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## Letter to Editor Board Member Replies To Letter

Open letter to James Banta  
Dear Mr. Banta:

After reading your letter in the March 8th issue of Suburban Life, I feel I should write you this letter. I cannot answer some of the questions you directed to Mr. Baker for his part on the Aeronautics Board, however, I will explain the facts on the Airport Annexation as I viewed them.

As a matter of review, members of the aeronautics board and officials of the Chamber of Commerce, approached our township board, in mid-November, with a proposal regarding the transfer of a parcel of airport property from the Township of Cascade to the City of Grand Rapids by joint resolution. This parcel would encompass the administration area, parking lot and the proposed motel site.

In the nearly three months following the initial proposal many meetings were held, our attorney was consulted many times, and many pieces of correspondence were received both pro and con.

On February 6, 1963 the county board of Supervisors, representing the County of Kent, the legal titleholder of the property, voted to request the transfer of the above mentioned property to the City of Grand Rapids, via the for-mentioned joint resolution system.

Following a thorough study of the resolution by Walter B. Freihofer, the township's legal counsel, and guided by the opinion of Mr. Freihofer that beyond a reasonable doubt the entire airport property could be annexed without the consent of Cascade Township through existing legal annexation procedure, the township board, by a vote of 3 to 2 passed on the county request.

I voted in the affirmative because I believe the township board is obligated to preserve as much

tax base as possible for as long as possible.

I also believe the county airport belongs to all the people of Kent County in as much as they are paying much of the cost of the facility and the good credit of the entire county will be used in securing financing through the sale of revenue bonds for the construction of many buildings on the area.

I do not believe Cascade township is really "dry" or has been, for as I recollect there has been at least one establishment selling alcoholic beverages in this township since soon after the repeal of prohibition, and I personally feel as far as alcoholic beverages are concerned, be it beer, wine or whiskey, the misuse of any one will produce the same results.

My thoughts may not concur with your thinking, however I hope this letter brings you up to date, also I feel you should know how I voted on this issue, and my reasons.

The answer to the first question is no. NO COMMITMENTS were made to any operator at any time until the final approval of this transfer had been given by the three governmental governing bodies. You ask why this question was not presented to the people for a vote. Mr. Banta, we are governed by the laws of the State of Michigan. We followed the law as it is written in the statutes.

You are a member of the Forest Hill School Board. Last summer when you decided to curtail the bus transportation for the school children, a hue and cry was raised from every part of the school district. Many meetings were held with very unhappy and worried parents. Did you give the people of the district a chance to vote on this question? Why not?

Mr. Banta why was it necessary for you to misquote me. I did not say that the area would be annexed to Grand Rapids if the township board did not acquiesce to their demands. I do not like to repeat but the quote was "that the city could probably annex the entire airport through regular annexation proceedings". This was borne out by the recent vote, whereby Paris Township has lost their township hall, fire station and a large commercial shopping area. Again you were out of order when you stated that I had written that there was no opposition in the township to annexation. If I had made this statement, it would have been incorrect. The statement I made was (check the records) "At no time was any pressure applied to the township board, and when the decision was finally made, objections came only from people outside the Township of Cascade".

Mr. Banta, you are a businessman and hold an important public office, why should you stoop to such tactics. I cannot understand your intense interest at this time, you never entered a protest or appeared before the board before a decision was made.

Mr. Banta, if you are familiar with parliamentary procedures you should know, that with any roll call at any governing body meeting, the MEMBERS are polled first and the chairman votes last, not to break a tie, but to place the votes of ALL members on record. For your information I would like to call your attention to the fact that every vote cast by me at the Board of Supervisors meetings pertaining to this annexation, was with the approval and full knowledge of the Cascade Township Board. It was not MY vote but OUR vote. I would also call your attention to the fact that when you criticize me you are criticizing your entire township board.

Our township board is elected, and operates on the same high standards as the school board and all of our acts and actions are in the open and our records are available to anyone.

I did not intend to be sarcastic in this reply to your letter but I feel that as from one public official to another, more good can come from consultation, than defamation.

I hope I have answered your questions. If you have any further questions (sincere questions), I am sure you will not object to ask them at any time. My office is always open to you. If, however, you prefer to question my motives or integrity publicly, I will admit that I cannot try to dispute every accusation or suspicion that is cast, due to lack of time and information as to just what is being said.


## Hold Seminar On Church Ushering

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**Letter to Editor Stands Back Of Supervisor Baker**

Editor Suburban Life Lowell, Michigan Dear Sir:

I wish you would publish the following letter in rebuttal to Mr. Banta's, "Open Letter to Gerrit Baker" as appeared in Suburban Life, March 7, 1963.

I, as a taxpayer, homeowner and businessman of Cascade township, am getting just a little sick and tired of certain citizens of this township, who, whenever something they dislike is voted on either for or against in this township, take a personal swing at our township supervisor, Gerrit Baker. Willow tops have turned a soft golden yellow, making the weeping willow a bright shower.


Apple trees are showing a deeper pink in their young branches. Some are bronzy, some on close examination look more orange, but the general glow is pink.
