Ada Voters To Decide Two Proposals September 13

Ada Township voters will go to the polls Tuesday, September 13, to ballot on 1.25 mills for five years to pay for the proposed \$100,000 fire station on one acre on Knapp Street three-quarters of a mile west of Honey Creek Avenue NE.

They also will vote on enlarging the township board from five to seven members.

Ada Supervisor John H. Forshar has pointed out that the northern half of the township is

without a fire station and the township has grown to such an extent that half needs greater fire protection.

The proposed fire station would have two truck bays, an apparatus room, a hose tower, a meeting room to be used for gatherings and voting, restroom facilities, and a storage and utility room.

A blacktop offstreet parking area would have spaces for 12 vehicles.—Dave Barnes.

Ada Site For New Restaurant

Building of a \$350,000 restaurant in Ada's shopping mall, known as Thornapple Village, will start in about a week, says John F. Gilmore of Grand Rapids, owner of the Village and developer.

The restaurant, Thornapple River Inn, will be built on two levels, have about 6,000 square feet of space, a seating capacity of 125 and early American style to conform with the architecture of the homes in the village of Ada. Completion is scheduled for the middle of December.

Besides remodeling some space, now vacant, and the construction of an addition, Gilmore plans on an enlarged

blacktop offstreet parking area. The restaurant will have indirect lighting and a high peaked ceiling to look something like a cathedral ceiling as well as antique artifacts as part of the decor.

Customers will have a scenic view of the Thornapple River and there will be a banquet room on the lower level, continues Gilmore.

The restaurant will be open for lunch and dinner, and a liquor license already has been obtained, he adds.

Eugene J. Harmsen of Grand Rapids is the architect.—Dave Barnes.

New Dial Services In Lowell Exchange

Michigan Bell customers in the Lowell exchange will be able to dial their own long distance person-to-person and credit card calls beginning Saturday, September 3.

Robert I. Thole, manager for Michigan Bell, said the new system also will permit customers to dial collect calls and calls billed to a third number.

Pay phone users also will be able to dial these long distance calls because all Lowell phones are included in the change.

The new dial services are made possible by an electronic computer system and pushbutton consoles for operators which replace the familiar cord-type switchboards.

When making one of the new time-saving personalized calls, a customer merely dials "O" (Operator), immediately followed by the area code if needed, and then the telephone number in the distant city, Thole said.

Dialing "O" signals an operator at one of the consoles that a long distance call is being dialed, he explained.

After a customer completes dialing the number, the operator comes on the line long enough to get acceptance of a collect call, obtain the credit card number, bill-to-third number or to get the right person on the line for a person-to-person call.

Thole explained that the new service will speed the handling of calls because the calls proceed to their destinations while the operators are obtaining the

required details from the callers.

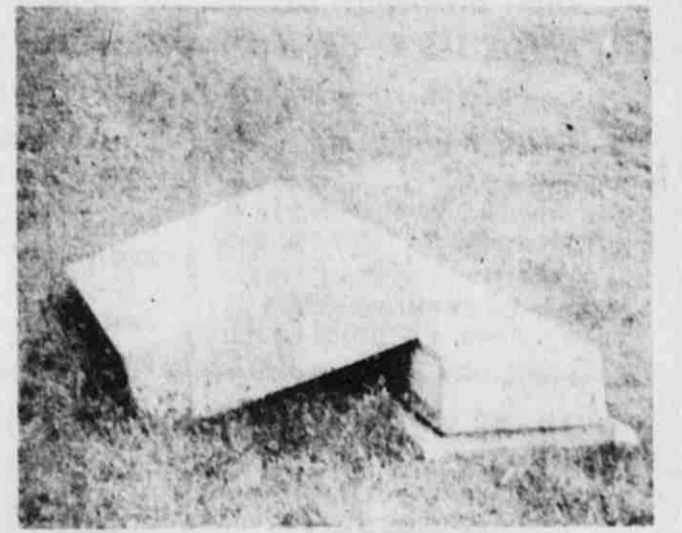
The new system provides for more accurate billing, he said, because most details of long distance calls are automatically recorded in the memory of the computer and later transferred to magnetic tape for billing.

Because operators don't have to spend time calculating time and charges, pay phone customers won't have to spend time waiting and will save an average of almost a minute and half on their long distance calls.

Thole added that use of the new system does not change the rate structure of operator-handled calls, nor change the usual way of dialing station-to-station long distance calls.

The "brains" of the new system are located in Michigan Bell's long distance switching center in Grand Rapids and will provide the same kinds of service to other communities.

Vandals Hit Cemetery



A reward is being offered by the Vergennes Township Cemetery Association for the recent damage done to the Bailey Cemetery on Parnell Road.

Bailey Cemetery at the corner of Parnell and Vergennes Road, in Vergennes Township, a repeated target of vandalism was plagued again on August 16.

This time, the vandal or vandals involved broke off gravestone heads and tipped them over, causing several hundreds of dollars worth of damage.

