One Animal which Barnum could not tame.
Mr. P. T. Barnum, the great showman, after having conquered the most ferocious beasts in the jungles of Africa, and domesticated the most wayward animals from the mountains of Asia, has at last been made to quail like a chirping bird under the quail of the serpent's eye, and this by a mere woman discovered not in any county under a tropical sun, but in the middle of the great city of New York. But this woman is no ordinary adversary. She stands 6 feet 2 1/2 inches in low slippers, and has red hair.

It appears that some time since, Mr. Barnum let the premises on the corner of Crosby and Houston streets to Mrs. Ann Pidgeon. When it came time to collect the rent the fiery tenant refused to pay up, and after much delay, officers were sent with a process from a civil court to dispossess her. The marshals succeeded in entering the place, but no sooner had they declared the house under seizure and left, than Mrs. Pidgeon re-entered it, took an old musket, and threatened to shoot the first person who attempted to enter with "another of them summonses from the court." The showman and his agents had to acknowledge themselves outdone, and for six long months Mrs. Pidgeon has remained safely in her castle without any one daring to interfere from outside.

The case has at length been brought before Justice Fowler of the Third District Court. Mrs. Pidgeon has appeared, and there is hope of a speedy settlement. Judgement has been rendered against the defendant, and Justice Fowler has ordered two of his marshals to serve a writ of ejectment on Mrs. Pidgeon. The marshals expect a lively fracas when they go to carry out the order of the court.

Gen. Washington's Farm.
A Virginia correspondent to the *Country Gentleman* writes as follows: "The farm of Gen. Washington at Mount Vernon, contained in his day ten thousand acres of land in one body—equal to about fifteen square miles. A great portion of it was a vast valley, or basin surrounded by a range of hills; a third of it was a neck of land on the Potomac River, with Little Hunting Creek Bay on the east, and Dogne Creek Bay on the west. These Creeks are navigable for about two and a half miles up from the river channel, and certainly would have afforded the General great facilities, as they now do our farmers, in boating and landing manure or fertilizers on the ground, but it is not probable that the General did anything at this. It was divided into farms or fields of convenient size by deep ditches, which may be traced now, and showing that one of them contained as much as two thousand seven hundred acres. These fields were situated at a distance of two, three and five miles from the mansion house. The walls of a sixteen square barn are now standing, and are quite a curiosity. It is made of brick, and quite large, situated three miles from his residence.

He had two grist mills on the place one ran by water power, having (I judge) a twelve foot wheel, and a race two miles in length; the mills, the foundation walls of which are now standing, was at the head of Dogne Creek Bay, and it is supposed that boats ran right to the mill door. The other mill is said to have been propelled by oxen or horses. The General delighted to visit the farms above spoken of, every day in pleasant weather, and was constantly engaged in making experiments in the improvement of agriculture.

"Some idea of the extent of his farming operations may be formed from the following facts: In 1787 he had five hundred and eighty seven acres in grass, sowing six hundred seven hundred acres of wheat, and

as much more in corn, barley, potatoes, beans, peas, etc., and one hundred and fifty acres with turnips. His stock consisted of one hundred and forty horses, one hundred and twelve cows, two hundred and thirty-six working oxen, heifers and steers, and five hundred sheep. He constantly employed two hundred and fifty hands, and kept twenty-four plows going during the whole year, when the earth and state of the weather would permit. In 1780 he slaughtered one hundred and fifty hogs (I hope not the "Virginia Pine Roosters") for the use of his own family, and provisions for his negroes for whose comfort he had great regard."

"Of the ten thousand acres, but two hundred now belong with the mansion, and the Washington farm has been greatly reduced, but a small portion of this is now cultivated."

Democrats for Free Trade.
It is the duty of every man as an American citizen, to take an interest in the affairs and welfare of his own country; not only this, but to hold his nation's cause as his highest importance; for his own success to a certain extent, depends upon the Administration of his country.
One of the great lines of division between the Republican and Democratic parties is that of "free trade;" and in reference to this question I wish to call the attention of my readers. The establishing of free trade would be giving to other countries just so much advantage over our own; because if foreign goods and articles are allowed to be entered free, foreigners could afford to sell, and would sell so much the cheaper; and would not that naturally discourage home manufacturers? The result would be that home manufacturers would have to fall on their goods and articles in the same proportion, and as prices fell, so would laborers' wages necessarily fall. Would not this render it very oppressive to the poor people who have to get their living by the sweat of their brow? Nor is this all. The amount of Merchandise sent here from other countries would increase, and as that increases so would our home manufactures unquestionably have to decrease in the same ratio. Is it just and proper to give foreign countries advantages over our own? Is it not the duty of every individual to look after his own interests first? Is it not then the duty of the administration to first look after the interests of its own country? Should not the Administration also aim to encourage its own institutions, and at the same time with a view to elevate its poor? "Free trade" is one of the principles of the so-called Democratic party; and if you vote for that party you also vote for its principles.
It may be denied that Greeley is a Democrat. If he is not he unquestionably walks in their ranks, and we must always judge people by the society with whom they associate. Whether he is a Democrat or not, he would prove, if elected, to all intents and purposes, their dear, beloved "tool."
