The Kent County Mobile Health Unit will be in Lowell on Wednesday, October 13, at the Clark-Ellis American Legion Hall at 805 East Main Street, from 9 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 to 4 p.m.

The clinic is open to all ages with no appointments necessary. A public health nurse provides counseling on health needs and gives referrals, immunizations, vision and hearing screening, diabetes and sickle cell anemia tests, electro-cardiograms, pregnancy tests and emergency first aid.

The success of the world-wide Youth for Understanding program is beginning to pose problems for the Lowell High School teaching staff, Board of Education members were told during their regular meeting Monday night.

Seeking a ruling from the Board, High School Principal Dennis McMahon stated that although Lowell already has three exchange students and expects one more in January, he ha. received requests from local

a. es to accept additional foreign students who are now attending school in the United States but in different areas.

These students are from famlies with whom Lowell students lived abroad during the summer and who, apparently, would rather come to Lowell than stay in the areas to which they have been assigned.

While it is gratifying to know that Lowell students are making such a positive impression in other countries, the problem arises in that coping with a variety of foreign speaking students takes a certain amount of time in each classroom and adding students not actually assigned here would increase the problem to where it could interfere with the teaching pro-

In checking with YFU headquarters in Ann Arbor, Mc-Mahon was told that students are usually assigned on the basis of one for every 300 high school students and according to the 972 local high school enrollment. Lowell is already at its workable quota.

The board turned McMahon's questions over to the policy

Although the current school year is already in its fourth week, not all working contracts have been settled.

According to negotiation committee reports, the secretaries and custodians are nearing agreement.

Board member David Miller discussed and distributed a superintendent's evaluation form to all members. He asked that the form be studied, filled out, and returned to him at the next board meeting. Nola Bryan, a steady attendant of board meetings, asked to be recognized and registered a complaint that at least one women was not appointed as prime representative on the committee. Stating that she was by no means a "women's libber," she protested that since she has had children in the system for the last 16 years and

she considers mothers just as Drive and Foreman Road. interested in extra curricular more women should be placed on board study committees.

Board President Roger Roberts concurred and said he would act upon the suggestion in future selections and that women's input would be present in the current study group.

## Board Probes No Progress On Land Sale

Bryan's point was definite—that 4. Christoff also requested rezoning of the city land if sold, Christoff's attorney, Bob Cooper, presented a request that plant rehabilitation districts and Ottawa and a nine acre parcel on Foreman Road that the company has an option to buy.

As for the request to sell the city land, the council basically adhered to the Planning Commission's decision of not to sell the property, because it serves as a park and a buffer zone between industry and residences in the area.

Christoff offered a compromise to trade some of the land on the south end of the city property and land on the south end of the nine acres that the company has an option on to the east. This would leave some land for a park and still give the company suitable building space for future expansion.

The council offered to arrange a special meeting of the Planning Commission to review the

The council voted to establish a plant rehabilitation district and industrial development district on the Hudson Street and Ottawa Street location where Christoff and Sons are currently in operation. However, such districts were not established on the nine acre parcel on Foreman Road, because the possibility exists that if Christoffs did not pick up the option on the property an undesirable industry could apply for the tax relief on that location and it would be out of the city's hands.

This decision was made after attorney Bob Cooper explained that districts, once established. stay with the land, not the company applying for them.

The council agreed to establish the districts on this property if Christoffs exercised their option and bought the land. Christoff stated that they would probably not buy the land unless something could be worked out on the city owned land.

After two council meetings and one Planning Commission meeting in which the sale of the city owned property has been discussed at length, it is still not certain, but does not look probable that the city will sell the

In a Tuesday morning conversation with Wendell Christoff. he stated that he had instructed the city manager Ray Quada not to call a special meeting of the Planning Commission and that the company will in all probability relocate out of Lowell, as there are no other suitable sites here and too many problems were arising with the one in

## Over 2,200 Meals industrial development districts be established for Chistoff and Son's property at Hudson and Ottawa and a nine acce parcel on

The Lowell Area School Food Service Program is celebrating National Hot Lunch Week October 10 through October 16 this year. On Wednesday of that week, every school in the United States that participates will have the same menu. "Along with the rest of the schools, we would like to call attention to the program in our area, relates Mrs. Marilyn Bovee, food service supervisor.

