Frank Houghton, Retired Public Official Passes



Frank L. Houghton, aged 95, former Lowell Township official for many years, died Christmas Day, December 25, 1975, in Cherry Creek Nursing Home, after a brief illness.

Mr. Houghton was born in Lowell, in 1880, but spent most of his life as a farmer on Fifty-Second Street and Morse Lake areas. He was a member of the Alto United Methodist Church.

Before entering the Cherry Creek Nursing Home, Mr. Houghton resided at 613 Avery Street, Lowell.

He was Township Justice of the Peace for 22 years and Lowell Township Supervisor for 19 years, retiring in 1957. While serving on the Kent County Board of Supervisors, he served on the Airport Committee many years, and also on the Legislation and Equalization Committees. He also served the Town-

Bonding Ordinance Passed On Water Treatment Plant

Robert Christiansen Is Elected City Mayor



Monday night's meeting of the Lowell City Council was called to order by Councilman Harold Jefferies at 8:00 p.m. The four new councilmen Arthur Warning, Leo Pfaller, Dean Collins and Robert Christiansen were sworn in by Acting City Clerk, Nancy Wood.

Elections for Mayor and Mayor Pro Tem were then held. Bob Christiansen was elected Mayor and Leo Pfaller was elected Mayor Pro Tem. Both were elected by unanimous vote.

The remainder of the meeting was then conducted by the new Mayor.

It was announced that Ivan Blough's request for rezoning his property on Foreman Street from single family (A-1) to multiple family (A-3) had been approved at the December 29th meeting of the Planning Commission. A public hearing on the matter was set for the February 2, 1976 City Council Meeting.

Representatives from Williams and Works were pres-

ent and announced that they had received bids on the clarifying equipment for the new water treatment plant. The low bid came in at \$52,000.00 and the estimate had been \$50,000.00. A request for a letter of intent from the City was made by the company that would allow them \$4,000.00 if for some reason the city did not take shipment on the equipment. A motion to file a letter of intent with this company was passed with only dissenting vote from Councilman Warning. Bob Cooper from the finance department of Williams and Works asked the council to pass the bonding ordinance for the water treatment plant. He explained that planned completion of the plant was already near the end of the construction season of 1976 and that any delays now might mean that the plant couldn't be completed until the following spring. Councilman Warning protested against an immediate vote because he felt that the council had not had adequate time to review the ordinance. The issue was tabled until the end of the meeting and at that time the entire ordinance was explained to the Council by Mr. Cooper. After the explanation was given the ordinance was passed with only one "no" vote, which came from Councilman Warning. The ordinance will probably be published in next week's Grand Valley Ledger.

A mileage allowance for the City Dog Warden of \$20.00 per month for three months was approved by the Council. At the end of this period the Dog Warden will report his mileage and a set figure will be estab-

lished. It was also approved to pay the Dog Warden for mileage over the past year totaling \$420.00. It was also established that in the future all dog complaints shall be channeled through the police department.

The meeting was adjourned at 9:45 p.m.

Kuiper With Air Force

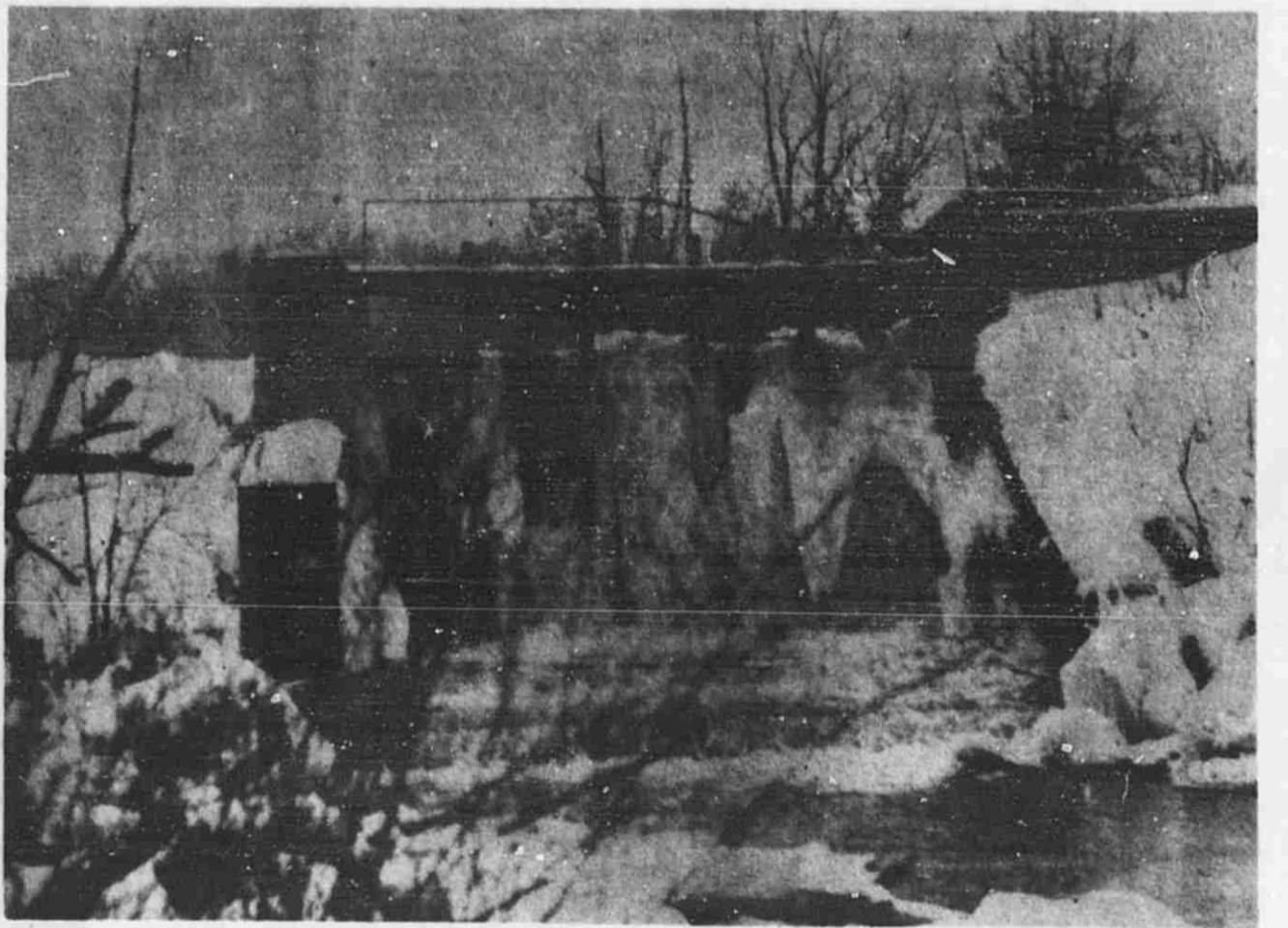

In his role as regional minister, Dr. Green founded churches, held evangelistic meetings, sought better salaries for pastors and poured lots of oil on troubled waters in the Wolverine State.

Even when he celebrated his 100th birthday on January 18, 1975, Dr. Green refused to accept retirement which he took at the age of 96 from the Christian Church in Mantion.

Always a devoted family man, Dr. Green, twice a widower, remarried at the age of 94.

Funeral services for Dr. Green were held December 29 at the Mesick United Methodist Church where he once preached. Burial was made in Mesick.

He is survived by his wife Julia, two sons and a daughter.
