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
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Meet Your Neighbor "Bill" Seidman of Ada, Republican Auditor Gen. Candidate

A man who would rather do something constructive about a situation than complain about it has his eyes set on one of the state's most important public offices. He's L. William Seidman, Buttrick Avenue, Ada, one of the "smart young men" on the Republican Party's team selected to run with George Romney in the November 6 election.



Seidman, a political unknown until the Fall GOP state convention in Detroit, is running for the job of auditor general.

As a general partner of a national accounting firm, the 41-year-old Grand Rapids native says in his many travels around the country he is "tired of apologizing for the mess of the State of Michigan in these days."

Seidman (pronounced SEED-MAN) claims "I'm tired of trying to explain Michigan's financial mess outside the state. I decided instead of just complaining I'd try to do something about it."

Seidman feels strongly that the auditor general of a state ought to know the auditing business. "It's a trained profession—the same as law, medicine, teaching." And Seidman's background more than qualifies him for the spot.

Add to more than 13 years of experience in the mysterious, complex world of figures, recognition as an authority by magazines, and universities, plus a reputation for accomplishing what he goes after and you have one of the most respected men in his field.

"I've been working in finance and taxation since getting out of school," says Seidman, a graduate of East Grand Rapids High School, Dartmouth College Business School, Harvard Law School and the University of Michigan Business School.

When he received his Certified Public Accountant Certificate from the State of Michigan in 1953, he won the Economics Award for attaining the highest standing in the subject of "economics and public finance" in the certified public accounting examination. And at Dartmouth, he was a Phi Beta Kappa.

What Do You Know About Your Govt.?

Are we responsible for the kind of officials we elect to office? Should we assume our own local responsibilities or let the government do it for us? Does it really pay to bother to vote or is everything cut and dried beforehand?

Who are our most important local government officials?

He also holds CPA certificates from eleven (11) states and also has passed the Michigan Bar Examination.

Seidman firmly believes he has a sound approach for curing Michigan's tangled financial ills.

Because he recognizes that the auditor general's primary responsibility is auditing the state's financial condition, he would institute a two-fold program:

1. Performance auditing—evaluating returns gotten for money spent, the primary objective being to cut red tape, cut costs and increase efficiency.

2. Action reporting—objective to bring to attention of Legislature and governor situations and things that should be corrected.

On taxes, Seidman believes "we must have a program attractive to industry, competitive with other states."

"We have to create an atmosphere that attracts business, and that atmosphere can best be generated by a Republican administration."

Expressing great faith in Romney, Seidman is convinced the gubernatorial candidate can do something worthwhile for Michigan. And Romney feels Seidman will be good for Michigan.

If elected, Romney intends to delegate authority to responsible men in the same fashion he awarded it when he was managing American Motors Corporation. Seidman will assume responsibilities similar to those of a financial vice-president in an industrial firm according to the Romney plan.

A man who has an ambition to get things done, Seidman is recognized as the person responsible for establishing the new 4-year Grand Valley State College in Grand Rapids.

While many admitted there was a need for a four-year college in Western Michigan, but said it couldn't be done, Seidman provided the necessary leadership to make Grand Valley State College a reality.

Seidman is proud of the one and a half million dollars that was raised and that ground has been broken for the first building. The college will be open in 1963. He serves as chairman of the board of control of the state-supported liberal arts college.

An avid athlete, Seidman has won state honors for tennis, which he still finds time to play, as well as polo. A skier, also, he organized, financed and developed a non-profit community ski club, Thornapple Slopes, Inc., on his property in Ada.

If an attractive, vivacious wife is an asset to a man running for public office, particularly if she's a successful politician herself, Seidman is well on his way to becoming Michigan's next auditor general.

Looking ahead to November 6, Seidman chuckles when he says "we already have one successful politician in the family."

His wife, Sally, a former University of Michigan beauty queen, won a spot on the Forest Hills School board by a vote of 443-442. They are parents of five children between the ages of 13 and 4: Berry, Tracy, Sarah, Nancy and Margaret.

Long active in the development of recreation programs for youth in the Grand Rapids area, Seidman serves as president of the Grand Rapids Youth Commonwealth and is trustee of the Thomas Erler Seidman Foundation, which finances the Seidman Youth Center.

In addition, he is a board member of Blodgett Memorial Hospital, Michigan Coordinating Council for Public Higher Education, member of the Michigan State Chamber of Commerce's State Taxation Committee, past board member of the Grand Rapids Child Guidance Clinic, Grand Rapids Council on World Affairs, Family Service Association, Michigan Veteran's Vocational School and the Grand Rapids Art Gallery.

