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NEW ADA ELEMENTARY SCHOOL RISES ON ADA DRIVE

School Projects on Schedule

Construction on the new Ada Elementary School and additions and remodeling of three other buildings is progressing well for scheduled opening of the facilities next fall, it was reported this week by Superintendent Robert G. Masten of Forest Hills School District.

When completed, the new Ada school will have a capacity of 570 students in 20 regular classrooms and two special education rooms, the latter facilities serving students from both Forest Hills and Lowell.

The building, now going up on Ada Drive, also will include a library, multi-purpose room, food preparation kitchen, faculty room, health room, general offices and storage facilities.

General contractor for the project, which bears a construction cost of \$372,900, is Visser & Sons of Grand Rapids.

The Board of Education, at its March 19 meeting, authorized acceptance of a bid for \$23,695 from the Sullivan Riverview Furniture for installation of carpeting in the new facility.

The board decided in favor of carpet, rather than tile, after hearing reports of extensive studies by Ford Motor Company which proved that maintenance costs were, in the long run, much greater with tile installation.

New additions and remodeling of Thornapple, Orchard View and Collins elementary schools will cost \$417,000 and all three projects are well along on schedule, Masten reports.

Two new classrooms, bringing the total to 10, are being added to Thornapple along with a multi-purpose room, library, faculty room and storage rooms. The school will have a capacity for 270 students.

The Orchard View project calls for nine new classrooms and remodeling of a walk-in kitchen to a food preparation center. Orchard View will be a 20-classroom facility when completed and will handle 55 students.


Six classrooms are being added to Collins School which will be a 21-classroom facility upon completion.

Three schools are to be closed down at the end of the current school year... the present six-room Ada elementary building, the three-room Honey Creek building and the two-room Egypt Valley facility, Masten reports.

The board hopes to be able to sell the Ada and Egypt Valley buildings, but plans to retain Honey Creek as an eventual site for a larger building when growth in that area demands additional classroom space.



NEW CASCADE VILLAGE APARTMENTS TO BE CONSTRUCTED

Launch Work Soon on Cascade Village

Construction of a new apartment complex on the northwest corner of Cascade Road and 28th Street is scheduled to get underway in the near future.

Known as Cascade Village, the total project is expected to take about two years to complete, although many of the living quarters are scheduled for occupancy later in the summer.

Of French Provincial design, Cascade Village is being developed by Alice Construction Company of Lansing.

Arrangements for transfer of the 26-acre site was handled by Paul F. Garbow Real Estate of Cascade.

Each apartment building will house 11 units and the total number is expected to be approximately 200.

The buildings will feature

sound-control, fire-resistant construction, carpeting in living room, dining room and hallways.

All units will have air conditioning, individual balconies and walk-out patios, two bedrooms, one bath, formal dining room, separate fully-equipped kitchens and parking facilities.

Also planned are a swimming pool and community house. The community house is available without charge for use of the apartment residents for larger social and entertaining functions.

It will be equipped with a full kitchen for easy preparation of food and beverages. It will be tastefully decorated and furnished and will accommodate up to 100 persons.

The swimming pool will be heated and open during daylight hours of the summer season. Resort-type sun bathing patio and fully equipped with umbrellas and chairs and comfortable chaise lounges for residents and guests at no additional cost.

Extend Vacation

Easter vacation for Forest Hills School Students has been extended by one day through April 16.

Map Plans for Water, Sewer Lines

Work on possible extension of water and sewer facilities from the City of Grand Rapids into Grand Rapids Township, made possible by recent vote after almost two years of negotiation, is moving closer to reality.

Supervisor Marshall Douthett has been authorized by the township board to confer with Grand Rapids officials and representatives of the engineering firm of Moore & Burgink to determine the present extent of trunk lines.

Following the survey, Douthett points out, recommendations for extending service to township residents will be made before any actual construction is started.

Installation of water and sewer lines will be handled on a special assessment basis with interested property owners paying the costs as new facilities are constructed.

A vote on March 19 empowered township officials to proceed with signing a 30-year contract with the city to provide service to local residents.

