Two young fishermen, late Monday afternoon, found the body of a 25-year-old Ada man in the wreckage of his automobile off Pettis Avenue, near Honey Creek.

The body has been identified as that of Brian Reintges. The crash apparently happened sometime Sunday night.

Sawyer To Campaign In Lowell Thursday

Republican candidate Harold S. Sawyer will bring his "meet the people" campaign for Congress to Lowell Thursday, October 7.



Harold S. Sawyer, Republican, will seek the Fifth District Congressional seat in the November 2 General Election. His opponent will be incumbent, Richard F. VanderVeen, Democrat.

Sawyer, who won the Aug. 3 Republican primary nomination to face Democratic incumbent Richard F. VanderVeen in the No. 2 election, is planning a heavy day of campaigning.

At 1 p.m., he will meet with an American government class at Lowell Senior High School, where he'll outline his views and discuss issues with the students.

From there, Sawyer will go to a "meet the candidate" coffee at the home of Keith and Marcia Caldwell, 555 Foreman, 4 p.m.

Mrs. Caldwell said two senior citizen groups, the Golden Swingers and Lowell's Senior Neighbors, have been extended special invitations to the coffee, but emphasized that the coffee will be open to the public.

During the latter part of the afternoon, Sawyer will go to Attwood Corporation and Root-Lowell Manufacturing, where he'll shake hands with workers.

Lowell Planning Commission

Changes In Liquor-By-The-Glass Ordinance Are Recommended

Lowell City Manager Ray Quada opened the discussion of changing the present liquor-by-the-glass ordinance at the City's Planning Commission meeting Monday night by reviewing the four sections that bar owners would like to see changed.

Those four sections were in regard to a 150 seating capacity requirement; 75 square feet of off street parking per occupant; minimum of 50 percent food sales; and the physical separation of the bar from the dining area.

Commissioner Leo Pfaller opened the discussion by stating that he would approve the removal of all four of the above mentioned sections of the ordinance. The remaining commissioners were polled by Chairman Bill Doyle.

All but commissioner Orval McKay agreed for the most part with Pfaller's view, McKay said that he would like to see the Ordinance left as is.

The parking and food percentage sections were discussed by the Commissioners, but the motion voted on was to abolish all four sections now in the ordinance. The motion passed with only one nay vote which came from McKay.

This action by the Planning Commission is only a recommendation to the City Council. The Council will undoubtedly vote on the subject at their next regular meeting Monday, October 4.

The Planning Commission was approached by Wendall

Christoff, of Christoff & Sons, concerning the sale and rezoning of approximately 2 acres of city owned property on the corner of Foreman and Gee Drive.

Christoff & Sons currently have an option to buy a nine acre parcel to the east of this property, and would like the City's two acres for future expansion.

Commissioner McKay said he would not favor the sale of rezoning because the two acre site is used as a park by youngsters in that area, and it also serves as a buffer between the industry on the east and residences on the west of it.

The rest of the commissioners agreed with McKay, with the exception of Commissioner Pfal-

ler and Chairman Doyle. Pfaller made a motion that the City sell the two acre site, but the motion was not even seconded.

The meeting was adjourned following the City Manager's report and a few remarks from the commissioners.

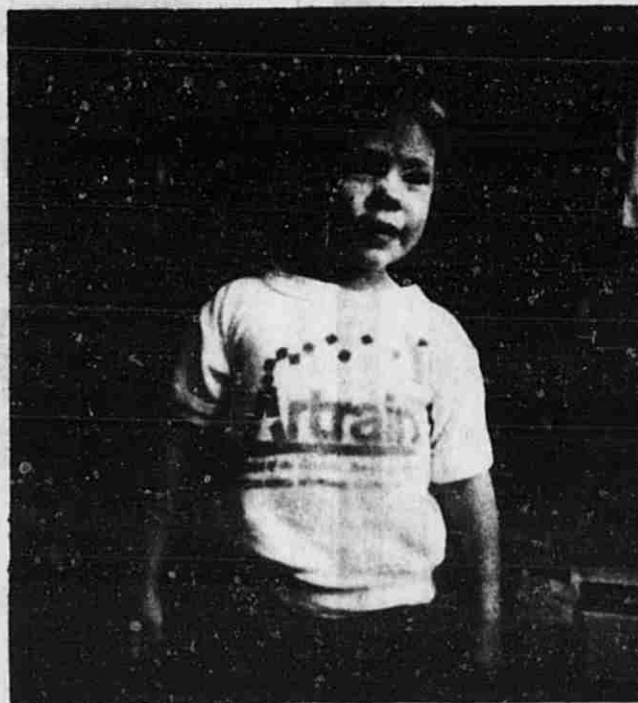
No School October 6

'What's cooking' in Michigan

With crisp weather signaling the beginning of fall, what better time to go to your local city or farmer's market to enjoy the aromas and bright colors of Michigan's harvest season.

