Saturday's Santa Parade To Open Holiday Season

The holiday season in Lowell and the surrounding areas will fully get underway Saturday, December 6, when the Lowell Area Chamber of Commerce will present their annual Santa Claus Parade.

This year's parade, to assemble at 1:30 on Bowes Road, behind Thomet Chevrolet and Buick, is under the formation and direction of Mrs. Dolores Dey, Secretary of the Chamber.

"There'll be plenty of activity in the parade this year," Mrs. Dey revealed. "Thus far, we've got several good float entries,

plus, as in the past, the clowns from the Lowell Moose Lodge will be circulating throughout the crowd making a happy arrival for Santa."

A special feature in the parade will be an appearance by the Kent County 4-H Fair Queen and an entry by the Volunteer Fire Department of Bowne Township in Alto. Leading the parade will be the band from the Lowell Senior High and Lowell Junior High Schools.

Pom Pom girls, colorful in formation, from Lowell Senior High School will also be on

hand, as will the animated figurines that highlighted last year's parade.

Mrs. Dey revealed that the parade will leave Thomet's promptly at 2:00, heading East on Main Street. They will turn north on Washington Street and stop in the parking lot behind Lippert's Pharmacy, where all of the kids, young and old, can greet Santa.

"After the parade is over," Mrs. Dey concluded, "Santa Claus will be inside at the Ben Franklin Store on West Main Street."

Paper Drop Opened By Jaycees

Have you been saving your old newspapers? If so, now a place has been made available by the Lowell Area Jaycees for their disposal.

The Jaycees' new "paper drop box" has been installed at 725 East Main Street, Lowell, in a vacated building located just west of the American Legion Bowling Lanes on the corner of Horatio Street.

Scott Gietzen, project chairman, has revealed that the drop box has been reinstated, from

West Main to East Main, by the Jaycees to help preserve our natural resources.

"All papers placed in the drop box," Gietzen explained, "will be recycled to be used as insulation in the homes of this area's needy, part of 'Project Warmth' a Jaycee and East Kent Community Center cooperative effort."

"For those persons having no transportation for their papers," Gietzen added, "the Jaycees will make a monthly pick up which can be enlisted by calling 897-8566 or 897-8071."

Dr. Mueller Resigns As Councilman

At the December 1, 1975 meeting of the Lowell City Council, a letter of resignation was read from Councilman Dr. Herbert Mueller.

The letter was effective November 30, 1975. Dr. Mueller stated in this letter that lack of

time was hindering him from doing justice to his job as councilman.

Dr. Mueller's term of office was due to expire December 31, 1977, leaving him two years yet to serve.

The Ledger office heard of Dr. Mueller's plans to resign, some days ago from several sources. We were also told that the Council could be planning to appoint Councilman Hall in his place. Hall's term expires December 31, 1975. If Councilman Hall also resigned the City Council could have appointed him to Councilman Mueller's remaining two year term.

As it turned out, the Council did not mention such a plan; but word had spread and several people in the audience of 18 were ready to voice their displeasure if this had been the case.

Local Attorney, Frederick Althaus, Jr., cleared the air in the early minutes of the meeting when he asked councilpersons Rogers and Hall if they had any intention of resigning prior to the expiration of their terms. They both replied "no".

After some discussion, the Council decided that they would probably appoint the fourth runner up in the previous election; that person being Dean Collins.

According to the City Charter the Council has 30 days upon the resignation of a member to appoint someone to his place. Mayor Anderson said that the Council would announce their appointment at the next Council meeting.

A possible joint meeting with the City Council and the Planning Commission was discussed. The topic of the meeting will be to discuss possible rezoning of 2.6 acre parcel on Hunt Street from A-1 to A-3 and a 9 acre parcel on Foremost Street across from the Middle School from industrial development to rental housing.

This meeting was approved and slated for Monday, December 22.

Another joint meeting with the City Council and the Lowell Board of Education was set for Thursday, December 11. The reason for this meeting is to discuss the possibility of changing the right-of-way area in front of the High School.

The reason for this request stems from the problem arising from students standing in the street to smoke so as to be off the school grounds.

A letter from the Ada Township Board was read by Acting City Clerk, Nancy Woods. The Ada Township Board is requesting that the City of Lowell give consideration to the possibility of selling water to Ada.

They have been unable to make a suitable arrangement with the City of Grand Rapids to purchase water from them. They feel that being so close to Lowell, it should be feasible to buy water from Lowell rather than going to the expense of building and maintaining their own plant.

New councilmen, Robert Christiansen and Leo Pfaller were appointed to meet with the Ada Township Board and discuss the situation.

Acting City Manager, Tony Siciliano, announced that Lowell's Federal Revenue Sharing had been spent on garbage removal and a new dump truck for the Department of Public Works.

