The ballot will ask district voters to approve a Tax Rate Limitation Increase for operating purposes—17.5 mills for 1978; 17.7 mills for 1979; and 17.9 mills for 1981. 

Work Resumes On Ada Restaurant

Building of a \$350,000 restaurant in Ada's shopping mall, known as Thornapple Village, has been resumed full force having been delayed in the winter due to extremely bad weather, says John F. Gilmore of Grand Rapids, owner of the Village and developer.

The Horse Bowl is patterned after the "College Bowl" with toss-up, bonus and tie-breaker questions, each carrying a specific point value.

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
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
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
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



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
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
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