"We serve between 2,200 and 2,300 lunches every day in all of our schools, plus about 200 a la carte items in the Senior High School," Mrs. Bovee explained. 'This includes the Head Start Program and once every month we serve the Senior Citizens in the Alto Elementary School."

"There are three base kitchens and five serving areas. We transport food from the Middle School to the Bushnell and Runciman Schools. There are 22 full and part time cooks in all of the schools who are dedicated in providing the students with food of excellent quality.

We bake all of our bread, cakes, cookies, desserts and casseroles "from scratch." We are very proud of the fact that we have not raised the price of our lunches in the past three years in spite of the constant rise in food prices.

"The low price-35c for elementary school students, and 40c for middle and senior high school students-and the high quality of the lunches result in above-average participation which, in turn, keeps the cost of the program down.'

Mrs. Bovee explained, "on Monday, September 27, we opened a snack bar in the study hall in the Senior High School. We are open for the first 15 minutes of every hour and 1/2 hour before school in the morn-

'We offer this to the students instead of the vending machines many schools have that some dispense what we call junk food . . candy, pop, potato chips,

We sell at our snack bar ice cream, fruit, drinks, fresh fruits, milk and cookies, made in our own kitchen.

"The money from this snack bar goes to our school food service fund, and not an outside vending company."

"We operate under federal guidelines and are evaluated at least once every year by the State Board of Education. We always pass this test with good reports. At this time proof must be presented that every Type A meal contains the correct amount of protein, fruit, vegetables, bread, and milk.

"The Type A meal pattern is set to meet 1/3 of the daily minimum requirements of school-age children. This is why, boys and girls, we have to see that this is on your tray every day and why we urge you to eat it. We know a hungry child cannot learn, or even be alert, in the classroom, and we consider our lunches a lesson in good nutrition."

Youth for Understanding program is beginning to pose problems for the Lowell High School teaching staff, Board of Education members were told during their regular meeting Monday night.

## Board Probes No Progress On Land Sale

The council voted to establish a plant rehabilitation district d industrial development district on the Hudson Street and Ottawa Street location where Christoff and Sons are currently operation. However, such districts were not established on the nine acre parcel on Foreman Road, because the possibility exists that if Christoffs did not pick up the option on the operty an undesirable industry could apply for the tax relief on that location and it would be out of the city's hands.

This decision was made after attorney Bob Cooper explained that districts, once established. stay with the land, not the

company applying for them.

The council agreed to establish the districts on this property if Christoffs exercised their option and bought the land. Christoff stated that they would probably not buy the land unless something could be worked out

on the city owned land. After two council meetings and one Planning Commission meeting in which the sale of the city owned property has been discussed at length, it is still not certain, but does not look probable that the city will sell the

In a Tuesday morning conversation with Wendell Christoff. he stated that he had instructed the city manager Ray Quada not to call a special meeting of the Planning Commission and that the company will in all probability relocate out of Lowell, as there are no other suitable sites here and too many problems were arising with the one in

The Lowell Area School Food Service Program is celebrating National Hot Lunch Week October 10 through October 16 this year. On Wednesday of that week, every school in the United States that participates will have the same menu. "Along with the rest of the schools, we would like to call attention to the program in our area, relates Mrs. Marilyn Bovee, food service supervisor.

We serve between 2,200 and 2,300 lunches every day in all of our schools, plus about 200 a la carte items in the Senior High School," Mrs. Bovee explained. 'This includes the Head Start Program and once every month we serve the Senior Citizens in the Alto Elementary School."

