Greeley to the Democrats, Accepting the Baltimore Nomination.

The following letter of Greeley's acceptance we find in the Seneca Co. (N. Y.) Courier. The Editor of that paper says "it may be a little mixed but every word of it was written by the old philosopher." Readers of the N. Y. Tribune have seen it all before, but they will undoubtedly be gratified to see it again.

New York, July 18, 1872.

Gentlemen—Upon mature deliberation it seems fit that I should give your letter of the tenth instant some further and fuller response than the hasty, unpremeditated words in which I acknowledged and accepted your nomination at our meeting on the 12th. That your convention saw fit to accord its highest honor to one who had been prominently and pointedly opposed to your party in the earnest and sometimes angry controversies of the last forty years, is essentially noteworthy.

"I saw the other day a suggestion that I would probably be the best Democratic candidate to run against Gen. Grant for president. I thought that about the most absurd thing I ever heard or read. If the Democratic party were called upon to decide between Grant and myself, I know that their regard for what they must call principle would induce nine-tenths of them to vote against me. Why? I am a decided enemy to that party in its most respectable aspects."

I owe my adoption at Baltimore to the fact that I had already been nominated at Cincinnati, and that a concentration of forces upon any kind of a new ticket had been proved impracticable. Gratified as I am at your concurrence in the Cincinnati nomination, certain as I am that you would not have thus concurred had you not deemed me upright and capable, I find nothing in the circumstances calculated to inflame vanity or nourish self-conceit.

"Point wherever you please to an election district which you will pronounce morally rotten, given up in most part to debauchery and vice, whose voters subsist mainly by keeping policy offices gambling houses, grog-shops, and darker dens of infamy, and that district will be found at nearly or quite every election giving a majority for that which styles itself the "Democratic" party. Take all the haunts of debauchery in the land and you will find nine-tenths of the master-spirits active partisans of that same Democracy. What is the instinct, the sympathetic cord, which attaches them so uniformly to this party? Will you consider?"

Having done what I could for the complete emancipation of the blacks, I now insist on the full enfranchisement of all my white countrymen. Let none say that the ban has just been removed from all but a few hundred elderly gentlemen, to whom eligibility to office can be of but little consequence. My view contemplates the hundreds proscribed, the millions who are denied the right to be ruled and represented by the men of their unfettered choice. Proscription were absurd if these did not wish to elect the very men whom they are forbidden to choose.

"The brain, the heart, the soul of the present Democratic party is the rebel element at the south, with its northern allies and sympathisers. It is rebel at the core to-day. It would come into power with the hate, the chagrin, the wrath, the mortification or ten bitter years to impel and guide its steps. It would devote itself to taking off or reducing tax after tax, until the treasury was deprived of the means of paying interest on the national debt, and would hail the tidings of national bankruptcy with unalloyed gladness and unconcealed exultation. Whatever chastisement may be deserved by our national sins, we must hope that this disgrace and humiliation will be spared us."

Gentlemen, your platform, which is also mine, assures me that Democracy is not henceforth to stand for one thing and Republicanism for another, but those terms mean in politics as they always have meant in the dictionary, substantially one and the same thing, namely: equal rights regardless of creed or color. I hail this as a genuine new departure from outworn feuds and meaningless contentions in the direction of progress and reform.

"A purely selfish interest attaches the lewd, ruffianly, criminal and dangerous classes to the Democratic party." Without me if I steadily advance, without me if I falter, her grand array moves on to achieve for our country her glorious and beneficent destiny.

"I am not the man you need." Your party is mostly free trade, and I am a most ferocious protectionist. I have no doubt that I may be nominated and elected by your help, but it would place us all in a false position.

Mr. Thompson's correspondence with Mr. Greeley.

During the latter part of 1864, a plot was discovered, having for its purpose the burning of Northern cities and the release of rebel prisoners. Several attempts were made to fire New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Cleveland and other large cities. A large number of steamers were destroyed by fire on the Mississippi and Ohio rivers. To trace the guilty parties and expose the conspiracy was a difficult matter. It was generally charged home on the Southern Confederacy, but no positive proof could be secured to convince the public mind that rebel hate could sanction so inhuman a scheme. But we have the truth at last. We now know who the guilty parties were, how well laid the plot was, how devilish the spirit that arranged its details, the headquarters of its agents, and, for the first time, know what a fearful danger we escaped through the vigilance of our government. The report of Jacob Thompson to the Confederate Secretary of War gives a clear insight into the nature of this diabolical plot, and connects the Confederacy, officially, with the most inhuman scheme to plunder and destroy of modern times. There is one feature of this report which will startle the American people, and give them a better idea of the dangerous "eccentricities" of Horace Greeley. The feature we refer to is the correspondence which was being carried on between the head devil of destruction, Jacob Thompson, and the present Democratic candidate for the Presidency, Horace Greeley. Thompson admits this correspondence. It matters little whether Greeley knew the character of the plot on foot or not. The very fact that he could be duped into believing the men engaged in it to be honest men, and actually meet them in secret council to perfect a plan whereby the government would consent to a dishonorable peace, shows the natural weakness of his character, and proves how easily he could be made the victim of designing scoundrels. Here we have the spectacle of a band of em-throats, with headquarters in Canada, deliberately planning the destruction of our cities, not according to the rules of civilized warfare, but according to the manner of the savage, creeping under cover of night or the garb of friendship to murder and destroy, and at the same time in secret correspondence with Horace Greeley, doing to the weak old man what they are now doing, patting him on the back, calling him honest, urging him to betray the Government into their hands under the plea that the time has come for brothers to "clasp hands over the bloody chasm." And he, just as he did in 1864, sheds tears over their repentance, and embracing these very conspirators, says to a loyal nation, "The time has come for these erring brothers to rule the Republic." Thanks to an ever-watchful Providence, the schemes of Greeley and Thompson were defeated and a nation saved from humiliation. The wisdom and patriotism and rare sagacity of Abraham Lincoln stood between the conspirators and the country they sought to betray. The people applauded Lincoln for his courage, and denounced Greeley for his cowardice. Lincoln is dead, but his noble example lives to again save the nation from Greeley's second attempt to betray the Republic. He failed as the secret instrument of the Southern Democracy; he will fail also as its open and proclaimed leader. We offer the hand of friendship to all who love the Union, but are not yet prepared to clasp hands with its enemies.