Seek to Resolve Problem of Cascade Dam Backwaters

The fate of backwaters on the Thornapple River is still hanging on technicalities that involve handling of dams at Cascade and Ada.

Because the continued operation of these dams means possible loss of tax base revenue to all citizens of both townships, either directly or indirectly, the resolution of the problem is considered vital.

Consumers Power Company which owns the dams, intends to discontinue operations in the future, but such action hinges upon passage of proposed Federal legislation which will require the licensing of the dams if they are used to generate electricity.

Additional costs would not be covered by the small output and the company therefore has expressed a desire to sell the dams.

The annual meeting of the Cascade-Thornapple Association, a group interested in the waters above the Cascade Dam, was held Monday evening and attended by approximately 100 riverside residents.

Secretary Lloyd Winslow disclosed that recent studies and negotiations have been held with the Thornapple River Association, the group interested in the Ada Dam, and

with township boards of Cascade and Ada.

Under the River Management Act number 253, which took effect in 1965, the Cascade-Thornapple Association hopes to be able to continue to operate the flow of water through the Cascade dam.

There are 15 miles of recreational waters above the dam which could be lost if

it was opened and not operated. In addition land values of river property would decline. These residents at present pay the largest amount of residential taxes in the area.

The technical problem arises from Act 253, which states that "the governing bodies of any two or more local governments may petition the Water

Resources Commission to establish a river management district in order to provide an agency for the acquisition, construction, operation and financing of water storage and other river control facilities necessary for river management.

Boiled down this means that although the people of Cascade township would desire to petition the governing board to operate the Cascade dam, at present this board could not function without the aid of either Caledonia or Ada townships.

Winslow explained that the law may be changed to allow one governing unit to set up a river management board, but it cannot be acted upon in Lansing until the second Wednesday of January, 1969. Winslow declared that, under this law, any taxes levied will be by the township board and therefore controlled, in effect, by the people.

Cost to operate and maintain both the Cascade and Ada dams would be approximately \$4,000 or less a year.

The annual meeting of the Thornapple Association will be held Tuesday, April 16 at 8:00 p. m. in the Masonic Temple, Ada, Michigan. New members of the board of trustees will be elected and the latest developments on the Thornapple River Ada Dam impoundment will be discussed. Property owners on the river between the Ada and Cascade dam are urged to attend.

including liability insurance. It takes only about 400 man hours a year to operate both dams when they are controlled in conjunction with one another. Both dams are considered in excellent condition.

The LaBarge dam in Caledonia Township is not now in operation, but residents are free to petition that governmental body to act under the same law should they desire.

Meanwhile, the Thornapple River Association has been trying to develop a solution to its problem through Lake Level Act 141. A hearing for this decision has been put back until July 1 before Circuit Judge Roman Snow.

In other action taken at the annual meeting, Clair Andrews was returned to the governing board for a one year term. Albert Carpenter was named for a two-year term and newly-elected board members for two year terms are Otis George, decided to purchase some of the stone and try his hand at making pipes. 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



Troopers said very little else is known of the mishap, as Lombardo was found unconscious, and immediately rushed to the hospital.





I-96 Access Road Nears Final Plans

Engineers of the Kent County Road Commission today are putting final touches to plans for the construction of a new highway from Segun Avenue to Cascade Road.

According to Al A. Doornbos, chief designer for the Road Commission, the new road will run from the interchange at I-96, along Alden Nash Ave. and north to 36th St.

From 36th St., it will take a northeasterly turn to Emery Drive, where it will straighten out until it reaches Segun Ave., at a point about 1800 ft. south of the new bridge over Grand River. (See map)

The purpose for the construction of the new road is to provide Lowell and townships to the north with a more direct access to the I-96 Freeway.

The new highway will consist of an all-weather type of construction.

It will have a 24-foot bituminous pavement, with 10-foot shoulders, making a total grade width of 44 ft.

The alignment and grades will meet the requirements of the American Association of State Highway Traffic Safety Committee and also the requirements of the Bureau of Public Roads.

Contracts for the construction of the road will be let as soon as right-of-way papers have been signed, Doornbos said.