The meeting was adjourned at about 9:00 p.m.

Pearce Burton who was arrested by Lowell Police for carrying a concealed weapon (a sawed off shotgun), has demanded examination in Kent County's 63rd District Court. Released on a \$2,000 personal bond, he will go before the court on December 4.

Taken into custody Saturday afternoon were three juvenile shoplifters who were caught at Eberhard's store on West Main. The following day, Sunday, two more subjects, both juveniles, were caught at the same store for the same offense.

Released to appear at a later date in the 63rd District Court of Kent County on charges of larceny under \$100 was Willie Tolliver of Ada. The incident at Attwood Corporation, involved the taking of money from a purse.

George Staal Iris Grower, Dies



Funeral services were held Friday afternoon, November 28, at the Roth-Gerst Funeral Home in Lowell for George W. Staal.

Mr. Staal of 803 Avery Street, Lowell, passed away Monday evening, November 24, at the age of 66 following a lingering illness.

The Rev. J. Marion DeVinnery, former pastor of the First United Methodist Church of Lowell officiated at the services, with burial following in Lowell's Oakwood Cemetery.

Born June 22, 1909, in Keene Township, Mr. Staal had resided all of his life in the Lowell area. In 1970, he retired from Lowell Manufacturing and pursued his hobby of growing irises.

Behind his home on Avery Street, Mr. Staal had a terraced garden featuring over 200 hybrid varieties of irises. The garden, a delight to the eye of flower gardeners in particular, was equally appealing to all who just had a love for growing things. He played host to many garden club members on tour.

Staal's interest in growing iris started when new neighbors moved in next door, bringing with them several varieties of iris. As his garden grew, so did his popularity, and he spent a lot of his time filling orders for customers who wanted a garden just like George's.

Besides his wife, Esther, who also shared his gardening interests, Mr. Staal is survived by two daughters, Mr. and Mrs. Gerald (Sandra) Boone of Grand Rapids, and Miss Sheryl Staal of Lowell; two grandchildren, Stacey and Toore Boone; and a good friend, Jan Mangunson of Lowell.

He also leaves two brothers, Gerald of Lowell, Claude of Orleans, Michigan; one sister, Mrs. Albert Ford of Lowell; and several nieces and nephews.

In a report released by the Lowell Police Department, this week, figures showed the month of November as being the 'safest' month of the year for traffic accidents in the City of Lowell.

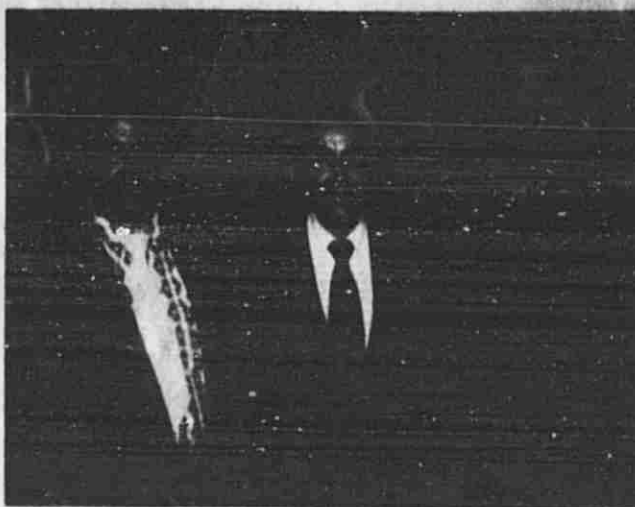
During this period, Lowell officers investigated only two property damage and one personal injury accident in the City of Lowell.

Saranac's Milk Plant Is Now Condemned



Taken about 20 years ago, this photo of the Saranac Milk Plant shows the facility in its prime. At that time the plant was owned by Wilson Dairy and was a collection center for canned milk brought in from throughout the area. Products manufactured in the plant were cottage cheese, ice cream mix, etc. while surplus milk was trucked to the Detroit area.

Once a flourishing industry in the Village of Saranac, the old milk plant is now a community eyesore as it stands in ruins in the heart of the community. Recently public officials posted "condemned" signs around the building and apparently something in the way of demolition or repair will be slated for the near future.

At one time the milk plant provided employment for about 40 people and operated 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Probably the greatest strides in the business were made under the ownership of Wilson Dairy. It was this company who installed all of the up-to-date milk drying equipment and building

additions during the strike. At that time, most of the milk was brought in from local farms in cans and no doubt farm automation was as much a cause of the demise of the business as anything else.

In the late sixties Wilson Dairy sold the complete operation to Michigan Milk Producers (a farmer-owned co-op) who had big plans to build an automatic cottage cheese processing plant and other improvements.

Several years ago the building and land was sold by MMFA and the structure has continued to deteriorate since that time.
