## Annual Meeting Of Thornapple Assoc.

The Annual Meeting of the Thornapple Association was held in the Cascade Township Hall on Tuesday, April 30.

Three of the previously elected trustees—Russell W. Case, John Schermerhorn, and Harvey Cormie—were designated to maintain their office for the ensuing year. Messrs. Peter Price, Fred Brunger and James R. Thomas were elected as trustees for two-year terms.

Reports of the past year's operations were given by the following committee chairmen: L. D. Thompson, Chairman of the Membership Committee, reported 119 memberships out of a total of approximately 155 eligible property owners between the Ada and Cascade Dams. James Thomas reported the result of a pollution test conducted in cooperation with the Kent County and State Health Departments. In addition, Mr. Thomas reported the successful use of a chemical for weed control purposes and advised that his committee would assist any interested property owner to obtain same under a group purchase plan worked out with the Wolverine Chemical Co. Interested parties may contact Mr. Thomas at 7115 Gladys Drive S. E. or by telephone, OR 6-5621. Safety and navigation activities were covered by Fred Brunger, who advised that the river channel would again be marked, and that his committee was mailing all members a copy of the State and Federal Regulations pertaining to boat operations.

Richard Simkins, Chairman of the Social Committee, represented by Bill Stellan, reported the success of the 1962 Fourth of July River Parade and advised of plans for a larger participation in 1963. Bernard Napier, 7333 Grachen Drive S. E., has accepted the chairmanship of the Conservation Committee and is planning in cooperation with Ward Geib to make the valley more attractive to water wild fowl and other wild life. Russell Case, Chairman of the Fact Finding Committee, reported that this group's activities have been concentrating on the threatened water divergence, which matter was covered in a recent special meeting attended by Ed McCobb of McCobb & Heaney, attorneys who have been employed by the Association to establish the legal position of river-front property owners.

Daniel Wallace reported as chairman of the Public Relations and Publicity Committee.

At a subsequent meeting of the trustees, the following officers were designated to hold office for the coming year—Harvey R. Cormie, President; Peter Price, Vice-President; and John Schermerhorn, Secretary and Treasurer.





Several hundred senior teacher education students at Western Michigan University are "trying their wings" in the classroom this spring as they engage in their practice teaching work.

### Sacrament of Confirmation Administered To Youth

Babcock, Bishop of the Grand Rapids Diocese, assisted by Reverend Donald Farrell, pastor of the two parishes, and several other priests, administered the Sacrament of Confirmation to these young people.

The present-day meaning of Confirmation, which means to strengthen, is to make the person being confirmed a true soldier of Christ. Confirmation is administered to each person individually by the Bishop, after a period of group questioning and instruction. Each person kneels at the Altar rail, and the Bishop prays that the

Holy Ghost will descend upon the confirmees. He traces the sign of the cross upon each person's forehead, which is symbolic of Christianity, and then gives them a slight tap on the cheek. This is to remind them that their faith is being strengthened even to the point of suffering to defend it if necessary. Each person chooses a sponsor, who stands behind him during the ceremony, and whose duty is to take a spiritual interest in the child he is sponsoring.

The music for this occasion was sung by the Senior Choir under the direction of Raymond Moore, with Mrs. George Grochowalski as organist. After the ceremonies, the ladies of the Guild, with Mrs. Robert Krueger as chairman, served a dinner to the Bishop and visiting clergy.

### Careless Dish Washing Danger To Family Health

Washing dishes by hand is a continuing, day-to-day chore that doesn't measure up to the high sanitation standards of automatic dishwashers, warns the Department of Microbiology at the University of Louisville's School of Medicine.

These remarks are based on the results of a three-year study by the school of Medicine in which dishes and utensils washed by hand were compared with those washed by automatic electric dishwashers.

The two most startling and important facts uncovered by the study are:

1. When using the testing methods prescribed by the American Health Association, dishes and utensils washed by hand often had more germs and viruses on them than those washed in an automatic dishwasher. Approximate average bacteria counts were as follows:

Hand Washed	390
Public Health Standard 100 Automatic Dishwasher	5

2. Some 74 percent of dishes and utensils washed in an automatic electric dishwasher gave a bacteria count of zero. The remaining 26 percent were cleaner than public health standards require.

The School of Medicine points out:

"The commonplace food utensils used day after day in millions of homes throughout the world, is one potential carrier of many infectious diseases— which may be spread by the careless performance of one of the most humdrum and seemingly harmless domestic chores—dishwashing.

"Dishes, glasses, knives, and forks which appear to be sparkling clean may still contain bacteria and viruses which can spoil food or cause diseases.

"Thus, the sanitizing of food utensils after every meal to eliminate both food spoilage germs and disease producing germs is of vital concern to every homemaker."

To test automatic electric dishwashers, the School of Medicine placed dishwashers in similar homes to determine their effectiveness in killing bacteria and viruses.

The study showed that hand dishwashing results vary widely. Automatic dishwashing, however, assured consistent sanitization of dishes far better than public health standards suggest.

The sanitizing effectiveness of an automatic dishwasher results from dilutions of hot water—hotter than human hands can stand and a dishwasher's ability to use stronger detergents.