He has won the Rotary Community Service Award in recognition of work towards establishment of Grand Valley State College, and is affiliated with Michigan Bar Association, American Bar Association, Michigan Association of Certified Public Accountants and American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

As a board member of West Michigan Telecasters, Inc., Seidman is working towards the establishment of a new television channel in the Grand Rapids area.

During World War II Seidman served as a communications officer with the U. S. Navy on a destroyer, participating in the invasions of Saipan, Iwo Jima, the Philippines and Okinawa.

He was awarded 11 battle stars and received the bronze star for outstanding performance during 3 major amphibious assaults. He was released from duty with the rank of lieutenant.

The driving permit of Orrie Vander Boon, 35, 1780 Grand River Drive, Ada was suspended by the Michigan Secretary of State, from September 10 to October 10, for unsafe driving record.

Not too many years ago the Cascade Fire Department wanted to have an emergency car equipped with rescue equipment. Some folks thought it would be an unnecessary expense, but some of the men were thoroughly convinced that it could well be a real life saving unit, and in 1956, began making plans of how they could raise the money to buy such equipment.

The Mills Brothers Circus was brought into Cascade by the Fire Department, as a money-maker, and with the money they made bought some rescue equipment—portable lighting generator, chain saw, flood lights, and a portable hydraulic rescue set.

The Girl Scout Troop of Cascade joined in the efforts of the Fire Department and donated an oxygen inhalator set. The Sheriff's Department was in favor of the project and donated an old ambulance, which was once owned by the Berton Spring Funeral Home.

Finally the hopes of the firemen became a reality and the men became interested in qualifying themselves to use this equipment to their best advantage. First Aid was a popular subject with these interested firemen and they have come to be known as the best First Aid group in the county.

Three of these men have become instructors in teaching First Aid—George Strain, Frank Atherton, and Grover Buttrick—and have received letters of commendation from the Sheriff's Department. Many others hold cards in advanced first aid.

All the men in the fire department are "tops" with the Sheriff's Department. You may recall some whose lives were undoubtedly saved because of the efficiency of the men and their use of the equipment. The "meat wagon" (as it is jokingly called) was summoned for Mark Cheyne, who was a near drowning victim; Harold Meines, who suffered a heart attack; Jake Moerdyke, also a heart patient; Maurice Cunningham, who has had oxygen administered by the firemen several times for a heart condition; Bill Adriane, who witnesses today that "the emergency wagon probably saved my life". Then there was a truck driver who fell asleep while driving on the freeway; his cab was so badly crushed he was pinned in, and the fire department used their portable hydraulic jack to pry the cab apart to rescue the injured driver.

There are probably many more besides those brought to mind by the Fire Chief, Sy Dykhouse, but without a doubt, we in the community owe the men a debt of gratitude for working to get this equipment and for the time volunteered to receive training to be ready in any case of emergency.

The Fire Department has been "on the spot" to rescue cats, dogs, (a St. Bernard off the ice in the river) a deer, who was unable to get out of icy waters—all this is volunteer work.

This equipment and service is also available to surrounding areas, when, by mutual agreement, the occasion demands further assistance. The Cascade Fire Department meets the first and third Monday nights of each month—their call is the siren atop the fire house at 8 p. m. The second Monday night of each month the Tri-County Fire Meeting is usually attended by some of the Cascade volunteers. At these meetings the men are schooled on fire fighting, first aid, traffic regulations and control, and some have attended Fire College at regional fire schools from the University of Michigan.

Two fire trucks are now equipped with two-way radios and ten monitors; have been ordered to be placed in firemen's homes in strategic areas.

Let us cooperate with these volunteers in practicing fire and driving safety. Let's be sure, when we burn our trash and leaves, we use precautions by burning when there is no wind, (usually in the evening) and make sure our burner isn't near an area that could easily start a grass fire.

Prepare a safe place for your household trash burning. Even grass fires can be the cause of further disaster—like the time Paul Slater, a volunteer, was accidentally run over by a fire truck while fighting a grass fire.

Open house will be held at the Cascade Fire Station on Saturday afternoon, October 13, in recognition of Fire Prevention Week. Let us give these men a big vote of thanks for their volunteered time and efforts, and when we hear the fire siren in our community, we should all be reminded to be thankful!
