## Highlights of '61

Progress, prosperity and promotion have been the big issues on the head lines of the Suburban Life for the past year.

"Progress" in industry was achieved when the PneumoDynamics Corporation of Cleveland, Ohio held a groundbreaking ceremony in Cascade for their new plant to be constructed in the very near future.

In the field of education, progress was also attained when the Forest Hills High School became an accredited school through the University of Michigan. A big step that was made possible thru a lot of hard work by the school officials, parents, teachers and students.

"Promotion" has been the big topic with the businessmen of the area to get the people to shop in their own community, and support community affairs. The CBA (Cascade Businessmen's Association) launched a rocket to start a string of activities, followed by the appearance of Santa Claus arriving in a helicopter.

Ada Businessmen capitalized on a 4th of July celebration which brought thousands of people to the community to witness the annual soap box derby, the water battle between the Cascade and Ada fire

departments, and the annual display of fire works.

The Forest Hills football team, undergoing its second year in league competition, brought home the championship this year in the Ottawa-Kent Conference. A roster of 104 teachers were hired to teach the some 2,400 students enrolled for the ensuing school year at Forest Hills.

Sy Dykhouse elected the new president of the Booster's Club.


John Brunsink, Cascade Lumber dealer, passed unexpectedly.

## Haiti Remembers First Day of 1804; Independence Day

January 1 is more than New Year's Day for Haiti; it is also independence day. On the first day of January, 1804, Jean Jacques Dessalines declared the island's freedom from France, making Haiti the second nation of the Western hemisphere to win independence.

Independence and adoption of the Indian name of "Haiti" came after a bitter two-year revolt led against the French initiated by a former slave, Toussaint L'Ouverture. A man of great ability, L'Ouverture rose from slavery to the colonial governorship and to great fame as a soldier and statesman. He called the island's first constitutional assembly and organized an army of slaves in defiance of the mighty Napoleon.

Bonaparte sent an expedition of 70 warships and 25,000 men to Haiti. L'Ouverture was captured and sent to a French prison and the revolt seemed to be ended. But, while L'Ouverture sickened and died in prison, Dessalines rallied the people of Haiti and the French forces were defeated by November, 1803.

## January First Has Long Been Interesting Day

The first day of the New Year is a time for looking ahead, for making plans, for hope and optimism. But it is also a time when most of us look back, with fond memories to days of yesterday.

With each New Year, we are conscious that time does not wait and that each new day is soon a part of history.

Looking back through the pages of time, we find that many interesting events have taken place on January 1. It was, for instance, the birthday of Betsy Ross (1752), Paul Revere (1735), and Philip Freneau (1752).

The first practical fire engine was tested Jan. 1, 1852. President Abraham Lincoln issued the Emancipation Proclamation on the first day of the year 1863. The famous Tournament of Roses began Jan. 1, 1889.

The USSR was formed Jan. 1, 1923; U. S. parcel post service was inaugurated Jan. 1, 1913. On the first day of the year 1934, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation was inaugurated and the Bank Guaranty Act became effective.

The United Nations Declaration was signed Jan. 1, 1942; the U. S. Strategic Air Forces in Europe was formed Jan. 1, 1944 and Japan's Emperor Hirohito disavowed divinity, Jan. 1, 1946.

## Colds Lead Ten To One in Sickness

The cold is the most common illness of both child and adult. Your child will probably have almost 10 times as many colds as all other illnesses combined, it was pointed out by Dr. W. B. Prothro, City-County Health Officer.

At present, there is no known way to eliminate colds entirely. But you can help lessen the frequency and severity of colds in your own children by following a few simple rules.

Keep another child who has a cold away from your children as much as possible, indoors and out. If one of your children has a cold, isolate him as best you can—in a separate room if possible. Avoid common drinking glasses, towels, etc. Remember that when an infected person coughs or sneezes without covering nose and mouth, he can spread infection within a radius of 12 feet. Try to avoid breathing directly into a baby's face.

Resistance can be lowered by poor diet. Growing children should receive added vitamins to be sure that they get sufficient amounts, especially of Vitamin A and Vitamin C.

Excessive fatigue can lower resistance. See that your child gets sufficient sleep and rest.

It is also recognized that a nervous, insecure child, who perhaps lives in a tense home environment, will have a lower resistance to colds.

Sudden temperature drops, rain or snow may chill the body of your child and lower his resistance.

