Reorganization, K-12, committee sets schedule

It now appears that the work of the Kent Intermediate District Reorganization Committee will proceed faster than at first anticipated. The State Committee expects to get out the guidelines for the study on March 1.

If this is true, it would mean that the Kent Committee would be required to submit the committee plan of district reorganization by December 30, 1965.

Assuming that the State Committee gave its approval without delay, it is possible that the election or elections on the plan would be held 12 or 15 months from now.

When does an individual district lose the right of self-determination of its future?

If any districts have plans for annexed or being annexed to districts of their choice, it is quite possible that formal plans for holding such elections should be made at once.

After the reorganization plan has been approved, individual districts will no longer vote as individual districts, but either on an intermediate wide district basis (Method 1) or on a basis of the proposed new districts (Method 2).

Studies Proposed Districts

Certainly the Kent Intermediate Study Committee will need much information to aid them in determining a plan of school districts which will set a pattern for better education in the area.

This means that for a proposed combination of districts to form a new and larger district, accurate information on population, wealth, existing and needed buildings, transportation, quality of existing educational programs, special community features and perhaps others are needed.

Therefore, in areas where definite ideas do exist to organize into large districts, local study committees in the above areas should be appointed and a complete report based on the findings of these areas prepared for the Reorganization Committee.

Neither the Intermediate District Committee nor the Intermediate Office are in a position to do the amount of work necessary to a successful study.

Probably the first work of the Kent Reorganization Committee will be that of adopting a basic set of principles which they will use in recommending the final plan to the State Committee.

Mrs. James Banta, a member of Cascade Christian Church of Cascade, will be a participant in the Fifth International Affairs Seminar for Youth.

Sponsored by the United Christian Missionary Society for youth of Christian Churches (Disciples of Christ) in the 11th and 12th grades, participants will visit the United Nations, New York and the U. S. Capitol, Washington, D. C.

Participating are 135 youth and 30 adults from Christian Churches across the United States. In New York, the group will meet with representatives of several countries, the staff of the U. N., Interchurch Center and International House. In Washington they will visit with their congressmen, a foreign embassy and the U. S. State Department.

He said: "our goal for the Catholic Bishops' Relief Fund Appeal is to convince every parishioner to contribute to the relief of his fellowman in need to the extent that he is able."

What's cookin'

Any meal can be made complete with these recipes for Ice Box Rolls and Banana Nut Bread. They're easy to make, and a favorite with the whole family.

Ice Box Rolls

2 c. boiling water
1/2 c. butter
1/2 c. sugar
1 tsp. salt

Mix above ingredients and let cool. Dissolve 2 yeast cakes in 1/2 c. warm water. Slightly beat two eggs, add the dissolved yeast. Add the eggs and yeast to the first mixture, after it has cooled.

Add four cups sifted flour and beat. Then add enough more flour to make a hard loaf, and put in the ice box to raise over night.

The next day, shape your desired rolls and bake at 425 degrees for about 15 minutes.

Banana Nut Bread

1/4 c. butter or shortening
1/2 c. sugar
2 1/2 c. sifted flour
1 c. chopped nuts, optional
3 large bananas, mashed
(1 1/2 c.)
1/2 tsp. soda
2 tsp. baking powder
1/2 c. sour milk

Cream shortening, add sugar and mix. Add three eggs, one at a time and beat. Add bananas and nuts. Alternately, add sifted dry ingredients and milk. Bake in two small or one large loaf pan in moderate oven.

Stuffed cabbage is an old world dish that has many names and variations. In this particular version, the cabbage rolls are stuffed with tuna and cooked in a sauce made creamy smooth with mayonnaise.

Tuna Cabbage Rolls
Favorite tuna salad, made with 2 cups tuna
10 cabbage leaves
1 1/2 c. milk
1 c. mayonnaise
1/2 tsp. salt
1/4 tsp. pepper
1/4 tsp. powdered dill
3/4 c. shredded Cheddar cheese

Cook cabbage leaves in boiling water until slightly tender, about 15 minutes. Drain well. Place about 1/4 c. tuna salad on each leaf; fold over top, and sides in; roll tightly.

Place in 2-quart casserole. Blend milk into mayonnaise in saucepan. Add salt, pepper and dill; cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until slightly thickened. Add 1/2 cup of the shredded cheese; stir until the cheese melts. Bake in 350 degree, moderate oven, until sauce bubbles, about 20 minutes.

Note: to separate leaves from head of cabbage easily, hold cabbage under cold running water.

Mayonnaise Sauce

To prepare a cupful of hot mayonnaise sauce for serving on cooked vegetables, combine:

1/2 c. mayonnaise
1/2 c. milk
1/2 tsp. salt
Pinch of pepper

Mix ingredients and cook over low heat just 3 minutes, stirring constantly.

Serve at once over asparagus, brussels sprouts, cabbage, carrots, cauliflower, green beans, peas or boiled onions.

'Big Brain' to work on traffic problems


Michigan has put its "big brain" to work and the hopeful long-range result is that it will ultimately help to solve Michigan highway accident problems.

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
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
