Grass Fires!



Spring has sprung! And with it comes the annual upsurge of grass fires as residents, with rakes in hands, seek to rid their yards and fields of collective winter rubbish.

The campaign 'to wipe out cancer in your lifetime' will be concluded on May 4 and 5, when the metropolitan areas will hold their annual "Lites-On" Drive.

There are 1,500,000 Americans alive today who have been cured of cancer, that is, free of the disease at least five years after diagnosis and treatment. Cancer, a large groups of diseases characterized by uncontrolled growth and spread of abnormal cells, strikes at any age. It kills more children aged 3 to 14 than any other disease.

According to Mrs. Boyd, the American Society has helped over 2,000 cancer patients in Kent County; has rehabilitation programs for Colostomy, Mastecdomy and Laryngectomy patients; is offering Free Hemoc-

A concentrated effort will be cult tests starting May 12; is educating approximately 2,000 adults and 20,000 youth annually about Cancer's warning signals and safeguards.