Officers from the Kent County Sheriff's Department investigating the incident, report that the cemetery will be kept under surveillance.

According to the pertinent section of the criminal code, any person who shall wilfully destroy, mutilate, deface, injure or remove any tomb, monument, gravestone, or other structure or thing placed or designed for a memorial of the dead, or any fence, railing, curb or other thing intended for the protection

or for the ornament of any tomb, etc., or injure any trees, shrub, grass, etc., shall be guilty of a felony punishable by imprisonment for not more than five years or by a fine or not more than \$2,500, or both if they cause damage in excess of \$100, or does any of the above acts directed against two or more separate burial rights.

The first such incident at the Bailey Cemetery, at Halloween time a year ago, also involved several hundred dollars worth of damage.

A reward for the apprehension of person and/or persons involved, or information leading to the arrest of the same, is being offered by the Vergennes Township Cemetery Association. Any information should be directed to the Kent County Sheriff's Department at 451-2911.

Experienced At Growing Celery

An Ada and Cascade Township celery farmer in the warm weather season and a California painter in winter—these describe Julius Roeters, 54, who has a 40-acre celery farm at 5042 Cascade Road, SE, and a painting business in Arcadia, California, where he and his wife, Jean have children.

Roeters originally lived in the Grant area where he became experienced at growing celery, onions and carrots. Eight years ago, he bought the celery farm south off Cascade Road. The front part of the farm is in Ada Township and the rear portion in Cascade Township.

He started harvesting this year's crop August 10 and will complete it in October if the weather remains favorable. Normally, he grows and harvests about 50,000 bushels of celery.

He plants celery in the spring in 5-acre tracts so that he can harvest this much at a time in the late summer and fall.

His farm is mechanized to do the most efficient job possible. Roeters built some of the machinery himself and in other such units he has modified in one way or another to work better than they otherwise would.

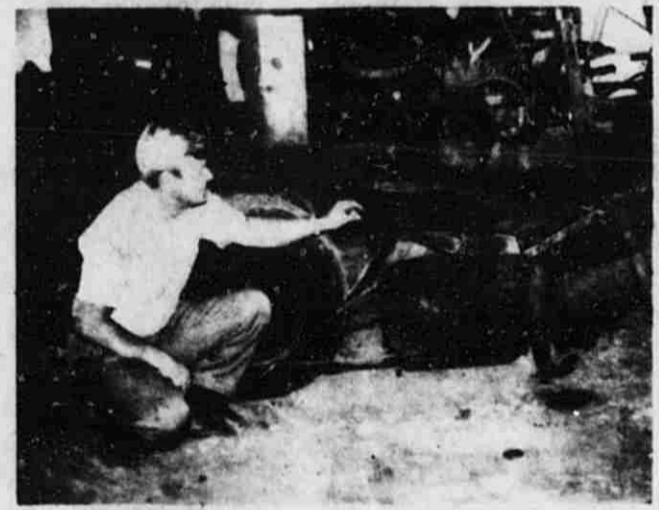
To make the machines and effect improvements, he has a well-equipped shop on the grounds.

After the harvest, one of his employees, plows, cultivates and then plants the tract with rye to prevent erosion. At the beginning of the warm weather season, the rye is plowed under, cultivation takes place again, fertilizer is spread and the seeds are planted.