Preliminary studies for a proposed new "middle school" in the Lowell Area School District are underway today following action by the Board of Education Monday night to get the project on the drawing boards.

The board voted to commission McMillen-Palmer Architects to start work on preparing preliminary designs and sketches on the building, which would house 1,000 students from grades five through eight.

The proposal is expected to be brought before district voters later this year.

If approved, it would replace the existing junior high school facility, school officials say.

The board also considered several financial matters during the meeting, including a preliminary budget that will call for approximately \$1,318,336 for the 1968-69 school year.

Superintendent of Schools James Pace introduced the preliminary figures to board members along with a suggestion that the district will seek allocated millage of 11.08 from the county.

The final allocated figure is subject to a number of variables, Pace noted, most important of which are final determination of state aid benefits, equalized valuation figures and the master agreement with teachers. The latter is expected to be finalized within the next few weeks.

Pace brought the board up-to-date on transfer of properties involving Lowell, Forest Hills and Caledonia districts.

A portion of the district known as the "old river district" has been transferred to Forest Hills and will result in loss of approximately \$449,000 in valuation to Lowell schools, Pace said.

A total of 18 students presently enrolled in Lowell schools reside in the area. By agreement with Forest Hills and the Kent Intermediate Board, two of the students will be able to continue their education through the final two years of high school.

An estimated \$300,000 in property value will be added to the district, Pace told the board members, with transfer of properties from North Bell.

Pace also noted that recently-released valuation figures for the City of Lowell show an increase of approximately \$800,000 in equalized valuation.

The board also formally recognized a request from the Kent Intermediate Board to place on the June 10 ballot a proposal for 1.1 mills to operate and \$6,025,000 to purchase a site and construct two new vocational schools in the county.

Will Not Bid for Re-Election

David F. Coons, a member of the Lowell Area Schools Board of Education for the past 11 years, announced today that he will not seek re-election in June.

Coons told fellow members of the board of his decision at Monday night's meeting.

The 46-year-old Coons has served for the past nine years as board treasurer.

He was elected to a three-year term in 1957 and subsequently won voter support for two four-year terms consecutively when the board was reorganized to include seven members in 1960.

Owner of Coons Clothing and Shoes and member of one of this area's pioneer families, Coons has long been active in civic and church affairs. He served on the city's charter commission in 1960.

He and his wife, Betty, reside at 404 N. Division. The couple has three daughters, Laura, Martha and Nancy.

Variance in Zoning Approved

An appeal for variance in zoning, involving the building formerly occupied by Lowell Stamping Plant, today had been granted by the Vergennes Township Zoning Board of Appeals.

The board acted upon the request of Industrial Tool and Machine Co., which plans to install light industrial facilities in the plant, located on Godfrey Street near the Lowell city limits.

A special hearing was held two weeks ago and was well attended by residents in the area who objected to granting of the variance.

The board placed one condition on usage of the building, specifying that substantial foundations be installed under machinery in order to prevent vibrations.

Floyd and Charles Thomas were listed as owners of Industrial Tool and Machine, which currently is located at 11591 Grand River Avenue.

Supervisors Honor Late E. G. Schaefer

Recognition of long service to the county and to his community today had been accorded the late Elmer G. Schaefer by the Kent County Board of Supervisors.

The board adopted a resolution of commendation at its meeting Tuesday and forwarded a copy of it to Mr. Schaefer's family.

Mr. Schaefer, who passed away last week, had served as a representative of Lowell on the county board from 1960 until his death.

He had served as chairman of the Salary Committee for two years and had been a member of the Tentative Budget Committee, the Welfare Committee, the Finance Committee, and the Personnel Board during his eight-year tenure.

(The following impression of American living was written by Mette Thorsen, an exchange student from Denmark now attending classes at Lowell High School).

I am enjoying my stay here very much and I hope I will be able to return some day. Lots of people have asked me what my biggest misconception about America and Americans was.

As an answer, I guess, I will have to say that it is the imagination of all (or at least most) Americans being rich. A lot of people in Europe have that illusion, and I see where they get it, too.