"As a result of findings, the University of Louisville study points out, we now have adequate scientific data to recommend the use of — electric dishwashers in the home to help insure against potential health hazards due to improperly washed dishes."

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


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## -Sports-

## Water Safety Week Points Out Risks

The State Police are observing Michigan Water Safety Week May 12-18 with a special emphasis program but water safety is one of their problems throughout the year, according to Sgt. Oscar Bergland, commanding officer of the Rockford Post.

"Water Safety Week, proclaimed by Governor Romney, marks the beginning of the season of the greatest activity in water sports and the accident toll multiplies," Sgt. Bergland said.

"But the same causes that increase the toll are the same ones that account for water fatalities and injuries the remainder of the year. And nearly all of the causes boil down into one—taking risks. The sorry part is that you don't have to take risks to enjoy water sports fully."

Among the common causes of accidents are swimming alone and swimming in unauthorized waters such as gravel pits; failure to provide life preservers on boats; reckless operation of motor boats; failure of water skiers to wear life belts, and failure to properly supervise small children playing in or near water.

The annual water accident summary, compiled by the State Police from reports submitted by all police agencies, shows that in 1962 there were 209 fatal accidents, 236 persons were drowned and 191 were injured. Twenty-four children under the age of 10 lost their lives by falling into the water from a bridge, bank, dock or in some other manner.

Sgt. Bergland pointed out the value of learning some method of artificial resuscitation, 19 persons having been revived in this manner last year. He recommended mouth to mouth resuscitation because it is a new technique that is easy to learn and use and is highly effective.

As part of its water safety program, the State Police will display at its posts a series of eight Red Cross posters, showing ways to prevent water accidents and ways to save the lives of those in danger. Also on display will be a copy of the governor's proclamation.

The State Police safety message is being carried in the press and on the air and speeches will be given at group meetings.

Throughout the year, as in the past, the department will give demonstrations on water safety and resuscitation methods and otherwise promote the program.

"Michigan with its abundance of lakes and streams is called the water recreation wonderland and there is no reason why people should not fully participate in these activities," said Bergland. "Water should not be feared, but it should be respected. There should be full appreciation that taking risks is just as deadly as doing the wrong thing on the highway. There is a lot of pleasure in taking part in water sports the right way so it just doesn't make sense to deliberately court danger by doing the daring foolhardy things that invite tragedy. The water safety rules are simple and the best thing to do is follow them."

## Nature Notes

A walk in any dry woods these days will turn up a Mourning-cloak Butterfly. These, along with Red-Admiral and Milbert's tortoiseshell butterflies and small woodland and sod moths, have been seen on mild days since early April.

Other small moths, white-cabbage and sulfur butterflies are now becoming common. Soon the small blue butterflies, the common blue and the blue hair-streak, will dot the paths and roadsides where they drink from small puddles.

Near lakes and ponds, dragonflies are out almost as soon as the mosquitoes they live on.

As soon as there are flowers in the spring, there are bees to feed on them.

The large moths and butterflies appear in May and June.

Each kind of insect has its season to appear and lay its eggs to start another generation. Some repeat this many times in a summer, others take a whole year to go through their cycle.

## The ROAMING RANGER

ED. SHY, ATHLETIC DIRECTOR  
FOREST HILLS HIGH SCHOOL

In Michigan the Superintendent of Public Instruction by legislation is given general supervision of instruction in all public schools. High school athletics is an important part of the well-planned school program because of the many benefits derived by students through athletic participation. Among such benefits are the opportunities to observe and exemplify good sportsmanship, the chance to learn new games and improve playing skill, realization that athletic competition is a privilege that carries definite responsibilities with it, and the development of physical vigor and desirable habits in health, sanitation, and safety.

The school law further provides "The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall have supervision and may exercise control over the interscholastic athletic activities of all the schools of that state". To carry out this responsibility the Michigan High School Athletic Association has been organized to recommend the policies, rules and regulations through which all high school athletic activities shall operate. The Council is broadly representative of both parochial and public schools. Its membership of thirteen is elected by all of the senior and junior high schools of the state. Through its deliberations, and those of the Executive Committee, attempts are made to keep interscholastic athletics educational, to safeguard the welfare of participants, and to arrange athletic programs so there is ample time both for study and athletics.

**Purposes of the Association**

- To increase the educational value of interscholastic athletic programs throughout the state.
- To assist in the regulation of competition so that the athletic program fits into the high school curriculum.
- To regulate the interscholastic athletic program so as to safeguard the physical welfare of students participating.
- To insure a greater degree of physical fitness of high school students by providing opportunities for participation in vigorous, competitive athletics designed to meet the needs and abilities of all.

**Services Available to Schools**

- Assistance to schools in planning and developing a better athletic program by supervision of athletic contests and advising with schools on athletic problems.
- Assisting schools in the development of physical education and recreation programs through conferences, special meetings, publications, and consultant services of the State Director and Assistant Director.
- Monthly issues of the Michigan High School Athletic Association BULLETIN.
- Other printed material, including eligibility forms, contracts, HANDBOOKS, and sports rules books.