"There are three base kitchens and five serving areas. We transport food from the Middle School to the Bushnell and Runciman Schools. There are 22 full and part time cooks in all of the schools who are dedicated in providing the students with food of excellent quality.

We bake all of our rolls and casseroles "from scratch." We are very proud of the fact that we have not raised the price of our lunches in the past three years in spite of the constant rise in food prices.

"The low price-35c for ele-mentary school students, and 40c for middle and senior high school students-and the high quality of the lunches result in above-average participation which, in turn, keeps the cost of the program down."

Mrs. Bovee explained, "on Monday, September 27, we opened a snack bar in the study hall in the Senior High School. We are open for the first 15 minutes of every hour and 1/2 hour before school in the morn-

'We offer this to the students instead of the vending machines many schools have that some dispense what we call junk food . candy, pop, potato chips,

"We sell at our snack bar ice cream, fruit, drinks, fresh fruits, milk and cookies, made in our own kitchen.

'The money from this snack bar goes to our school food service fund, and not an outside vending company."

"We operate under federal guidelines and are evaluated at least once every year by the State Board of Education. We always pass this test with good reports. At this time proof must be presented that every Type A meal contains the correct amount of protein, fruit, vegetables, bread, and milk. 'The Type A meal pattern is

to meet 1/3 of the daily minimum requirements of school-age children. This is why, boys and girls, we have to see that this is on your tray every day and why we urge you to eat it. We know a hungry child cannot learn, or even be alert, in the classroom, and we consider our lunches a lesson in good nutrition."

No application for approval of a Class B hotel or a Class C license shall be considered by the city council until provision shall be made for seventy-five [75] square feet of new off-street parking area per person of occupancy. [Ord. No. 63, § 7, 5-15-72]

Sec. 31/2-18. Separation of dining area.

ine dining area provided with respect to any Class B hotel license or Class C license under this article shall be separated by some suitable partition, which shall extend from the floor to the ceiling, from any area where additional counter space for dispensing of alcoholic beverages is provided. Such partition shall be so constructed that the counter space is not visible to patrons seated in the dining area. [Ord.

### Sec. 31/2-19. Receipts from food.

No Class B hotel or Class C license shall be approved for any establishment which is not a bona fide restaurant. An establishment shall be deemed to be a bona fide restaurant if it meets the requirements set forth in sections 31/2-4 and 31/2-5 of this article and, in addition, at least fifty per cent [50%] of its gross receipts from the sale of food and beverages, including alcoholic beverages, are derived from the sale of food and beverages other than alcoholic beverages. Should any establishment at any time cease to meet the requirements of this section and should such failure continue for a period of six [6] months, the council may suspend or revoke its approval and the continued sale of liquor for consumption on the premises shall constitute a violation of this article.

All establishments shall maintain accurate records of receipts and disbursements in such a manner that receipts from food and beverages other than alcoholic beverages can be readily distinguished from receipts for alcoholic beverages. Such records shall be available for inspection by the city or its agent from time to time during normal business

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

### 1974 Farm **Census Totals**

The market value of all agri-cultural products sold by the 1,796 farms in Kent County in 1974 amounted to \$41,402,000, according to a preliminary re-port of the 1974 Census of Agriculture released by the U.S. Department of Commerce's Bureau of the Census. Production expenses on these farms totaled \$30,801,000 in 1974.

The figures are for farms qualifying under the definition first used for the 1959 Census of Agriculture: A farm includes all agricultural operations conducted at any time during the census year under the control of an individual management, provided that sales of agricultural products amounted to, or normally would amount to, at least \$250 for places of less than 10 acres or \$50 for places of 10

acres or more. Figures for farms with sales \$2,500 or more are shown for 1974 and 1969. These farms accounted for \$40,779,000 of all agricultural products sold in 1974 and \$24,216,000 in 1969.

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




