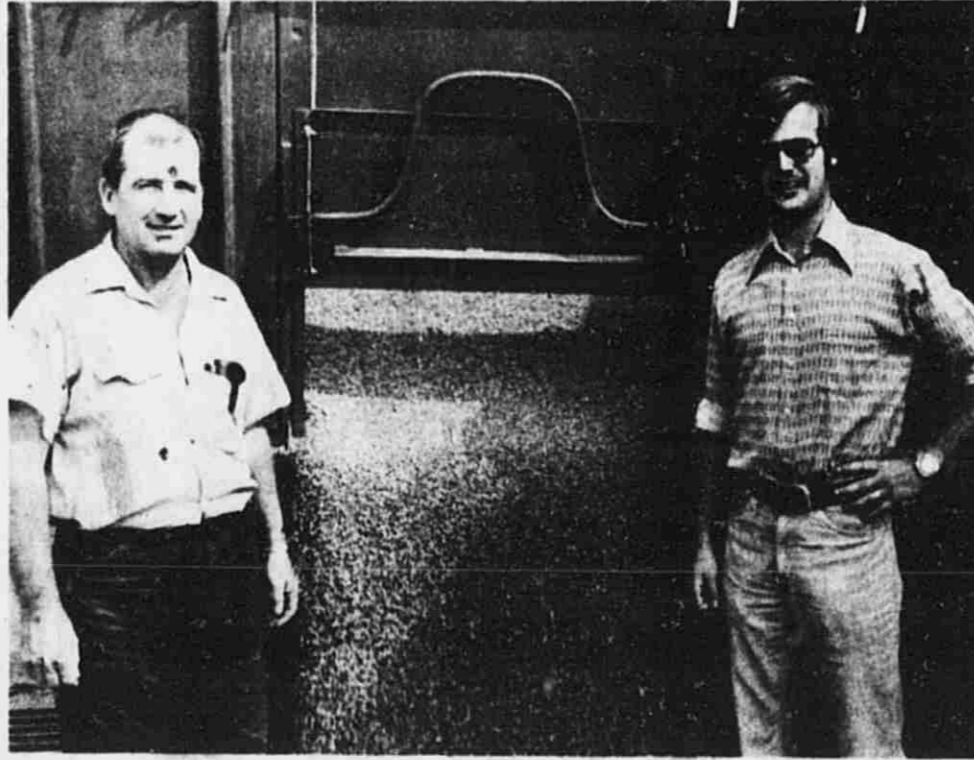

The 1978 Lowell Showboat was kicked off Monday night when the second annual Showboat Parade began at 7 p.m. and followed a route west on Main and north on Hudson Streets.

Units in the parade included clowns, fire trucks, horses, city officials, autos and a band.

The Showboat itself made its trip around Cattail Bend of Flat River to the Showboat Dock on Riverside at 7 p.m. and made the return trip to the Amphitheatre with no complications. Showboat Pilot Bob Vezino says that he sees no problem with the boat making the trip nightly this year because of higher water, more new barrels for better flotation and larger outboards for more power.

You will remember that last year the Showboat had to remain moored at the amphitheatre because of low water.

The 2,400 - 2,500 attendance for Monday's performance was termed as being comparable to previous years with the exception of last year when Pearl Bailey nearly packed the house for every show. Ticket office officials stated that sales are picking up now that Showboat Week is here, but stressed that there are still good seats left for every night.

Nelson Is Candidate

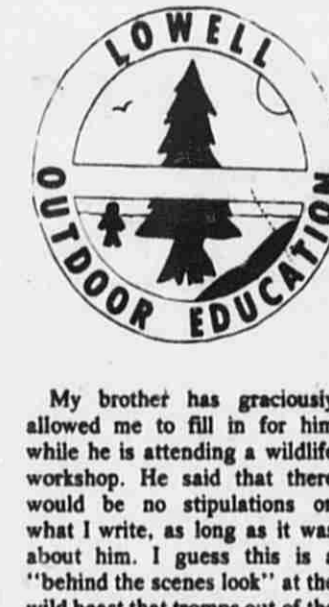

The resale price maintenance finding is based principally on a customer protection rule which Amway abolished early in 1972, on statements in some older Amway publications that distributors were required to observe certain price lists in reselling Amway products and on a few statements by Amway officials cautioning distributors that if they sold at less than the suggested prices, they should understand that the result would be reduced profitability for their businesses.

Whether the cease-and-desist order is now justified by these former practices is a technical legal question, and Amway will rely on legal counsel to determine the proper legal response.

