## Michigan Artrain Is Coming



### A Celebration of the Creative American Spirit

The Michigan Artrain will visit Lowell sometime late in November or early December.

First Lady Mrs. William Milliken has announced a three month extension of the current tour. Lowell is one of nine communities to be visited by the Artrain in the coming months. Local representatives met recently with Artrain staff and consultants at a state-wide workshop at Kellogg Center on the MSU Campus in East Lansing. Those in attendance from Lowell were: Ray Quada, general chairman of the project, Rommie Moore, promotions chairman, Sam Ciluffo, facilities chairman, Don Kelly, education chairman, and Dolores Dey,

activities director. The Artrain is always free to the public, but expenses of \$2,000 to \$3,000 must be raised to pay for such things as electrical power and heat for the train.

Four different siding locations are currently under study by the committee but the siding near the depot is preferred. The Artrain will stay in Lowell for four or five days and will include a Saturday and Sunday. ### Christoff & Sons Ask City's Help In Plant Expansion

Wendell Christoff of Christoff & Sons, here in Lowell, approached the Lowell City Council Monday evening with a request to purchase 2½ acres of city-owned property on Gee Drive.

The company has already purchased nine acres on Foreman Road, next to Root-Lowell and across Foreman from the Middle School.

Because of the high water table created by Cherry Creek, the company would need the city-owned property to build their new 20,000 sq. ft., pre-cast concrete structure.

The company's expansion will create about ten new jobs here, and of course a higher tax base.

The property in question is currently zoned agricultural and Christoff asked that it be given consideration to be changed, as it is useless to them unless it is zoned industrial.

Christoff also asked that the Council give consideration to granting tax relief under Public Act 198, 1974, on the purchase of about \$100,000.00 worth of equipment.

Christoff noted that this was an informal presentation to get the general feeling of the Council before the company invested money in the proper documents.

The council said that they would refer the request for the land purchase and zoning change to the Planning Commission and would schedule a public hearing necessary to establish the plant rehabilitation

project that would be an exhibition in itself and provide enduring benefits to its host communities.

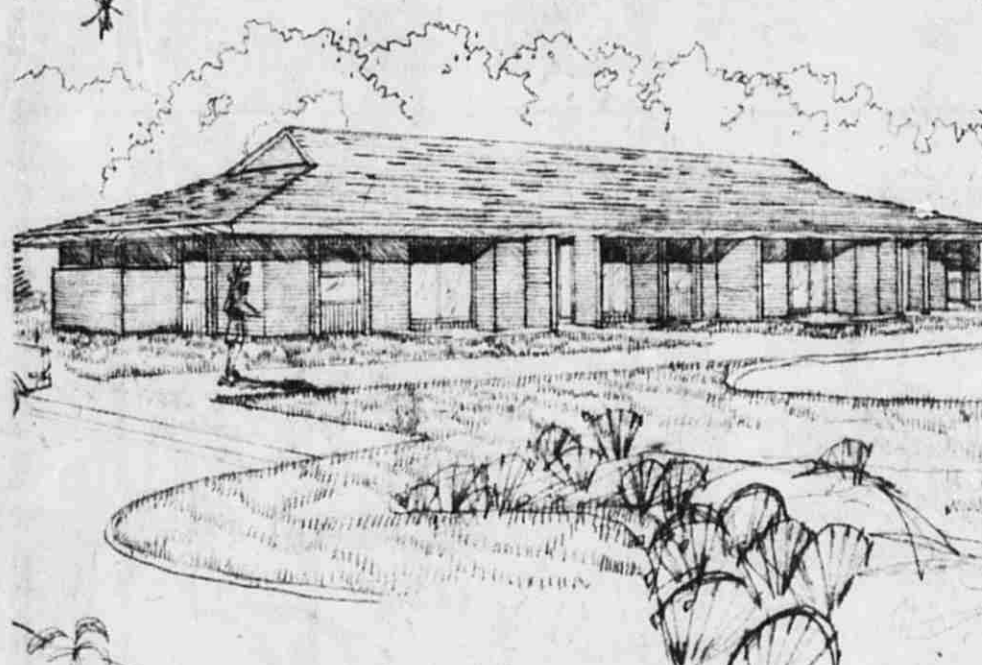

### Schneider Manor Expansion Under Construction

Construction has started on the 5th unit of Schneider Manor, Bows Road and Lincoln Lake Avenue, part of a rental housing complex, started in 1970, for mobile, retired Lowell area persons.

