BOARD OF SUPERVISORS
OCTOBER MEETING.
Monday, Oct. 16th, 1872.—The
Board of Supervisors for the county
of Kent commenced their annual ses-
sion yesterday afternoon, the 14th
inst.
The meeting was called to order
by County Clerk, Chapman. The fol-
lowing members answered to the
roll call:
Ayers, Ball, Britton, Colton, Cook,
Boons, W. R. Davis, Davis, J. N.
Doekery, Garfield, Hardy, Hatch,
Haynes, Hebard, Hinman, Hunt,
Johnson, Konkle, Mason, McLean,
Myers, Pryce, Simmons, Stinson,
Tucker, M. H. Whitney, Whitney,
W. P. Walker, Wells, Watkins, Wil-
liamson, Wood.

On motion of Mr. Gaines, Mr.
Garfield was chosen temporary chair-
man.
On motion of Mr. Johnson, the
Board proceeded to vote for perma-
nent chairman, and Mr. W. R. Davis
was elected to that position.
On motion of Mr. Cook it was
resolved that the rules governing the
action of the Board last year
should be adopted for the present
year with the single amendment,
(offered by Mr. Whitney) that "when
the yeas and nays are called every
man shall vote unless excused by
the Board."
The following resolution presented
by Mr. Haynes was then adopted:
Resolved, That the Prosecuting At-
torney be and is hereby requested to
report to the Board as soon as possi-
ble as to what action has been taken
since the last session as to the Bridge
Street Bridge question.
On motion of Mr. Myers the Board
adjourned until this morning at ten
o'clock.

Tuesday, Oct. 15.—The Board
met pursuant to adjournment, and a
quorum were found present.
The Prosecuting Attorney appear-
ed and made a verbal report con-
cerning the Bridge Street Bridge
question, which on motion of Mr.
Whitney was accepted.
The chairman announced the fol-
lowing standing committees:
On Finance—Messrs. Haynes, J. N.
Davis and Mr. Johnson.
On Realization—Messrs. Myers,
Hinman, Walker, Wood, Garfield,
Doekery, Ball, Colton and William-
son.
On Claims—Messrs. Simon, Mas-
on, Whitney, Cook and Coon.
On Roads and Bridges—Messrs.
McLean, Hardy, W. P. Whitney,
Watkins and Pryce.
On Public Buildings—Messrs.
Tucker, Wells and Hebard.
On Education—Messrs. Konkle,
Simmons and Myers.
On Drains—Messrs. Hatch, Hunt
and Britton.

The Board now adjourned until 5
o'clock in the afternoon.
MORNING SESSION.
Wednesday Oct. 16.—
The Board met pursuant to ad-
journment and was called to order
by the chairman. On calling the
roll a quorum was found present.
The minutes of Tuesday's proceed-
ings were read and approved.
Several petitions and remonstran-
ces were presented and referred to
appropriate committees.
Mr. J. N. Davis offered the follow-
ing resolution, which was on motion
adopted.

TUESDAY, Oct. 22, 1872.
Board met pursuant to adjourn-
ment, and was called to order by the
chairman.
Roll called; quorum present.
Minutes of yesterday read and ap-
proved.
Petitions from residents in the
towns of Courland, Oakfield, Plain-
field, Grand Rapids and Cannon,
asked that a portion of the Grand
Rapids and Greenville State road be
vacated. On motion the same was
referred to the Committee on roads
and bridges.
The Committee on Claims reported
to the Board several accounts which
were allowed as recommended.
On motion of Mr. W. P. Whitney,
the election of a County Superinten-
dent of the Poor was made the spe-
cial order of business for to-morrow
morning, after the usual order of
business.

On motion, the Committee on Re-
jected Taxes was authorized to com-
municate with the Auditor General
regarding the interest reported back
to this county on the list of rejected
taxes.
On motion of Mr. Stinson, the
Board took a recess until 1 o'clock
this p. m.
Board met and was called to order by
the chairman at one o'clock p. m., when, on mo-
tion the Board took a recess until 5 o'clock p.
m. to enable the members to visit the County
Poor Farm. At 5 o'clock p. m. the chair-
man called the Board together, when, there not be-
ing a quorum present, on motion of Mr. Dock-
ery the Board adjourned until to-morrow
morning at 9 o'clock.

Board met and was called to order by
the chairman at one o'clock p. m., when, on mo-
tion the Board took a recess until 5 o'clock p.
m. to enable the members to visit the County
Poor Farm. At 5 o'clock p. m. the chair-
man called the Board together, when, there not be-
ing a quorum present, on motion of Mr. Dock-
ery the Board adjourned until to-morrow
morning at 9 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. W. P. Whitney,
the report was accepted.
Mr. Davis offered a resolution that
the Supervisors of the towns of Wy-
oming and Georgetown, meet and fix
upon a plan for equalizing the school
tax in fractional Union district No. 1,
of the aforesaid townships.
The resolution was adopted.
The Board now adjourned until 5
o'clock p. m.
AFTERNOON SESSION.
Board met pursuant to adjourn-
ment.
Several accounts were reported by
the Committee on Claims, and cred-
ited by the Board.
The account of James Vander Sit-
is was referred back to the Commit-
tee on Claims, for further investiga-
tion.
On motion the bill of J. Brady,
Coroner, for services rendered, was
laid on the table.
The special committee to whom
was referred the matter of binding
the assessment rolls for the several
wards and towns, presented a re-
port, which on motion of Mr. W. P.
Whitney was accepted and adopted.
The Board adjourned.
Sat. Oct. 19th.—The Board met
pursuant to adjournment, and was
called to order by the chairman.
The minutes of Friday were read
and approved.
A resolution was offered by Mr.
Davis, and accepted, authorizing the
County Treasurer to borrow a sum
of money, in all, not exceeding the
sum of twelve thousand dollars, at
usual rate of interest, for the payment
of orders drawn on him.
Mr. Turner offered a resolution
which, was lost, authorizing the Com-
mittee on Public Buildings to place
such a number of lightning rods on
the jail as might suffice for its protec-
tion, the same to be paid for by a
County order.
After the consideration of a few
minor questions, the Board now ad-
journed, until Monday at 8 p. m.
Monday, Oct. 21.—The Board met
pursuant to adjournment, and was
called to order by the chairman.
On roll call a quorum was found to
be present.
The minutes of Saturday were
read and approved.
Mr. Whitney offered a resolution
that inasmuch as the interests of the
people demanded that every member
of the Board should have a thorough
understanding of the county poor
question, those present should resolve
themselves into a Committee of the
Whole to visit the county poor farm
Tuesday afternoon, and that a com-
mittee of three be appointed by the
chair to make the necessary arrange-
ments to carry out the resolution.
On motion the same was accepted
and adopted, the committee was ap-
pointed, and on motion of Mr. Stin-
son, the Board adjourned until Tues-
day morning at 9 o'clock.

On motion of Mr. Stinson, the
Board took a recess until 1 o'clock
this p. m.
Board met and was called to order by
the chairman at one o'clock p. m., when, on mo-
tion the Board took a recess until 5 o'clock p.
m. to enable the members to visit the County
Poor Farm. At 5 o'clock p. m. the chair-
man called the Board together, when, there not be-
ing a quorum present, on motion of Mr. Dock-
ery the Board adjourned until to-morrow
morning at 9 o'clock.