This trip to the market is a treat my wife and I reserve for Saturday mornings but most markets are open several other days during the week. They range in size from the huge Eastern market in Detroit to open tailgates on pickup trucks in parking lots, but all are fun.

If you haven't tried it yet, do. You should be cautioned, however, that many people find it habit forming.

A part of the "neatness" of the trip to a farmer's market is the opportunity to see a real farmer, the same person who grows the food, behind the counter. It also offers a chance to ask questions about how the product got to the market and I have yet to be refused a reply.

Why not look especially for Michigan produce and make a dinner "event" from your collection? It's an excellent time for fresh lettuce from the fields as well as tomatoes and, in my mind, that stands for salad.

Additional: How about slicing a few onions in, adding to the flavor. Cucumbers, a few carrots, and sliced celery are just too tempting to see all that fresh produce and not buy "a couple of heads of this and a bag of that and a pound of what's over there."

When we first started our Saturday morning forages into our local market, we ended up with our arms full of small bags of fruits and vegetables. We

don't do that any more. No, we don't buy less. We just start with a large shopping bag from home because we know we're going to buy more than we really need. Try it, you'll like it. In fact, maybe I'll see you there.

AMWAY IS FINED IN FEDERAL COURT

A \$1,500 fine was given to Amway Corp. of Ada last week in Federal Court, after they plead no contest to 15 counts of interstate commerce act violations, which occurred in 1975.

Stephen W. Karr, U.S. Magistrate, suspended \$500 of the penalty and 13 other counts against the firm were dismissed.

Violations involved allowing drivers to drive longer than 8 hours in seven consecutive days, and failing to require driver's driving records each 12 months.

One side comes up with a version that is 800 pages long, the other side tops that by 1,200 pages and riddles it with loopholes.

Label both of them "tax reform" bills. If it weren't so serious, it would almost sound funny.

But the reality is that the House Ways and Means Committee spent the last four months of 1975 drawing up a tax bill that would offer the first significant tax reform in a decade.

Most senior citizens centers and programs in Kent and Ionia counties receive part of their funding from the Older Americans Act.

Senior citizens, living on fixed incomes, have been severely affected by inflation. In the Ways and Means Committee, of which I am a member, I have co-sponsored legislation that would prohibit imposing a ceiling on cost-of-living increases for social security recipients.

The 11 Senators and 7 Representatives consider each provision that differs in the two bills. After several days of debate and some necessary compromise, they agree on the way the final version of the bill should read.

If they fail to agree on even a single provision, the bill "dies in conference."

The House and Senate tax bills each have 251 separate sections. When the House-Senate Tax Conference began August 25th, there were 237 points of difference between the two bills.

By the end of the conference, it is expected that government will work efficiently for them in meeting their special needs.

Salmon Hold Spotlight... The big news streamside in Western Michigan is the return of the mighty coho and chinook salmon to their "parent" streams.

Fall migrations have begun in earnest with the great rivers choked full of these heavy-weighted fish.

Good action is being had by Grand River anglers from the Grand Haven pier on up to the 6th Street Dam in downtown Grand Rapids.

"Restrictive gear" fishermen are taking many salmon as they stack up against the dam.

Also good salmon bets are the Kalamazoo River runs which have been heavy for almost two weeks now.

Upwards of 2 million coho and chinook salmon are expected to choke Michigan waters this year.

Point allocations remain the same as last year except for the 100-point archery deer season.

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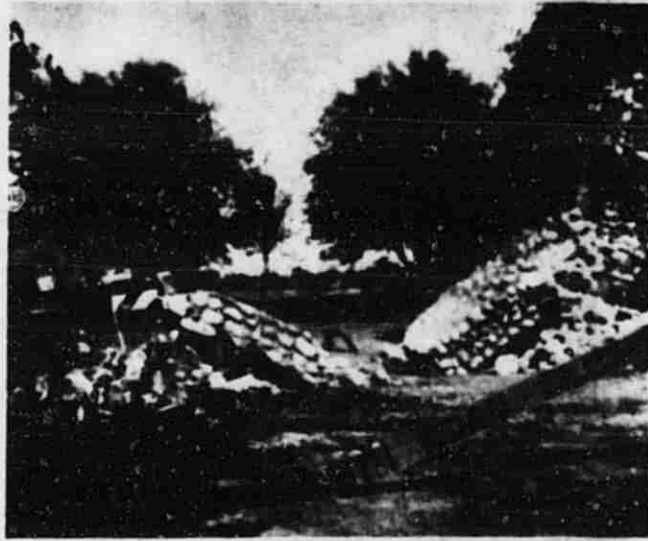
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Arch Rebuilt

Fall Festival Is This Weekend



The beautiful arch at the entrance to Fallsburg Park, destroyed by a tragic automobile crash in July of 1976, is being rebuilt by the Kent County Parks Department. The stone arch was erected in 1930 by Edwin Fallas in memory of his father and mother, William and Wealthy Fallas who brought him to Fallsburg in 1845. A picture of the arch taken from the pages of the 1936 Lowell paper has provided a perfect blueprint for the reconstruction project. The bronze plaque inset in the original structure will be intact when the project is completed.

