## Ada Townhall packed for Monday meeting

The Ada Township regular monthly Board meeting was held Monday, June 13, at 7:30 p. m. in the Ada Township Hall as advertised and as expected a large crowd attended.

The Suburban Life reporter by virtue of being several minutes late, joined the people crowding in the doorways and finally wound up standing on a pail looking and listening at a window.

The township hall was packed with interested voters of the controversy, concerning the sewage system, with all the pros and cons.

The Township Board provided them with a panel of experts to answer their questions. Mr. Millard Moore, of Moore & Bruggink, Sanitary Engineers; Chas. Moore, Bonding Consultant of D.P.W. and Mr. Fred Sherk, Bond Attorney and financial Adviser for D.P.W.; Joe Neath and Jay Smith, Attorneys who represent Ada Township; were there to answer any questions that were raised and to help clarify the matter before the meeting. Mr. Schofield of the Kent County Road Commission also attended the meeting.

Mr. McDuffee raised the question of the gravel in the storm sewers washed out from the roads and stopped the tile as being the responsibility of the K.C.R.C. It was pointed out to him that although a problem, the gravel question was a minor problem, the important question being the pollution of the river with sewage wastes.

The question was raised, to general applause, as to why the Township Board had not come to the voters to raise the money, vote for the bonding issue. It was explained that the State Legislature has empowered the Board to act in the matter, that the question did not need

to be brought to the voters. Mr. George Welsh requested that Joe Neath read parts from the state law. Mr. Neath complied, first reading a statement made by Judge Searl in denying further court action in this matter. Section 12, Article 185 of the state law was then duly read, in its entirety.

The question of extending the trunk line of the sewer system to include the planned development on Ada Drive was discussed pro and con, with the figures of actual cost of extending the trunk line, balanced against the cost to Mr. Ladd, the developer, and probably costs to homeowners in the area who might wish to connect to the system. One voter remarked that he didn't vote for anyone on the Board but felt that they should represent him, as well as they did the residents of the village... general laughter followed this remark, it must be a private joke.

Mr. Van Andel rose to point out that Amway was donating the land for the lagoons which would have otherwise have added \$20,000, to the cost of the system. He also remarked that he didn't know as he was greatly in favor of the existing law, but felt the fight should be carried to the State Legislature if changes were needed.

Mr. Verhil moved that the voters of the township should commend, support and appreciate the hard work being done by the Ada Township Board.

The motion was strongly seconded by Niel Weathers, but was missed by the group at the windows as a train went thru at the time and we couldn't hear anything. But it met with the general approval and acceptance of the group assembled and shortly after ten o'clock the meeting adjourned.


## Susan Glaser gets degree in anthropology

Tired of painting the kitchen? Unloose the bonds that inhibit. As anyone with an avocation knows, time goes fleeting by almost too quickly when you are concentrating on your favorite escape. This work is yours, something personal, and you throw yourself into it to the exclusion of mundane affairs.

An ever increasing group of people has discovered this pleasure. Every Tuesday evening throughout the summer an easy-going, informal gathering meets at the Cascade Township Hall at 8 p. m. Time passes swiftly for them. From mere beginners to professionals, the Thornapple Valley Artists settle down to their painting with enthusiasm.

This is a loose organization and the code is simple. Arrive with your materials in a lunch pail or old cigar box. Set up an easel or lean your canvas board on a handy chair. Now facing that blank, white expanse, prepare to let go the tensions of the day and sketch in a creation that will eventually adorn your walls. Or if that prospect frightens you and you don't know what to do first, tell someone. Help surrounds you if you want it. Everyone realizes that Cezanne was first a novice, Grandma Moses an amateur.

A number of the members work from favorite pictures until they can develop their own styles. Others work from memory or imagination, "Composition" and "perspective" soon become part of your vocabulary and you discover an eye for highlight and shadow. Colors are no longer simple blue, red, and yellow, but tones and shades everywhere begin to be richer ending your life with a fuller meaning as you learn to interpret and express them.

There is a semi-social atmosphere and no inhibitions about working in the same room with others. Most people stick to their work until they feel the need to stretch, have a cup of coffee, walk around a bit. Then it's time to glance at another's work, view their own from across the room, perhaps peek at the clock. What? An hour has gone by! It seems only a few moments when you have been concentrating on your painting.

### State invested \$1.1 billion in K-12 education

Michigan invested an estimated \$1.1 billion in elementary and secondary education during the 1964-65 school year.

The State Department of Education (SDE) in the most comprehensive financial report it has ever published, said this represented an increase of about \$100 million when compared to the previous school year.

About 75 per cent of the funds spent—\$805 million—were for operating expenses of the schools while the balance went for construction of new schools and debt retirement.

About 85 cents out of every dollar spent for operations went in salaries for teachers and administrative and maintenance personnel.

The \$1.1 billion amounts to an average expenditure of \$559 for each of the 1,917,890 elementary and high school students who attended public schools during the 1964-65 school year.

"The money spent for education of our children and youth is the best single investment we can make in the future of our State," Superintendent of Public Instruction Ira Polley said.

SDE officials said the 1964-65 financial reports it received from Michigan's more than 1,100 school districts were analyzed on computers. It marked the first time computers were used to do this job.

Future financial reports, SDE officials said, will be even more comprehensive than the 1964-65 study.

### Launches campaign against obscene and harassing telephone calls

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company has launched a campaign against obscene and harassing phone calls.

Robert Thole, manager, said Michigan Bell is deeply concerned with the increase in the number of obscene, harassing or crank calls and that the company is stepping up its efforts to protect customers against them.

In a concerted attack on the problem, Thole said, the company is using new equipment and developing new techniques to identify the calling number of anyone making obscene, harassing or crank calls.

Among the new devices is one which has the capability of "locking in" on a call. It can lead to identification of the calling telephone line even after the person who made the call has hung up.

In addition, Thole said, the phone company has set up new procedures for the handling of complaints of such calls at each of its business offices throughout the state. In each office specially trained service representatives have been assigned to handle the complaints.

In the Detroit metropolitan area, a centralized Annoyance Call Bureau has been established. There specialists will coordinate action by the company's security people with the customer and police agencies.

Steps which customers can take to cope with abusive calls also were outlined by Thole.

"Should you or your family receive any obscene, harassing phone calls, don't talk. What the caller really wants is an audience. Don't be that audience and don't listen to his abuse," Thole cautioned.

"Hang up whenever a caller uses obscenity, doesn't properly identify himself, or says nothing. Use the telephone on your terms to guard against these invasions of your privacy."

In most instances, the customer can solve the problem by not talking, or by hanging up, Thole said.

If the obscene, harassing calls persist, customers are urged to call their telephone company business office.

If the nature of the calls is in violation of the state law, the customer should sign a com-
