Exaggeration

Recently I read an interesting story about a shirt. A man bought a corduroy shirt from a store in California in 1935. Thirty years later, in 1965, the store received that same shirt with the following letter: "Your salesman told me that corduroy would wear forever. I consider myself a reasonable man, and I feel I have had reasonably good service out of this garment. But your salesman is given to exaggeration, and I don't think this is good for business."

Everyone knows that corduroy is extremely durable cloth. But to say that it will last forever is to ascribe to it a characteristic which is not found in anything that is man-made. Therefore everyone ought to be careful when he uses the words "never" and "forever."

But there is no exaggeration whatever in God's use of the word "forever" in the Bible. Speaking of durability, the apostle Peter wrote: "The word of the Lord abides FOREVER." I Peter 1:25. Speaking of life, the apostle John wrote: "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have EVERLASTING LIFE." John 3:16. God does not exaggerate when He proclaims through Paul: "For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is ETERNAL LIFE through Jesus Christ our Lord." Romans 6:23.

Swimmer's itch is caused by tiny creatures

Swimmers in some areas of Michigan have known about swimmer's itch for many years, but as recreational uses of Michigan's lakes have increased, more folks have encountered the rash, announced Dr. W. B. Prothro, Director of the Grand Rapids-Kent County Health Department.

Sometimes folks with swimmer's itch think that they are suffering from chigger bites or poison ivy. The difference is that swimmer's itch usually attacks the chest, stomach, and the back of the legs, while chiggers seek the more tender portions of the body, such as the armpits, the groin, and points of pressure created by clothing, such as the ankles and waist. Poison ivy spreads and makes watery blisters. Swimmer's itch does not. The three are alike in that they are hard to treat to relieve the itching.

Swimmer's itch is caused by tiny creatures that spend about one-half of their life cycle in such things as warm blooded water birds, and the other one-half in snails that live in shallow water on some of our beaches. There are about 20 different kinds of these little creatures that can get on the skin, and after they burrow under, find that they are not in the right place and they die. Our body's reaction to this foreign material results in a welt or inflammation that itches.

Swimmer's itch starts at various times, depending upon the water temperature, but is usually over by late July or mid-August, because the infected snails have died. A swimmer's itch control program using chemicals is possible but not always practical because of the danger of killing fish as well as snails. Snail eradication programs must also be approved by the State Water Resources Commission.

Probably the most important thing you can do to help prevent swimmer's itch is to towel yourself off, and towel your children off very vigorously after bathing. It is the waders, not the swimmers, that usually are affected. Don't wait for them to dry out in the sun because this offers the very best conditions for the tiny animals to bore into your skin and cause the itch. These little creatures are very delicate, and rubbing the body vigorously with a towel will destroy most of them.

If you do get swimmer's itch, you might gain some relief by putting generous amounts of baking soda in your bath water and after you are dry applying a soothing lotion, such as calamine or calodryl. If the rash is extensive, a doctor may be able to give you something that will make life a little more tolerable. Keeping as cool as possible will also help relieve the itching.



Death Be Not Proud



No matter which ones are "bugging" you, the experience can be annoying at best. Sometimes, it's downright painful. Whatever the results, these winged warriors are part of outdoor living. To make the best of it, use repellents, sprays, and avoid their nests. Another good idea is to wear light-colored clothing. The reason? Bees like dark colors. --Mich. Dept. of Conservation



United Fund goal is set

Two million dollars will be the Kent County United Fund goal in 1966-67. Judge Stuart Hoffius, United Community Services President, in making the announcement for the Board, said "This goal represents an opportunity to approach the minimum needs of the United Fund agencies, which have not been met despite continuous gains made in past campaigns. In fact, agency requests for needed increases in programs have, for the past four years, risen faster than goal increases. A bold step to \$2,000,000 this year will be a start on closing that gap."

The budget requests for this year's campaign, according to Edward J. Frey, Campaign Chairman, totaled \$2,392,200. Never in ten years has Kent County fully met the agency budget request. Charts for past years show Grand Rapids to be the third lowest in per capita gifts to United Funds in the state. This, Frey added, indicates that the goal increase is possible. In 1965, Michigan per capita gifts ranged from \$4.16 to \$11.33, with Grand Rapids at \$4.62. To make our goal, we must increase giving 11.1 per cent.

Asked about increased Feder-

al spending in Kent County, Frey explained that Federal funds, such as those coming in through the Economic Opportunity Act, can be used only for new and specific projects, and in no way negate the need for the continuing work of United Fund agencies. In the same way, needs that are not met by Federal programs still call for United Fund support in increasing agency services. Office of Economic Opportunity programs are coordinated by UCS to serve Kent County in the best way possible.

When asked where the increase could be expected, Frey answered that companies, in a good business year, hopefully could increase firm gifts substantially, and that individuals would be asked to consider once again the good they can do with a simple pledge of "one hour's pay per month," their "Fair Share."

This, said Frey, is still a boom economy. If we cannot meet the new and continuing needs now, when will they be met?