Expected to be completed early next year, the 52x141 foot, one-story building will have six, 1-bedroom and two, 2-bedroom units, says Alexander Grant of Ada, the architect.

The \$185,000 building will have a wood frame with a veneer of salmon brick. Twelve carport spaces and off street parking for 28 cars are planned.

Features of each apartment include self-storing screens and

storm windows, a sliding glass door to patio, kitchen, living room, bathroom and a walk-in closet besides other closets for clothes and linen, Grant states.

Lowell Area Housing, Inc., which runs the complex, reports it has a long waiting list.

Clark Plumbing and Heating of Lowell will do the plumbing, Rickert Electric also of Lowell has the contract for installing the wiring and fixtures, Bel-Aire Heating and Air Conditioning of Grand Rapids will install the heating system, and Walter V. Graham of Grand Rapids is the general contractor.

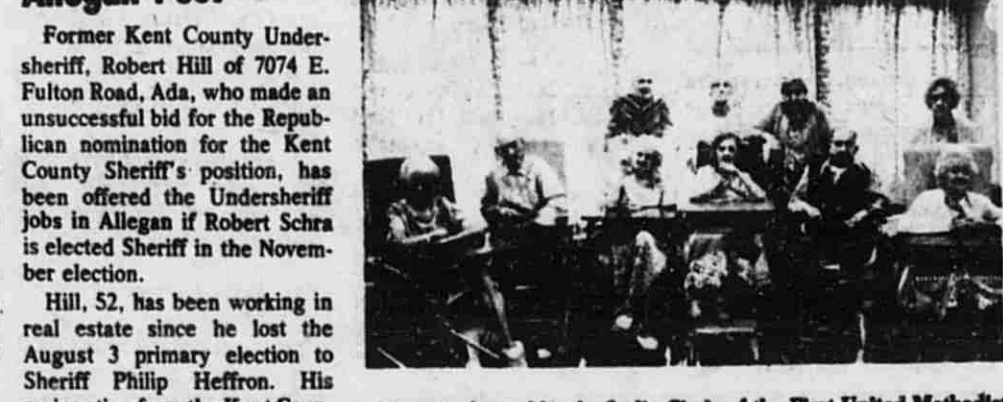

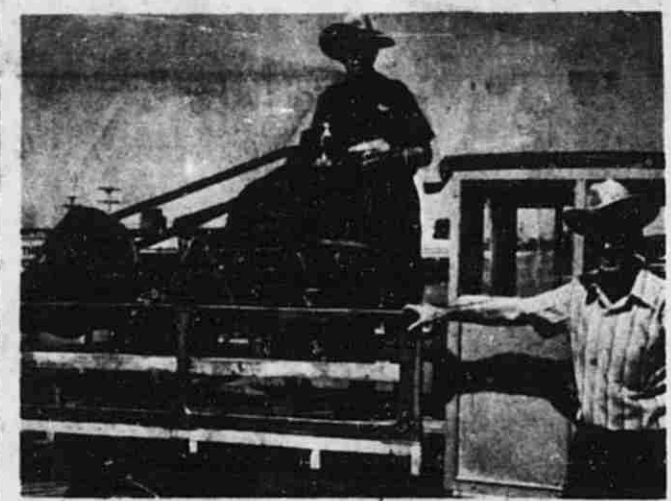
