# Saturday's Santa Parade To Open Holiday Season

The holiday season in Lowell and the surrounding areas will fully get underway Saturday, December 6, when the Lowell Area Chamber of Commerce will present their annual Santa Claus Parade.

This year's parade, to as-semble at 1:30 on Bowes Road, behind Thomet Chevrolet and Buick, is under the formation and direction of Mrs. Dolores Dey, Secretary of the Chamber.

"There'll be plenty of activity in the parade this year," Mrs. Dey revealed. "Thus far, we've got several good float entries,

plus, as in the past, the clowns from the Lowell Moose Lodge will be circulating throughout the crowd making a happy arrival for Santa."

A special feature in the parade will be an appearance by the Kent County 4-H Fair Queen and an entry by the Volunteer Fire Department of Bowne Township in Alto. Leading the parade will the band from the Lowell Senior High and Lowell Junior High Schools.

Pom Pom girls, colorful in formation, from Lowell Senior High School will also be on hand, as will the animated figurines that highlighted last year's parade.

Mrs. Dey revealed that the parade will leave Thomet's promptly at 2:00, heading East on Main Street. They will turn north on Washington Street and stop in the parking lot behind Lippert's Pharmacy, where all of the kids, young and old, can greet Santa.

The Ledger office heard of Dr. Mueller's plans to resign, some days ago from several sources. We were also told that the Council could be planning to appoint Councilman Hall in his place. Hall's term expires December 31, 1975. If Councilman Hall also resigned the City Council could have appointed him to Councilman Mueller's

remaining two year term. As it turned out, the Council did not mention such a plan; but word had spread and several people in the audience of 18 were ready to voice their displeasure if this had been the

Local Attorney, Frederick Althaus, Jr., cleared the air in the early minutes of the meeting when he asked councilpersons Rogers and Hall if they had any intention of resigning prior to the expiration of their terms. They both replied "no".

After some discussion, the Council decided that they would probably appoint the fourth runner up in the previous election; that person being Dean

According to the City Charter the Council has 30 days upon the resignation of a member to appoint someone to his place. Mayor Anderson said that the Council would announce their appointment at the next Council

A possible joint meeting with the City Council and the Planning Commission was discussed. The topic of the meeting will be to discuss possible rezoning of 2.6 acre parcel on Hunt Street from A-1 to A-3 and a 9 acre parcel on Foremost Street across from the Middle School from industrial development to rental housing.

This meeting was approved and slated for Monday, Decem-

Another joint meeting with the City Council and the Lowell Board of Education was set for Thursday, December 11. The reason for this meeting is to discuss the possibility of changing the right-of-way area in front of the High School.

The reason for this request stems from the problem arising from students standing in the street to smoke so as to be off the school grounds.

A letter from the Ada Township Board was read by Acting City Clerk, Nancy Woods. The Ada Township Board is request-ing that the City of Lowell give consideration to the possibility of selling water to Ada.

They have been unable to make a suitable arrangement with the City of Grand Rapids to purchase water from them. They feel that being so close to Lowell, it should be feasible to buy water from Lowell rather than going to the expense of building and maintaining their own plant.

New councilmen, Robert Christiansen and Leo Pfaller were appointed to meet with the Ada Township Board and discuss the situation.

Acting City Manager, Tony Siclianio, announced that Lowell's Federal Revenue Sharing had been spent on garbage removal and a new dump truck for the Department of Public

The meeting was adjourned at about 9:00 p.m.



NATURAL RESOURCES **COMMISSION ACTION** funder authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended)

#### WARMWATER FISH REGULATIONS

The Natural Resources Commission, at its meeting on August 15, 1975, under authority of Act 230, P.A. 1925, as amended, amended the August 11, 1972, order regarding warmwater fish regulations to read as follows effective January 1, 1976. It shall be unlawful to take the following named species except during the open seasons and daily limits prescribed (statewide regulations apply unless otherwise restricted):

State wide open seasons on all waters not otherwise closed to fishing shall be from the Saturday preceding Memorial Day through December 31 on largemouth and smallmouth bass; May 15 through February on walleye, sauger, nothern pike, and muskellunge (including tiger muskellunge). The dally catch limit shall be 5 singly or in combination for largemouth and smallmouth bass, walleye, sauger, and northern pike; 1 for muskel-(including lunge muskellunge).

The above regulations apply except that walleye and sauger may be taken at any time from the Detroit and St. Clair rivers, Lake St. Clair. and Lake Erie; and that muskellunge in Lake St. Clair, St. Clair and Detroit rivers may be taken only from the first Saturday in June through December 15 of each year.