Both in TV and in the theatres they show a lot of American movies and just about all of them take place in real fancy and expensive surroundings.

The Americans we meet over there, too, give us that wrong impression. Driving big cars and spending a lot of money, they add to the illusion. But of course it has to be that way because the middleman cannot afford going abroad.

I am just glad that I have had an opportunity to come over here and see what America and American life is really like.

I was glad to notice that all Americans are not supermen, but just normal people like the average persons in Europe.

Denmark is a socialistic country, which there can be said both pros and cons about. One thing I like about Denmark is that the schools are supported by the state and therefore it is less expensive to go to college. Students over there don't have to struggle as hard as American students, who often have a hard time paying their way through college.

Taxes are high, though. Besides a pretty high income tax there has been, since July 1967, a 10 percent sales tax!

Jerry Smith Named Lowell Grid Coach

Gerald B. (Jerry) Smith today had been elevated to the position of head football coach at Lowell High School.

The decision, which required several months of screening of candidates, was reached Monday night during the Board of Education meeting.

The board passed a motion by a 6-1 vote to hire Smith as varsity grid mentor. The lone dissenting vote was cast by William Jones.

Recommendations for appointment of a coach to fill the vacancy had been forwarded to the board six weeks ago by a special screening committee made up of Superintendent James Pace, high school Principal Carl Hagen and Athletic Director Dale Hollern.

Smith will replace Charles Pierce, who resigned following the 1967 season. Pierce had been head coach for six seasons, during which time his teams won 27 and lost 21. He will remain on the faculty as a teacher.

Smith had served as assistant varsity coach in 1967 following seven seasons as head mentor of the junior varsity. His JV squads posted a record of 38 wins, 15 losses and two ties.

He also served as freshman and junior varsity basketball coach, concurrently, for two years, during which time his cage teams had a combined record of 45-19. He was assistant varsity track coach for two years and is now in his fourth year as varsity golf coach, a post that he must relinquish under school policy that no coach may handle more than one varsity assignment in the same school year.

Smith attended South High in Grand Rapids, earning 3 varsity letters in football, 4 in track and two in basketball.

He attended Grand Rapids Junior College for one year, competing in football and track.

Following a tour of duty with the Coast Guard from 1962 to 1965, Smith entered Michigan State University where he received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1960.

His first assignment was as mathematics, science and physical education instructor at Lowell Junior High in 1960. The next year, he was assigned to the high school, teaching accounting, business mathematics, personal and commercial typing and driver education.

Smith belongs to many educational organizations and presently serves as president of the Lowell Lions Club, of which he has been a member for six years. He also serves as a deacon of the Lowell Congregational Church.

He and his wife, Patricia, and their three children, live at 806 Hudson in Lowell.



and manpower. He stated also that the Lowell Township Supervisor expressed the opinion that Vergennes Township would not be eligible for such service, since that township does not participate in the Schneider Fund. Councilman Reynolds cited a near-future need for a park in the westerly residential area—the Valley Vista subdivision. Manager Olson will bring before the Planning Commission the possibility of including park areas in all subdivisions and making such a requirement in the proposed Ordinance.

Councilman Anderson relayed a request from the County right-of-way buyer for an approximate figure that might be used for purchase of right-of-way land in the proposed extension of Hudson Street to Lincoln Lake Avenue. A figure was discussed on which to work.

- Kent County Library Board setting forth the Library Support Formula and setting our participation figure at \$1,306.48. (See MOTIONS).

 - Dedication of the street alongside Calvary Church could now be effected since all participated costs have been paid. Legal detail commencing the project will be handled by our City Attorney. Council concurred in finalizing as outlined.
 - Final meeting of Board of Review was held on Monday, March 18. Final figures indicated an increase in assessed values, over last year, of approximately \$781,000.
 - First-aid equipment, ordered by Police Chief Block and Councilman Reynolds, has been received. The Manager stated it should be emphasized that this is strictly first-aid equipment for the police cruisers and that Lowell does not have an ambulance.

Whether the cost of such equipment should be accepted from the Schneider Fund was discussed. 




