Unusual Collection Features Early Styles

One of the most unusual collections of fine American period clothing, outside of museum pieces, is owned by Mrs. James (Jean) Hainer, Pinecrest, S.E.

What makes this private collection exceptional is that not only are the various dresses and accessories extremely fine in themselves, but that they are presented to the public in a most individual manner.

Rather than hide her fine ensemble, Jean has elected to share her hobby with others who are interested in these period pieces. She has prepared a complete showing in a professional presentation wherein live models actually wear these clothes.

The backgrounds, the script, even the music have all been researched for authenticity to each period in history. Mannerisms and mores of the day are explained by a narrator with interesting bits of little known information that Jean has discovered in hours of conversations with experts and in old books of fashions.

It was only three years ago that a relative of Mr. Hainer offered Jean what became the nucleus of the collection. This was a gown worn at the Inaugural Ball of George Washington.

She was also given some other rare items such as hoops, bustles, fans, a maid's outfit and accessories of the Revolutionary War times.

It is not often that these authentic pieces are found in private hands. Even museums have very little in the way of women's apparel.

From this beginning, Jean went on to collect prime examples from other periods such as pre-Civil War, the Civil War itself, Turn of the Century, Gibson Girl, the early 1900's, the twenties and thirties, the latter reflecting great Hollywood elegance.

All of the pieces in Jean's now extensive accumulation were exquisite to begin with. For instance, she has hats, wraps, and dresses from the House of Worth which were given to Jean from the estate.

Everything worn in the show is original—which can give a member of the audience the vicarious thrill of seeing not costumes, but clothes really worn by women of other times at important events.

All of the members of the troupe have an empathy for the collection and bring in to focus each item as a star in its own right. There is humor as well as understanding as the presentation moves swiftly along.

One of the great joys of this colorful showing is its timing. Jean says that she would rather leave the audience wishing to see more, so the entire program is polish-

This evening will present all of Mrs. Beurmann's present students, as well as former students and faculty members, with a chance to wish her well as she enters her retirement. All are invited to attend.







On Thursday, Education Day, at 9:30 a. m., the Alto All-Purpose Room will be the setting for the Fourth Grade Michigan Week Breakfast.


The Runciman-Intermediate, Bushnell and Alto Schools will combine efforts to assure the fourth graders and their guests of a breakfast composed of Michigan products.

Prepare Plan on School

Several new steps toward possible construction of a proposed middle school for the Lowell Area School District had been taken today.

The board of education Monday night appointed a building and sites committee to study the proposed 1,000-student facility with board member William Jones serving as chairman.

Superintendent of Schools James Pace also disclosed that preliminary sketches for the school, which would house grades five through 8 and replace the present junior high building, would be submitted during an executive session of the board next Tuesday.

"We hope to have something resembling final sketches in time for the next regular meeting," Pace said.

Appointed to serve with Jones were board members Dale Shade and Gould Rivette in addition to the following, all previously members of the building and sites committee:

Ed Kiel, Mrs. Gladys Bergin, Mrs. Cora Troy, Mrs. Rita Pratt, Mrs. Marjorie Kropf, Walter Gumser, Allen Wisner, Mrs. Keith Graham, Mrs. Albert Porritt, Jack Thorne, John Jones, Fred Talbot and King Doyle.

The board also approved and forwarded to the Kent County Intermediate District a request from Stuart Howard of 4570 Honeycreek Rd., to transfer his property from the Lowell district to the Rockford district.

Pace noted that the move was generally in keeping with a long-range plan to re-align district boundaries throughout the area.

The superintendent told the board that allocated millage from the county for the 1968-69 budget year has been set at 10.1 and that, pending negotiation of the master contract with teachers, it appeared this would be sufficient to handle the proposed budget. Lowell had sought millage of 11.08.

A meeting of the Lowell Education Association was scheduled for Wednesday night, Pace said, for purposes of holding a straw vote on the board's latest salary offer.

The board approved transfer of 1 and one-third acres of land on Emery Drive to the Kent County Highway Department. The property is on the right-of-way for the new access road between Lowell and I-96.

On the advice of school attorney George Cook, the board moved to return the Talbot and Mapes school properties to their owners.

The board received a note of thanks from St. Patrick's School for its contribution of approximately \$200 in playground equipment, which had been located at the old Talbot School.

Pace also informed the board that the high school would break with long-standing tradition this year by not having a speaker at the commencement exercises.

Spurn Manager's Request for New Post, Bigger Raise

Two proposals, both involving the administrative staff of the City of Lowell, today had been emphatically turned down by members of the city Council.

They were included in the 1968-69 budget, which was presented to the council in a stormy special meeting Monday night.

City Manager Bernard C. Olson had suggested, in the budget, that \$5,200 be allocated for the position of treasurer.

Council went against the manager's wishes by a 4-0 vote. During the discussion on the matter, a verbal exchange between Olson and Mrs. Shepard caught council members by surprise.

Following the oral fireworks council took up the matter of

Olson's request for an allocation of \$10,500 for the city manager's salary and voted instead to peg the annual pay at \$10,200... a raise of \$925 over the 1967-68 salary for the job.