In any event, Amway does not engage in, and has no intention of engaging in, the practices proscribed by the Initial Decision. Therefore, the proposed cease-and-desist order will in no way affect the business operations of Amway or its distributors.

Ada Park Officials Receive \$15,000 Tree

Ada Township Park officials last week received the latest donation to the park's growing arboretum — a \$15,000 "tree."

The ornamental tree, presented to Ada Township Supervisor Jack Forshar in ceremonies at the park last Wednesday, was Amway Corporation's version of an arboretum addition. 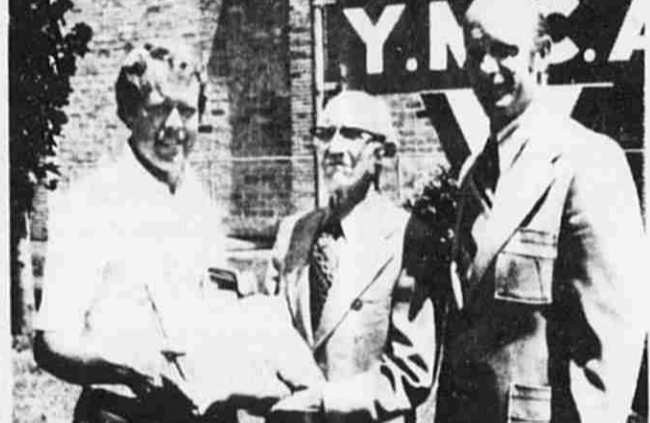

Time will be provided for your pet to do tricks if he can do this and if you'd like to bring him in a costume we'd like to see that, too.

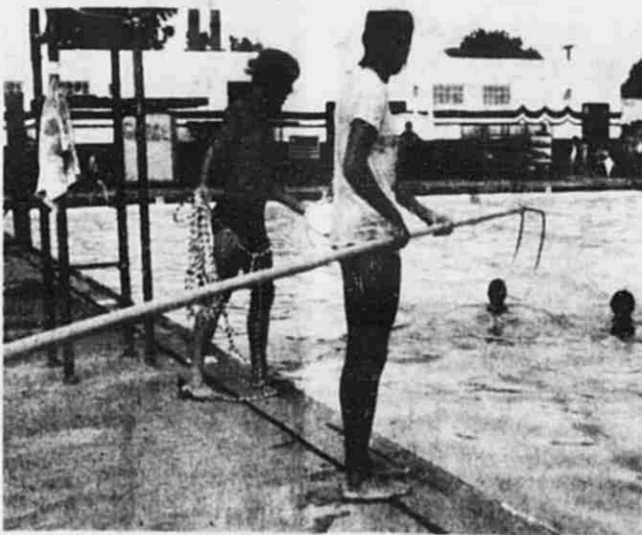

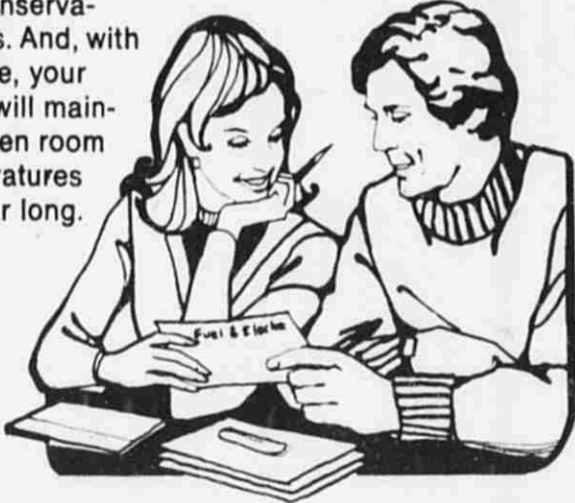

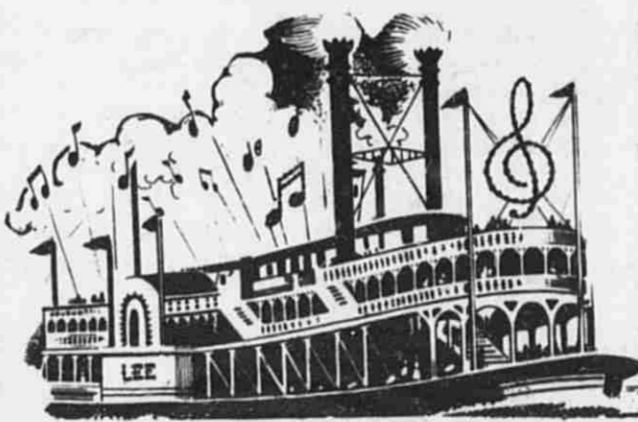