Don't over bundle your child. Clothing should be ample, but not stifling. Don't closet your child at home in the hope this will prevent colds. He should be acclimated to the different types of weather at the proper age and should get normal outdoor exercise.

Sufficient moisture in a heated room during fall, winter, and spring is important. Drying out the mucous membranes of the nose and throat may lower resistance to germs. The simplest way to assure that your house or apartment has sufficient humidity is to keep pans of water on or behind the radiator or to use a humidifier. Avoid drafts directly on the child.

Although there is no known substance that will immunize your child to colds, there are injections that may prevent or lessen possible complications, such as sinusitis, ear trouble and asthma. Consult your physician about these. Always consult your physician when your baby has his first cold. Call him if your child shows symptoms, if the cold is severe, if the fever elevates over 100 degrees rectally, if your child has a chronic cough or if the cold hangs on.

Place Braves; and 5th Place, Lancers.



## CONSERVATION HI-LITES IN 1961

The year 1961, like others before it was punctuated with advances and setbacks, old problems and new hopes in conservation: 1) more than ever before, the need was felt for clear-cut legal controls over shoreline fills and other man-made developments in the state's waters to account for a growing population's total demands; 2) parks construction work and lands purchases were started under the opening \$2 million phase of a \$5 million permit-bonding program to provide new facilities and added space for more recreationists; 3) antlerless deer seasons were abandoned for the first time since 1955, except in two small areas, but hunters found their buck kill much improved from the year before. An estimated 57,000 bucks were taken, some 10,000 over 1960; 4) hopes of bettering last year's record season in forest fire control went up in smoke as some 8,000 acres burned, about 5,000 more than the 1960 toll; 5) a call for stepped-up efforts in community conservation work drew good response as scores of local groups pitched in with their time, money, and muscle on various game, fish, and recreation projects.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation

Utilizing recently completed four-lane highways in Alabama, the route cuts several hours travel time from the previously recommended western route. In all, some 375,000 Michigan resident are expected to motor to Florida next year.

A variation on a popular non-mountainous route to Florida is giving Michigan motorists a new choice of accesses to the south.

Recently completed construction of additional four-lane highway in Alabama is cutting travel time from Michigan to Florida by several hours, reports Jerry E. Fisher.

The newly recommended route, 1590 miles in length, follows US-31 south of Nashville, Tenn. It travels through Birmingham and Montgomery, Ala., before joining US-231 into Dothan, Ala., and US-90 into Tallahassee in Western Florida. More than 800 miles of the route is four-lane highway or better with \$3 toll fees being required.

Estimated travel time on this route is now 40 hours behind the wheel, making it about the same as other routes.

Comparative distances of other routes from Michigan to Florida include: Rte. to Miami via West Virginia Turnpike, driving distance of 1439 miles, 640 miles of four-lane & Turnpike mileage with a toll of \$4.35;

Rte. to Miami via Knoxville, with a driving distance of 1472 miles, 598 mi. of four-lane & Turnpike mileage, and a toll of \$2.40;

Rte. to Miami via Columbus-Tallahassee, driving distance of 1607 miles, 488 mi. four-lane & Turnpike mileage with a toll of \$3.00.

Rte. to Miami via Ohio-Pennsylvania Turnpikes, 1629 mi. driving distance, 959 mi. of four-lane & Turnpike mileage, toll of \$7.30.

In all, some 375,000 Michigan residents are expected to visit Florida in 1962.

They will find little difference in rates for accommodations on the way to Florida. Rates in the Sunshine State have fallen slightly. According to an Auto Club survey, a typical comparison taken in Knoxville, Tenn., shows good motel rooms were renting from \$7.83 to \$10.03 in 1960. This year, comparable rates will be from \$8.04 to \$10.26.

Speed traps and overzealous enforcement areas are being eliminated in Kentucky, Georgia, and Florida, formerly noted for preying on out of state drivers.

However, speed laws are still strictly enforced, particularly in Virginia, North Carolina, Florida, and Georgia. Florida is strict in school zones and, in some communities, motorists traveling only a mile or two over the 15-mile-per-hour limit are likely to be ticketed.

Inside Florida, travelers will find a noticeable increase in the number of family-type accommodations. Entire communities of homes which may be purchased for eventual retirement or rented for short stays are becoming more prevalent. In the Miami area, apartments are going up at a fast rate while the number of luxury hotels and motels have not grown from over last year's total.
