## City Council Selects New Engineers

The Lowell City Council voted unanimously to enter into an agreement with consulting engineers, Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr & Huber, Inc. for work to be completed on step 2 of the Environmental Protection Agency's Waste Water Grant Program.

Step 2 will include the building of a waste water treatment facility and will be a very major project. With this in mind, the City Council felt that this would be an opportune time to interview new engineering firms and make a change if deemed necessary.

Williams and Works of Grand Rapids has been the City's engineering firm for about the last fifteen years. Fishbeck, Thompson, Carr and Huber were given the nod after the City Council interviewed five of the ten firms submitting applications to become the City's engineers.

The Council authorized City Manager Ray Quada to enter into negotiations with Country Roads, Inc. of 602 Ottawa St., Lowell regarding the City possibly buying their building for use as a D.F.W. garage. Country Roads is a fast-growing firm specializing in refurbishing theatre seats and is out-growing their building. The deal between Country Roads and the City could result in a trade of City property on Foreman St. and the Country Roads building at 602 Ottawa.

Councilman Richard Heath said that he thought this could be a "good deal", and an opportunity for the City to get into a badly needed larger D.P.W. garage for a minimum expenditure.

A taxi cab license was granted to D&K Shuttling Company pending an investigation to determine whether the operation of the company out of a residence would be a zoning violation. The new taxi service will specialize in the transportation of the handicapped and elderly in a specially equipped van with a motorized wheelchair lift.

Margaretta Shaw, Lowell and Dock E. Adams of Grand Rapids collided when the Shaw car made a left turn from Vergennes onto Alden Nash and into the path of the oncoming Adams vehicle. Ms. Shaw and a passenger in the second vehicle, Roosevelt Adams of Grand Rapids, were both taken to Blodgett Hospital with minor injuries.

Arrested on a charge of driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor on Sunday, Oct. 29, was Gerald C. Dalstra, Lowell. His car went out of control as he rounded a curve near St. Mary's Cemetery on Lincoln Lake Rd. while traveling at a high rate of speed. Dalstra was taken to Blodgett Hospital for injuries suffered in the roll over. Also arrested at the scene was Troy O'Neil, Lowell, for hindering and opposing a police officer.

## Smoking Blamed In Fire Fatality

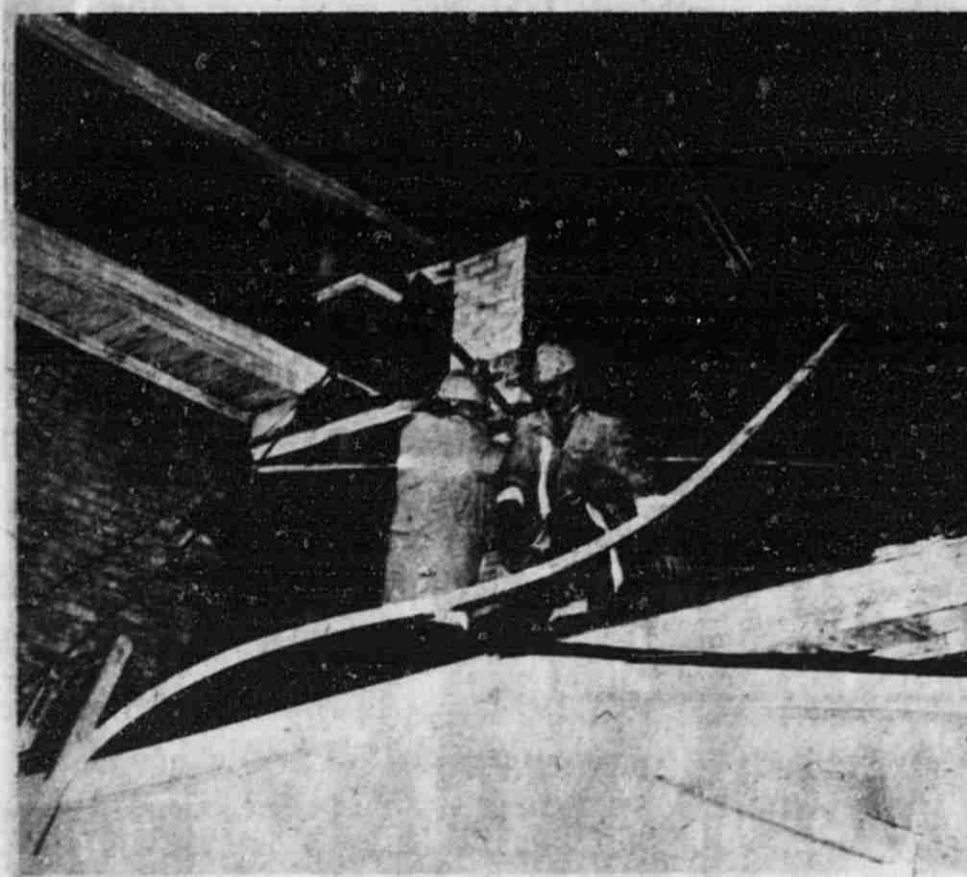
Smoke inhalation is the apparent cause of the death of a 45-year-old North Carolina man found when the apartment he was staying in caught fire.

