Copper Items Unique Hobby

Almost everyone has a hobby these days—it is recommended for a happy, well-rounded life, and has, a little bit different story than another, and they are all interesting in their own way.

A well-known gentleman in the Cascade area prompted a beginning to some of the stories that will follow in the Suburban Life.

Hugh Slater is that gentleman, and he has a hobby with an interesting story, making things from copper.

"Copper came into my life often and in various forms—the copper boiler used by my mother in washing, the tea kettle on the stove, the large sap pan in which maple syrup and sugar was made.

"All through my school days I met copper at every turn. History has much on copper. Geology would lack most of the green color without it. On the farm, when I was a boy, it was used as copper sulphate around horses and cattle.

"My interest grew and when I needed a small copper dish for tests of gasoline and anti-freeze, my interest increased. My neighbors told me of a Mr. Dexter, in the Grand Rapids school system, that taught a class in copper work. I joined one of his classes and got started in making objects out of copper. My real work started in a class at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, in a class of Art Metal.

"Since I retired from teaching I have carried on my study of copper work. It is a real hobby for me. I use the objects I make for gifts—copper bowls—and I sell enough of them to pay for my materials.

"Lately I have worked with salvage copper—old wash boilers, copper pipe, tubs from old washing machines. I find copper dishes and ornaments have been used even in pre-historic times. It is one of the oldest of the mechanical arts. It is a skill that requires very few tools—a piece of copper, a hammer, and a block of wood with a hole in it.

"I have tried many kinds of waxes, shellacs, etc., for a protective coating. The best I have found so far is an Epoxie coat. The only drawback, the Epoxie is hard to handle and almost impossible to get in small quantities.

Mr. Slater added that all of his products are originals, and from the conversation we might conclude that both the receiver and giver is pleased. Mr. Slater, who lives at 671-28th Street, S. E., finds his hobby both profitable and rewarding.

Mr. Webster says that a hobby is "an occupation of interest to which one gives his spare time." Perhaps many once-pursued hobbies have given away to the T. V. Perhaps the variety of hobbies presented each week will restore and promote some interesting hobby—it's good for you and interesting to others.