In July of this year, a landmark which has designated the entrance to Fallsburg Park since 1930, was destroyed when it was hit by an automobile. This weekend, October 2 and 3, when visitors attend the annual Fall Festival at the Park, they will appreciate the fact that the familiar arch, taken for granted all these years, will again span the road into the park. The reconstruction project is being completed by the Kent County Parks Department, explained Mrs. Leonora Tower, president of the West Central Michigan Historical Society. The Fallsburg Park area will be buzzing this week end, Saturday and Sunday, when the Fall Festival featuring an arts & crafts show, will be held, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Spaces are still available for the Arts and Crafts show—Jams and relishes and/or baked goods will be welcomed at the

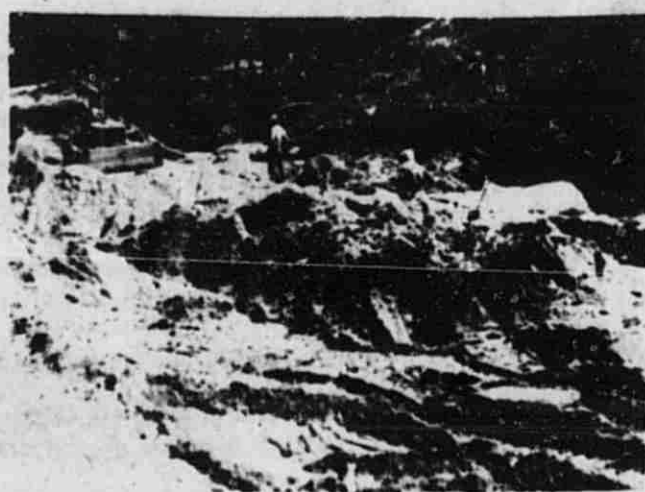
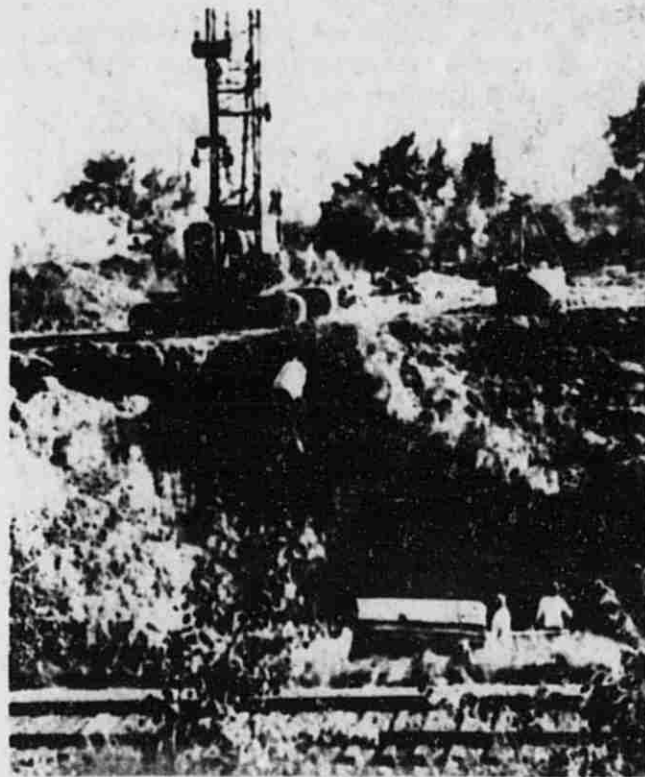

Various phases of the \$4,067,785 rebuilding of the two-lane, M-21 road to a four-lane divided highway from the East Beltline to Ada are well underway.

A crane at the left lowers a bundle of wood for forms for concrete pillars for a new bridge over the Grand Trunk & Western Railroad tracks at the north end of Forest Hills Ave. and Heather Lane SE. In the upper right photo, sections of large corrugated metal pipe for a culvert under the new eastbound lanes at East Lake have been placed, and a bulldozer shoves sand over the piping. A creek connects East Lake, between Int. 96 and Heather Lane, with Echo Lake. In the lower right photo, a stilly crew makes changes in the lines.

Much of the right-of-way for the eastbound lanes has been cleared of trees and bushes and some grading has taken place. Kamminga & Roodvoets of Grand Rapids is the general contractor.