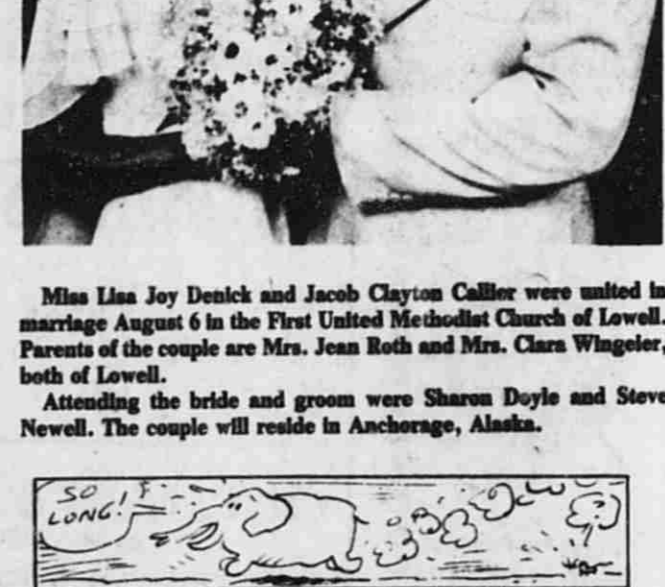

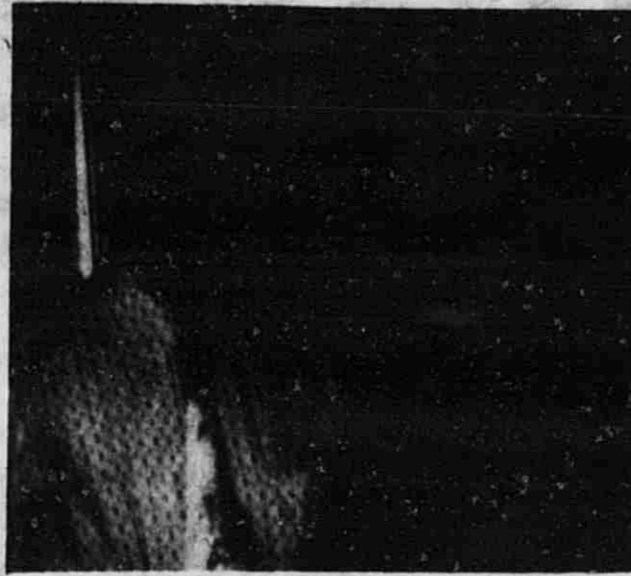

MUSIC TO OUR EARS

The calliope, a steam organ often associated with circuses thru the year, was originally planned for church use. Joshua Stoddard, when he patented his eight-note device on October 9, 1855, felt it was ideal for calling people to worship. Instead, riverboats and big tops picked up the instrument. Henry Ford Museum, Dearborn, Michigan, offers a later development of Stoddard's machine in its 53 note keyboard calliope mounted in a 1929 REO Truck.

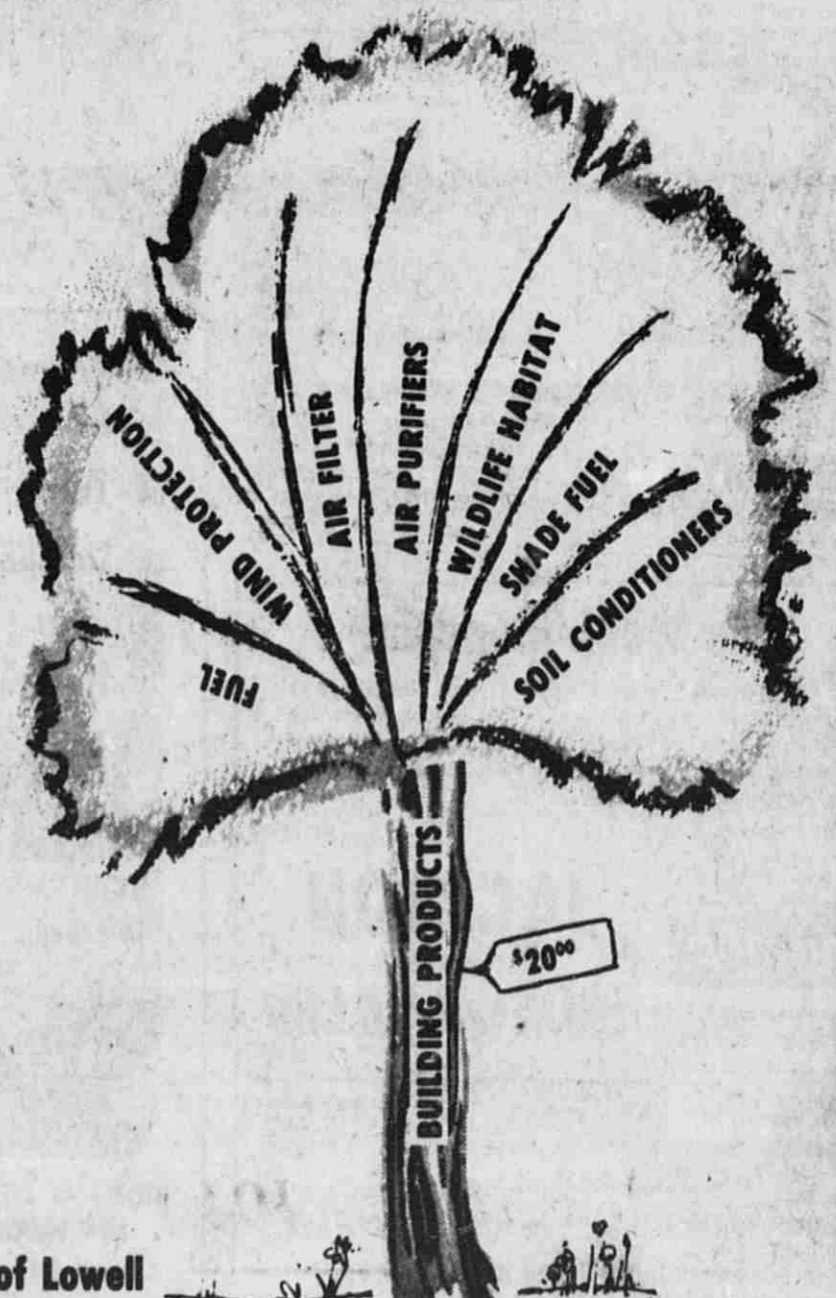