James Bobby Burnette, last known address in Sanford, N.C., apparently fell asleep with a lit cigarette. Tom Kehoe reported the fire to the Lowell Fire Department after smelling smoke from his apartment at 216 S. Hudson at 6 a.m. Friday, Nov. 3.

Kehoe and Lowell police searched the other apartments for victims but found no one inside. Firemen responded and after the fire was brought under control, Fireman Dale Finckler entered the rear door of the north apartment finding Burnette where he evidently collapsed while trying to escape.

Burnette was last seen by a friend from Grand Rapids about 8:30 p.m. the previous evening when he was brought to the 5. Hudson Street address and dropped off. Detective Sgt. Nelson Haydamacher of the State Fire Marshall's office assisted the Lowell police department during the day Friday to determine the exact cause of the fire. Final results are pending lab work at the State Crime Laboratory in Holland.

The victim's body was taken to Blodgett Hospital where an autopsy was performed. Lab work results are pending, but preliminary reports show no foul play and Burnette probably died from smoke inhalation. Lowell police traced Burnette to his last known address but could find no relatives in the area.

A 26-year-old man has been accused of illegally helping a Lowell woman receive \$595 worth of food stamps from the Kent County Department of Social Services.

William Shockey, Jr., 3026 Clyde Park Ave., S.W. demanded 63rd District Court examination Wednesday on a charge of violation of welfare laws over \$500. Magistrate Gerald Shouse released him on a personal recognizance bond.

The woman, Brenda Fuller, also known as Brenda Read, 24, was charged Tuesday with the same offense after she allegedly failed to tell DSS officials she was living with Shockey. She reportedly listed Shockey as her landlord so she could obtain the welfare benefits.

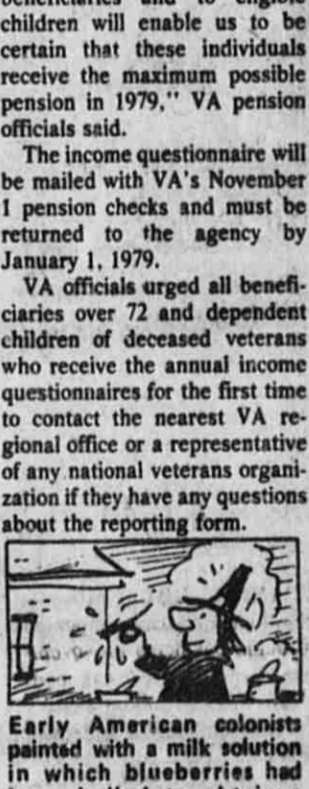
