Smoking Blamed In Fire Fatality

Smoke inhalation is the apparent cause of the death of a 45-year-old North Carolina man found when the apartment he was staying in caught fire.


James Bobby Burnette, last known address in Sanford, N.C., apparently feil asleep with a lighted cigarette. Tom Kehoe reported the fire to the Lowell Fire Department after smelling smoke from his apartment at 216 S. Hudson at 6 a.m. Friday. 216 S. Hudson at 6 a.m. Friday,

Kehoe and Lowell police searched the other apartments for victims but found no one inside. Firemen responded and after the fire was brought under control, Fireman Dale Finckler entered the rear door of the north apartment finding Burnette where he evidently collaps-ed while trying to escape.

Burnette was last seen by a friend from Grand Rapids about 8:30 p.m. the previous evening when he was brought to the S. Hudson Street address and dropped off. Detective Sgt. Nelson Haydamacher of the State Fire Marshall's office assisted the Lowell police department during the day Friday to determine the exact cause of the fire. Final results are pending lab work at the State Crime Laboratory in Holland.

The victim's body was taken to Blodgett Hospital where an autopsy was performed. Lab work results are pending, but preliminary reports show no foul play and Burnette probably died from smoke inhalation.
