**One Little Bridgeport Industry.**

With the above, the following from the Indianapolis Journal will also be of interest:

The management of the interest of the celebrated Howe Sewing Machine in this city has recently undergone a change. Mr. A. K. Josselyn, formerly the able and efficient manager of the affairs of the Singer Company in the States of Indiana, Ohio, Illinois and Michigan at this point, has now assumed control of the business of the Howe Machine Company in the territory embracing the greater part of the States of Indiana, Illinois, Michigan and Iowa.

**Sarah Smith's Wooling.**

We have many times seen pieces in which a story is attempted to be told with words commencing altogether with the same letter, but the following, by a correspondent of the New York News, we consider ahead of them all.

Sarah Smith stands sorrowfully; she sees splendid spruces surrounding shady spots; she sees summer's sun shining; she smells sweet savors; sweet songsters singing; silver strains serenade Sarah. Still she sighs. Sunset's soft shades settle silently, still she stands sadly sighing. Suddenly she started. She saw some stranger strolling silently southward. "Stop!" she shouted. "Stop, stranger, Sarah Smith says so." Stately she stood, sternly she shouted, "Stop!" Samuel Slocum, successful statesman, smooth speaker, started, saw Sarah, seemed surprised, said soliloquizingly, "Strange! seemingly scarce sixteen, so sweet, so simple, still so singularly surprised. She seems strangely sad." "Say something sweeter Sarah." She, stopping some silent struggle said: "Surely, some stranger seeing sights; shall Sarah Smith shun such: scarcely." So strolling silently strangerward, she said: "Sarah Smith scorns suspicious scandals, she seeks sympathy: seeks she successfully?"

Still shone some silvery streams slantingly southward. Samuel Slocum sat sweetly smiling. Sarah Smith seated suspiciously somewhere. Sunset's serene splendor suggested supper. Still she sat. She sought sympathy successfully. Supper seemed superfluous.

Some six Sundays succeeding she signed some sketches Sarah Smith Slocum.

**Amnesty.**

The blatant amnesty cry of the Greeleyites is stopped by Grant's early recommendation of it, and its adoption by a Republican Congress. The vindictive and scandalous misrepresentation upon this subject by the nefarious coalition opposed to Grant is completely answered by Grant's own words, in his message sent to Congress in December, 1870. "More than six years have elapsed," he says, "since the last hostile gun was fired between the armies then arrayed against each other, one for the preservation, the other for the destruction of the Union, it may well be considered whether it is not now time that the disabilities imposed by the fourteenth amendment should be removed."

He goes on to argue the question at length, to the shame of the factious disorganizers who are guilty of such gross falsehoods respecting his views.

President Grant, while brave, conquering, and where necessity required it, inflexible in war and in peace, has been so magnanimous as to provoke criticism, and has shown kindness to Southern rebels that ought to crimson the cheeks of those who represent him as relentless and unforgiving. When Lee surrendered his sword, Grant said, "Tell your boys they can take their horses home with them to help them to make their crops."

When it was contemplated under Johnson to try Lee and his fellow officers for treason, Grant said: "Gen. Lee and his officers and troops who have been duly paroled, cannot be tried for treason. I protest against their arrest."

The very men who represent Grant as opposed to amnesty show the hollowness of their pretensions when they support for the Presidency, a man who, on the first of May 1871, said: "When the rebellious traitors are scattered like leaves before an angry wind, it must not be to return to peaceful and contented homes. They must find poverty at their firesides, and see privation in the anxious eyes of mothers and the rags of children."

THE ELECTIONS YESTERDAY.

The elections in the States of Pennsylvania, Indiana and Ohio which were held yesterday, Oct. 8th, had been waited for with a good deal of anxiety by both, or rather all political parties.

All are now waiting impatiently for the results. The local quarrel in Pennsylvania have operated some what against the Republican ticket in that State, and especially against Hartman the Republican nominee for Governor. Col. Forney, and Gov. Curtin have done their utmost to defeat him.

If Hartman is defeated by a few thousand we may reasonably expect that State to give Grant and Wilson a majority in November. We shall not be surprised however, to hear of the election of the whole Republican ticket.

The election in Indiana has of course been a close fight, and we await the result with as much anxiety as we do that of Pennsylvania. We look for a Republican roster's 'crow' however in Indiana.

Ohio has been claimed by the Greeleyites, but if that State has not given from 15,000 to 20,000 Republican majority we shall say so when the figures tell us differently.

The Republican party has always been the true advocate and exponent of liberty, and now is the only party in these United States which bears that character. During the late atrocious rebellion and bloody war it carried 350,000 men to maintain the Union of this country and the Government of these States upon the basis of freedom, for equal, universal rights of mankind, without distinction of race, color or birth.

The Republican party, after it had broken the fetters of 4,000,000 of human beings, did not stop with the noble act, but held the doctrine that noble act and blackest man is the equal of the whitest and richest. It gave to the freedman civil and political rights till now the poor and political rights before the law, is the equal of the former dominant race, William Lloyd Garrison, Gerrit Smith, Wendell Phillips, Frederick Douglass, and the whole body of the "original abolitionists," men ever devoted to the colored man, and so profoundly acquainted with all that concerns their interest, are deeply impressed with a conviction that their lives and fortunes depend on preserving the ascendancy of the Republican party.

Georgia gives the Liberator a bite to "stay their stomachs." We claim all the way from 40,000 to 700,000 Democratic majority. We own 0,000,000 Democratic figure to correspond with some Liberal talk we have heard.

Is Not Afraid.

We really admire Greeley's pluck, a characteristic which, until his course in the present contest, we did not think he possessed. Our opinion, however, is now changed, for...

Indeed, he hesitates not to say that if some people would look at them with the same vision that he does, they would at once discover that the results, as far as they have gone, are in the highest degree indicative (that refreshing greenness) of his ultimate triumph. This certainly appears to us thick-headed, short-sighted Republicanism, a curious, not to say ludicrous, deduction, but when in addition to his pluck, we know that H. G. has been looking through a kaleidoscope all his days, our wonder ceases.

We wait patiently for his report after looking through it in October, and for the last time in November. He need not, however, hurry himself to do so, the people having had some experience in such matters, and therefore, are competent to make one for themselves, which of course will necessarily vary from his.

It is well for those who have not yet commenced their march into the Republican camp, to consider the following opinion of the man who is not afraid by Professor White, of Cornell (N. Y.) University. "Why, he's a failure. He's failed in everything he's done. We sent him to Congress and what did he do? Why he left the grand national issue of freedom and slavery struggle on his hands and folded away his time on a pious one-horse scheme like the mileage question."

He is always penny-wise and pound-foolish. He would hold up a cent before his eyes, and because he could not see the dime of S. Peter, he would eat the world on fire to make the people believe the cent was the biggest. If he was President he would get some two-cent scheme in his head, and let broad questions, on which the happiness and prosperity of the people depend, go to the small dogs who hedge in around the White House. He's a narrow, prejudiced, vacillating, pious man.

Grant and the Ku Klux. President Grant, so far as the law would allow him to go, has interposed between our colored fellow-citizens, and the infamous, merciless, ferocious and brutal Ku Klux assassins.
