

Dedicate bridge

At an impressive ribbon cutting ceremony the Knapp Street Bridge was dedicated October 27 at 2 p. m.

The Forest Hills High School Band opened the ceremony with the National Anthem and a flag raising ceremony was conducted by the Boy Scouts of Troop 284.

The master of ceremonies was Gilbert R. Thomas, Commissioner of the Kent County Road Commission, and the invocation was given by the Rev. Arthur Davis, Associate Minister of the First Methodist Church.

Many dignitaries from the Road Commission, and supervisors from surrounding townships were on hand.

Richard Lynch, Ada Township Supervisor was introduced and commented on the various firsts of the bridge. It is the largest single span bridge built in the State of Michigan in the last 50 years, it is 560 feet long.

There will be a boat launching site built and a small park with picnic tables where the supports of the old bridge are now being demolished.

Richard H. Jewell, chairman of the Kent County Road Commission accepted the bridge for the county and stated that many more bridges are going to be built throughout Michigan in the next few years to keep up with the growing highway system, that at the present time is only one percent complete.

In Kent County alone, there is a need for 30 new bridges and in order that the bridges and highways can be constructed, there will have to be an increase in gasoline taxes and license plate fees.

Mr. Jewell and Mr. Lynch used "man-sized" scissors for the red-ribbon cutting.

The Forest Hills band played another number and every one was invited to have coffee, doughnuts, cookies and cider.



Whether we actually are more intelligent than all of our ancestors is debatable. We do have access to much more information than did those who preceded us. However, the mere number of facts we have acquired(?) does not necessarily constitute intelligence. The Bible tells us that the fear of God is the beginning of wisdom (Psalm 111:10) What we need is the certainty which comes by hearing God's voice in the Bible, and which is proclaimed by Christians with deep convictions. 

Urge visit to Maple Grove

An urgent appeal for all Kent County residents unfamiliar with the Maple Grove Medical Care Facility to take advantage of the open house scheduled on Saturday and Sunday, November 5 and 6, from 2 to 4 p. m., has been sounded by Arlon Ley, Chairman of the Citizens Committee for the Replacement of Maple Grove.

"The November 8 election is a critical one for the aged and chronically ill of Kent County," Mr. Ley said. "I am certain that if all county voters know of the conditions at Maple Grove, there will be no question of an overwhelming affirmative vote on Proposals 2 and 3, which will make a replacement possible."

He pointed out that the project for replacing Maple Grove has met with the overwhelming approval of those actually familiar with the situation. He cited the endorsement of both the U.C.S. Hospital and Related Facilities Planning Unit and the Kent County Medical Society, as well as the unanimous vote of the Kent County Board of Supervisors in placing the proposals on the November 8 ballot.

"With its advanced program of complete care for long-term patients who are seriously ill, Maple Grove is filling a vital need in Kent County," Mr. Ley commented. "We simply cannot continue this program in a physical plant that has been recognized by all concerned as a 'fire trap' for bed-ridden or the physically handicapped patients."

Proposals 2 and 3 call for a one mill tax levy for four years. However, Mr. Ley pointed out that the pending expiration of the existing one mill levy for the new county building, means that it will actually be an additional levy for only one year. In terms of actual cost, it will mean \$10 more in county taxes for one year for a homeowner with a home valued at \$20,000.

Maple Grove Medical Care Facility is located on 32nd St., SE, between Kalamazoo Ave. and Breton Road. The favorable passage of Proposals 2 and 3 will permit its transfer to the Sunshine Hospital grounds.

- (6) the Township, in addition to cost of the sewer system, shall pay Kent County charges for operation and maintenance of system. The payment of such charges shall be a general obligation of the Township.

that on February 17, 1966...

your Township Board passed resolution number 214661 with these provisions:

- (1) a 10% penalty if your sewer charges are not paid on time.
- (2) if your sewer charges are 120 days overdue, your sewer will be shut off. There will be a \$50 charge to get it turned on.
- (3) if you fail to connect to the sewer if it is available, you can be fined \$100 and jailed for 90 days.
- (4) the Town Board stated in this resolution that this was an emergency measure to preserve the health and safety of the community.

that on December 1, 1965...

Ada Township entered into an agreement with Ladd, stating that the additional cost to serve the Ladd Area is about \$250,000.00.

that Ada Township will provide a water system for the Ladd Area by December 31, 1966.

that if the sewer system is not completed by November 1, 1966, Ladd is relieved of his obligation to pay for sewer charges for 75 houses in the following year.

the Town Board gave little thought to the taxpayers when considering the cost of a sewer system to serve the Ladd Area,



A LETTER TO YOU Voters of Ada Township:

You have been exposed this fall to one of the most active campaigns in the history of Ada Township elections. Next Tues., November 8, you will give your verdict at the polls. Last August, in the primary election, less than 50% of the registered voters voted for Township offices. I lost my place on the printed ballot by 98 votes margin. I know now that it was a mistake not to campaign actively, and explain to our neighbors and citizens what the Township Board and Supervisor had been doing in greater detail.

The committee of residents—now numbering nearly 200—which is supporting me persuaded me to try the difficult task of running as a write-in candidate for re-election as Supervisor on November 8. They wished to give these citizens who did not vote in August a real choice for the next Supervisor, not just the one name on the ballot. We are fortunate in our country to have election laws that permit this.

My past six years in this office have been hard but satisfying. I am proud of what the Township Board and I have accomplished for the community. I am also very much aware of the problems that lie ahead, and of the important and difficult jobs in "mid-stream." This area has a great potential as a fine place for us and our children to live, if municipal af-

fairs are managed properly; but it could slide downhill fast if mismanaged.

And so I am asking you to read and learn the procedure for write-in voting. Go to the polls on November 8, vote in this way for me as Supervisor and for John Adrianse as Trustee, and vote for Kathryn Sytsma and Neal VandePeerle on the regular Republican ticket for Clerk and Treasurer. Those little slanted write-in slots along the top front of the voting machine could mean a big difference in the future of all of us.
