## Start planning for fluoride program here

The Forest Hills Fluoride Committee in cooperation with the Grand Rapids-Kent County Health Departments and the Michigan Department of Health is beginning to make plans for the topical application of sodium fluoride to the teeth of the children in our community.

The program will be made available to pre-schoolers, 2nd, 5th, and 8th graders since it is at these various growth levels that children have many newly erupted teeth which should be protected against decay. Fluoride has been found to be effective in reducing new tooth decay by an average of 40 percent. In addition to these benefits the program offers a valuable dental experience with no discomfort involved and dental health education is given the child by clinic personnel.

The entire procedure consists of four visits to the topical fluoride clinic, which will be located in one of the area schools. At the first visit the teeth are cleaned and the first application is given. An application of sodium fluoride consists of the teeth being isolated with cotton rolls, then the teeth are dried with compressed air and a 2 percent solution of sodium fluoride is applied to the teeth. On the second, third and fourth visits the application of the sodium fluoride is repeated. The program is not recommended or necessary for children already drinking fluoridated water for a certain number of years.

A fee of \$2.50 per each eligible child to cover necessary expenses of the program will be due in March. The specific time and place for the clinic will be announced in May.

A survey is now being made to determine if there are enough interested parents in the community to conduct a program. For further information on the topical fluoride program in the Forest Hills area please contact the school representatives listed below or the Kent County Health Department.

## 4-H veterinary science project is introduced

What is a veterinarian? The young people who participate in the new 4-H Veterinary Science program will find out, says Alan Snider, Extension 4-H-Youth Agent for Kent, Allegan and Ottawa counties. In addition, they will learn more about what a veterinarian does and how the world of veterinary science plays a part in our everyday lives.

The program was introduced at the annual meeting of the Michigan Veterinary Medical Association held this week at Michigan State University. The 4-H Veterinary Science program is suitable to all youth with an interest in animals, medicine, or public health. A member in an urban area will find it just as satisfying and as valuable as his rural counterpart.

Members will learn about animal anatomy, physiology, sanitation, causes of disease, and immunology. Through such an involvement, they will gain a greater understanding of their own personal health since the same medical principles apply. In addition, it provides an exposure to important phases of medicine and public health and develops an understanding of the field of veterinary medicine and its exciting future.

Individual club programs will also include discussions, demonstrations, movies, and tours. Members will prepare action exhibits showing the skills and information learned and, along with their families, will visit veterinary clinics.

A "kickoff" Veterinary Science 4-H Leaders' Workshop will be conducted in March at Camp Kett, Michigan's leadership training center near Tustin. The program is cooperatively sponsored by the Michigan and American Veterinary Medical Association, the Cooperative Extension Service, and the National 4-H Service Committee. The Upjohn Company of Kalamazoo has provided funds and given leadership for nationwide development of this program.

The program has been adapted to the Michigan 4-H-Youth Program through a state-wide developmental committee including Dr. Fred Bohmker, Extension Specialist in Veterinary Science; Dr. James Dalley, College of Veterinary Medicine, Michigan State University; Mrs. Carolyn Bay, Extension 4-H Youth Agent for Clare, Gladwin, and Isabella counties; William Plummer, Extension 4-H-Youth Agent for Kalamazoo, Jackson and Calhoun counties; Edward Poole, Extension 4-H-Youth Agent for Washtenaw, Lenawee, and Monroe counties; Graydon Blank, Extension Specialist in Animal Husbandry; Dr. Louis Boyd, Extension Specialist in Dairy; and Jake Wamhoff, Program Assistant, 4-H-Youth Programs.

# Basketball teams win

Forest Hills Rangers enjoyed their best period of athletic competition in the history of our school last week.

Ranger teams engaged in a total of eight contests and came away victoriously seven of the eight times. In addition to the varsity and junior varsity basketball successes, the frosh team rolled over Lowell by the tremendous margin of 56 to 24.

Ranger wrestlers grappled to a 24-17 triumph over Zeeland Thursday and they soundly defeated West Ottawa 29-11 on Tuesday.

### Varsity Wins

The Forest Hills varsity cagers snapped a losing streak that dated back to December 27th by defeating Tri-River rival Lowell on Tuesday, January 31. The stubborn Rangers came from behind to post a winning score, 77-70.

Lowell dominated the first-half action while the Rangers embarked on a period of frustration. No one on the team was able to shoot with any consistency and the club made numerous floor mistakes. The Red Arrows of Lowell took advantage of the Rangers' misfortune to build up a substantial half-time margin.

The Rangers used the half-time break to iron out their problems and emerged to control the second half of the play. The Red Arrows watched their lead dwindle until in the final period the Rangers forged a head-to-victory.

Pacing the Ranger scoring attack was John Stovall, a hot-shooting guard who zeroed in on 27 points. Steve Russ netted 20 and Jim Vanderbaan contributed 10. Russ was also a pillar of strength on the boards, collecting 25 rebounds, which tied the school record.

### JV Routs Lowell

The spirited rebounding of Tom Teft and Glenn Collins and a stifling zone defense paved the way for the Junior Varsity's romp over the Red Arrows of Lowell last Tuesday night.

While the strong defense cut off any sign of a Lowell attack, the Ranger offense was almost perfectly executed.

The Rangers jarred Lowell for a 16-6 first quarter advantage and pushed further ahead on the fine shooting of Steve Grabarek for a sturdy half-time lead of 38-21. Lowell's comeback hopes were crushed in the 3rd period by the searing shooting of the Ranger five. Forest Hills finished the rout with a nineteen point final quarter for a well-earned 79-46 victory.

Five Rangers cracked into double figures. Steve Grabarek put together his best effort of the year for 17 points. Scrappy Tom Teft added 13 of his own and three other Rangers, Dave Sherwood, Glenn Collins, and Doug Koessel, each totaled ten.

### A Varsity First

The Rangers avenged an earlier defeat by the Wyoming Park Vikings with a 68-63 triumph over the Vikings last Friday night. In the previous Wyoming game, the Vikings gained their victory when a Forest Hills shot at the buzzer was annulled by a referee's decision the Rangers' victory marked the first time in Forest Hills' history that the cagers had defeated the Vikings on the Wyoming floor.

The Wyoming club had a definite height advantage on the Rangers and the Vikings made good use of their advantage to control the first half board-work. To equalize the size of the Vikings the Rangers applied a full court press and the pressure began to slowly take effect on the Vikings, who managed to post a five point half-time lead.

In the second half, the Rangers controlled the boards, and with control of the rebounds gained control of the game. The tight defensive pressure began to take its toll on the Vikings, who committed numerous floor mistakes. The Rangers capitalized on the Wyoming mistakes to take and hold the lead for the final minutes of play.

John Stovall led the Ranger offensive attack with 21 points, followed closely by Steve Russ with 19 points and also contributing 15 rebounds, Jim Vanderbaan tallied 14 points, and Randy Ashley added 12.

### Wrestlers Successful






Ryan Ashley, No. 31