The vote also was 4-0 for the lesser figure.

Present for the special meeting were Mayor Arnold Wittenbach and council members Carlen Anderson, Harold F. Jefferies and Mrs. Virginia Myers. Councilman Herb Reynolds was out-of-town.

During the meeting, Olson and Mrs. Shepard aired differences of opinion that apparently caught several members of the council off guard.

When the council reached that portion of the budget relating to administrative salaries, Mayor Wittenbach asked Mrs. Shepard what she thought of the proposed change.

"I am the city treasurer because I was appointed to the position by the city council," replied Mrs. Shepard. "This, of course, was in addition to my appointment as city clerk."

"I feel that I have done a good job in both positions. I have heard no complaints concerning my work."

Olson took exception to Mrs. Shepard's remarks, declaring: "I can't agree. There have been times when I pointed out to you that some of the records were not as I wanted them processed."

"Another person handling the treasurer's duties could devote full time on this job, which would mean that a better job would be accomplished," he continued.

Said Mrs. Shepard: "If the records are not as they should be, it is because I followed your instructions, so the blame lies with you, not me."

At this point some of the councilmen asked Olson for specific reasons for his suggestion for the appointment of a new treasurer. The city manager replied:

"After seven years as city manager of Lowell, I feel that I know what's best for this city, and I feel at this time that a change in the treasurer's duties would best serve the city."

Apparently the hassle between Olson and Mrs. Shepard took the council by surprise. Said Mayor Wittenbach:

"I certainly didn't think this sort of thing was going on at city hall, and I would hope that relations at city hall would be more harmonious."

Said Councilman Carlen Anderson: "I have been hearing about some dissension at city hall, but what concerns me most is whether we are witnessing something on the surface here, or whether there is something deeper back of it all."

"Anyway," Anderson continued, "I move that the proposal for a new treasurer be stricken from the record."

On roll call, the four members voted to strike out Olson's recommendation. The \$5,200 appropriation was allowed to remain in the budget to supplement budget needs for clerical help in city hall.

Olson suffered his second set-back on the question of an increase in salary advanced by him for his job as city manager. In the budget Olson asked for a salary of \$10,500 for 1968-69, which meant an increase of \$1,275 over his last year's pay of \$9,225.

Olson told the council that the \$10,500 figure was comparable to salaries paid to other city managers of cities the size to Lowell.

Again, Anderson voiced objection, and called for a cut to \$10,200 for the city manager. And again, the council voted unanimously for the cutback in Olson's pay.

The city council then voted unanimously to approve the 1968-69 budget which calls for an appropriation during the next fiscal year of \$232,104 with which to operate the city.

Set Lines for Kent Budget Boosted \$30,000

Virtually all of southeastern Kent County has been placed in the 3rd Supervisor's District in action this week by county officials to conform to the new "one man-one vote" system for county supervisors.

Unless thwarted by legal action, the reapportionment of the county takes effect immediately, according to county legal counsel George Cook.

Under the new set-up, all of the townships of Ada, Cascade, Vergennes, Bowne, Lowell and Caledonia, as well as part of Gaines Township and all of the City of Lowell will be represented by one man.

A total of 21 supervisors will be elected to guide the county government.

Of this number, 11 will represent areas that are within or immediately adjacent to Grand Rapids.

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The city manager also recommended the purchase of a 4-wheel drive fire-fighting truck, with one-half the cost paid by the City of Lowell, and one-quarter each by the Townships of Lowell and Vergennes.

According to Olson the major sources of revenue for operating the city will come from property taxes amounting to \$113,654; locally shared state taxes of \$80,300; \$10,000 from court fines; \$6,000 from cemetery revenues; \$10,000 from utility payments in lieu of taxes; and \$6,000 from the transfer of the Lee Fund.

On the debit side of the city ledger, the city manager lists \$54,300 for the street department; \$35,838 for the police department; \$12,600 for the sanitation division; and \$8,590 for the fire department.

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OK \$13,000 for Proposed Lift Station

Payment of not more than \$13,000 toward installation of a lift station to service the sewage needs of the west side of the city today had been approved by Lowell's city council.

The council, acting upon City Manager Bernard C. Olson's recommendation, voted to appropriate that amount as the city's share of the lift station.

Final cost of the project will depend upon new estimates to be submitted by the engineering firm of Williams and Works, which serves as consultants for both the city and the Lowell Development Corporation.

The latter had initiated the request for a lift station along Sibley Drive west of Valley Vista Drive.

Preliminary estimates, based on tentative surveys, had placed the approximate cost of the lift station at between \$22,000 and \$35,000.

Third Death from Train-Car Crash

Lowell's 1968 death toll rose to three last Wednesday when the third victim of the May 3rd car-train accident died in Grand Rapids.

Mrs. DeVona M. Matthews, 65, of Saranac, passed away in Butterworth Hospital after she failed to rally from multiple injuries suffered when a car in which she was a passenger was struck by a freight engine at the C&O crossing on Main St.
