## Turn on Your Lights

"Don't go roamin' in the gloamin' with your parking lights on," is the admonition of the State Safety Commission to fall and winter drivers. A law passed in 1961 specifies that when it is dark enough to turn on lights they must be the regular driving lights. The dim and often obscure bulbs provided for parking lights do nothing for the motorist's own visual alertness and provide uncertain warning for other motorists and pedestrians alike.

The parking light is usually located closer to the dust and mud of the highway and the least likely to receive attention either from the driver or serviceman. The parking light is deliberately made low powered to conserve battery energy. This modest gleam, seen through layers of road grime in the twilight, frequently deceives the passing motorist or crossing pedestrian as to its distance and his percentage of making good on the next move.

Early evening bicycles are a special danger this time of year. Parents should insist that their children know elementary traffic laws before the bike is bought. Most towns and cities have bicycle ordinances which require that bikes be licensed just like Dad's car. This is good because it helps son or daughter to regard it as a vehicle—which it is under state law.

Lights and reflectors are a must in twilight and dark. Unless it is necessary, cycling in the dark is a dubious activity. There is no armor around a cyclist or a pedestrian. In any contact with an automobile it is no secret who gets the biggest bump.

Scouting out of driveways and parking areas and free coasting on down hill streets are a sure way to head for trouble. Even in good daylight the pedaler must be alert to things on all sides, stay as far to the right as possible while still being wary of persons emerging from the driver's side of parked cars.

Motorists should be prepared for the hundreds of young two-wheelers who ride to and from school everyday saving the taxpayers the cost of school buses and helping to keep physically fit. But parents should also share the responsibility for seeing that their young charges know and obey the common rules for safety.







### Outdoor Survival Kit



The items laid out above may not look very important, but they could help save your life if you became lost in the wilds of northern Michigan during this time of the year. Except for the knife and rifle, these articles can be packed into a snug, easy-to-carry kit (right photo) weighing only about 1½ pounds. Included as basic survival equipment are a compass, stick matches in a waterproof container, a small tin or aluminum pot, a strong-backed belt knife, a few packets of dehydrated soup or potatoes, a spoon, 40-50 feet of eighth-inch nylon line, an extra pair of wool socks, and a 10 X 10 foot piece of four-mil polyethylene. This light, flimsy plastic material can be used to make a small tent or windbreak. There is, of course, more to surviving in the woods than just having these things handy. The best survival kit a man can take afield is carried in his head; the lost outdoorsman who thinks his way out of a situation is the one who will survive. The person who panics and over-exerts himself is his own worst enemy.



## Young Drivers Like Fast Roads

High-speed superhighways have been used by more than half (55 per cent) of American drivers, and they are most popular with the young, University of Michigan research indicates.

Almost half of superhighway drivers travel at speeds between 60 and 69 miles per hour, according to answers received in the U-M Survey Research Center's 1961-62 national travel market survey.

About one-third of drivers mentioned speeds in the 70's, while one driver in 10 reported driving at posted speed limits. Few people mentioned speeds over 80 or below 50 miles per hour.

Only one out of four drivers aged 65 or over has driven on one of the new roads, SRC researchers Dr. John B. Lansing and William Ladd explain in their interim report on the study. Two-thirds of drivers under 45 have driven on a superhighway.

Enjoyment of speed falls off

with age, the SRC analysts point out. Half of the youngest group of drivers like to drive fast, but in the 65 and over age group, four times as many drivers say they do not like to drive fast—which may explain why older people stay off the "high speed" superhighways.

What people have to say about speed on the highway is closely related to the speed at which they report they drive, the survey revealed. The overwhelming majority of those who report that their usual speed is between 50 and 59 say they don't like to drive fast. Those who drive in the 60's apparently also think of themselves as not driving fast, since most of them report that they don't like fast speeds. Those who drive in the 70's and 80's, however, report that they like speed.




