| to the State Administrative Board for study. This is standard procedure for all such bids. The SAB will give its report in 10 days to two weeks. <br> This part of M-21 will be a four-lane, divided highway, with several bad hills and curves being eliminated. Construction is to start in the last part of August and is to be finished in the fall of 1978. Federal funds will pay for about 70 percent of the cost and the MDHT will fund the remainder. <br> 3. Bids will be opened August 18 on resurfacing, major shoulder work and a passing lane on M- 91 from near M- 57 in Greenville south about four and a half miles to Ellis Road. A passing lane will be built at Ellis Road for northbound traffic, thus eliminating traffic congestion and increasing safety. Work is expected to start in the fall. <br> 4.
