfere with the State Fair and thereby detract from its usefulness; and

WHEREAS, This view has been extensively promulgated with an evident intention of injuring the Northern Michigan Agricultural and Mechanical Society; and

WHEREAS, This Society, not wishing to occupy the time the State Society would claim, carefully selected the week for holding its fair with due regard to that usually occupied and most likely to be selected by the State Agricultural Society, and

WHEREAS, The fourth week in September being the one most usually selected by the State Society, was considered by this Board as the best week, but regarding it as belonging to the State Society we yielded our preference solely to avoid any conflicting circumstances calculated to detract from the success of either fair; and it was our intention to attend the Fair of the State Agricultural Society, and our desire that the State Society should attend the Union Fair, as shown by resolutions inviting them to do so, passed at the meeting of this Board, held in the city of Grand Rapids, in January last; and

WHEREAS, On the 10th day of January this Board adopted the following resolution: Resolved, That the Fair of 1872 be held on the third Monday of September, 1872, and the following day.

AND WHEREAS, This fact was published in the Michigan Farmer and other newspapers of the State, so that it was well understood by the State Agricultural Society at its February meeting, when the same week was adopted for its fair, therefore,

Resolved by the Board of Directors of the Northern Mich. Agr. and Mechanical Society, That we disclaim all intention to occupy the time hitherto occupied by the State Agricultural Society for its fair.

21. That we hereby declare that in adopting the week for holding the fair of September for the Union Fair, we have not adopted the week occupied by the State Society for its fair during the last nine or ten years, as is shown by the accompanying list of dates, on which the State Society's fair has been held its fairs during the last 23 years:
