# **Ask City's Help** In Plant Expansion

& Sons, here in Lowell, approached the Lowell City Council Monday evening with a request to purchase 21/2 acres of city-owned property on Gee

The company has already purchased nine acres on Foreman Road, next to Root-Lowell and across Foreman from the

Middle School. Because of the high water table created by Cherry Creek, the company would need the city-owned property to build their new 20,000 sq. ft., pre-cast concrete structure.

The company's expansion will create about ten new jobs here, and of course a higher tax base.

The property in question is currently zoned agricultural and Christoff asked that it be given consideration to be changed, as it is useless to them unless it is zoned industrial.

Christoff also asked that the Council give consideration to granting tax relief under Public Act 198, 1974, on the purchase of about \$100,000.00 worth of

# Nellist Resigns

Darwin Nellist, 44, fire chief of the Ada Township Volunteer Fire Department the last two years and a member of the fire department 24 years, has resigned that post effective Oct. 1.

The township board accepted 'with regret" his resignation submitted recently in a letter and appointed Capt. William Cramer, 43, to fill the vacancy. Ada Supervisor John Forshar lauded Nellist for his long service.

"Nellist has done an outstanding job as a fireman and chief and has been a credit to the department as well as to the community," said Forshar.

Nellist wrote that he has been promoted to construction superintendent by the Kent County Road Commission and the added responsibilities make it impossible for him to spend the appropriate time as member and chief of the fire department. He was assistant chief seven
