THE LEGISLATURE.

The State Legislature met on New Year's day, and a full organization was effected in both houses...

Secretary—James H. Stone of Kalamazoo. Assistant Secretary—Jas. W. Hine of Lowell.

In the House the following were elected officers: Speaker—Chas. M. Crosswell of Adrian.

Clerk—D. L. Crossman of Williamston. Sergeant at Arms—Col. E. M. Fitch of Wayland.

Expanding and Enrolling Clerk—Wm. H. Marston of Branch county. The members and officers of both houses were sworn in on Wednesday...

The Ship Canal. In speaking of this project, the Benton Harbor Palladium says: "The project is certainly worthy of attention, and it is pressed, all possible routes should be carefully surveyed..."

The cost of such a work would necessarily be heavy—much heavier than the \$5,000,000 at which somebody estimated it—but even if it should cost five times that amount, it would be worth it all to the country.

Such a canal ought to be at least twelve feet deep and one hundred feet wide, with locks capable of accommodating vessels of say 1,000 tons. With that canal and one around Niagara Falls of equal capacity on the American side, our lake advantages would be more than doubled.

But the vast and rapidly increasing freight business of the great west calls for increasing facilities for the transportation of grain to market. The combinations among the railroads, the exorbitant rates of freight, and the fact that the facilities of water transportation not only desirable, but actually a necessity.

The new water works of Bay City were called upon to put out a fire for the first time on Monday night, and the citizens are jubilant over the success of the works.

The Saginaw Enterprise says: We know of a certain piece of pine land which was bought by a firm in this city for \$2,900. The first winter they cut from the land 1,600,000 feet of lumber...

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These and other considerations make the canal a matter of national importance. We trust that our Senators and Members of Congress will see to it that the attention of the National Legislature is drawn to this subject, and that an early law steps be taken to survey the route, and estimate its cost.

A Saginaw paper says: A deputy postmaster weighing twelve pounds, arrived in East Saginaw on Monday morning, and Col. Lockley is correspondingly happy.

End of the Stokes Trial.

The second trial of Stokes came to an end Saturday. The jury returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. The Detroit Tribune says: "With this verdict the long-expected case of every unprejudiced man will close."

The facts of the case have been given wide publicity, and have been stated fairly without bias for or against the accused. These facts leave no room for doubt that the murder of Fisk was deliberate and premeditated.

The end of the case, however, has not yet been reached. Under the exceptions which Stokes' counsel have taken care to accumulate, a new trial will be asked for, and it is denied by Judge Boardman, as is probably an appeal will undoubtedly be taken to the Supreme Court.

Should Stokes go untried, the result would be a practical encouragement to murder.

The Grand Rapids Eagle says that a lady of that city has sent Queen Victoria a twenty pound turban.

The proposition to vote \$100,000 to build a new court house and jail is soon to be submitted to the electors of Lenawee county.

The Ladies' Library Association of Kalamazoo, have over 200 members, \$2000 worth of paintings, 2,700 volumes of choice books, and are exceedingly prosperous.

The sudden death in New York city of Dr. Harvey M. Greene, of Grand Rapids, seems to be still invalidly considerable mystery.
