NORTH CAROLINA.
The result of the election in North Carolina up to present writing (Tuesday p. m.) is still uncertain. An official count will be necessary to show how the State has gone. While it is believed that a small majority has been given to the Democrats, there is yet reason to doubt until the official returns are all in. Admitting the Democrats to have 1,000 majority, which now is all they claim, this shows a Republican gain of 4,000 in that State, over the vote of 1870. But this is not what the supporters of the Mongrel ticket wasted so much wind and powder over last week. They fired their guns and shouted "12,000 majority" most lustily. But the shout has lost its echo, and the guns have been put under cover. Gradually the returns came in and the Republican gains rolled up, and the eyes of the Greeley worshippers rolled out. Giving North Carolina to the Democrats by only 1,000 majority on the State ticket is, we believe, good evidence that that State will be given to Grant this fall. Wait and see. Time is in Grant's favor, and the "old scythe" is getting closer to Greeley every day. In November, "off comes his head."
LATER.—Report says, the tide has turned and the Republican majority is probably 2,000. Things are yet mixed, but it is hoped the official count will give the State to the Republicans.
WEDNESDAY.—The latest received before going to press says the State has gone Republican. Give the Liberals more powder.

For Superintendent of Public Instruction, Daniel B. Briggs was made the nominee, although O. Hosford of Eaton, and H. A. Ford of Berrien were both prominent candidates for nomination.

For Attorney General, Senator Byron D. Ball of this county is the nominee. The other candidates were Hon. Dwight May, D. L. Benton of Mecosta and W. W. Mitchell of Ionia.
