Man Escapes Serious Injury



This late-model Corvette was severely damaged when the driver lost control and the car careened off the road into heavy brush and small trees.

Terry M. Estes, 40, of 5337 Segwun is a lucky man. He walked away from an accident Monday afternoon at 2:30 p.m. at Segwun and 36th Street which totaled his Corvette with only cuts, abrasions and a possible broken hand.

Estes was southbound on Segwun when his car went out of control, traveled 192 feet sideways and hit three trees on the east side of the road. Lowell police, rescue and fire departments responded to the reported pin-in but Kent County Sheriff's deputies had already assisted Estes from the vehicle. Bud's Ambulance transported Estes to Butterworth where he was treated and released.

Oppose Ada Corridor

Ada and Cascade are both experiencing growing pains. Besides the conflict over a proposed municipal water system and Grand Rapids city water, residents are choosing sides over plans to construct a north-south corridor through the two townships.

Last week a group of 30 residents, calling themselves Ada-Cascade Concerned Citizens (A-CCC), circulated petitions against the plan but township officials wonder how much weight they will carry. There is no state mandate regarding a specific number of signatures in opposition to a road project.

Ken Anderson, Ada Township Clerk, says, "We as a township don't have much say about building roads. We don't have any funds to put them in. That's the (Kent County) Road Commission's territory. Even if we put it on the ballot for Ada and Cascade residents, what would it mean if we don't have the authority to put in the road?"

A recently completed study by the Grand Rapids & Environs Transportation Study of the West Michigan Regional Planning Commission recommends widening of Thornapple River Drive to improve traffic flow but Ada-Cascade officials would rather see a roadway created from E. Fulton and Kulross Ave. to 28th Street and Kraft.

The A-CCC opposes either of those plans. Jane Murphy, spokesman for the citizens group contends that the north-south corridor "comes too close to the residential area". The group suggests an alternate plan would be to create an interchange at East Fulton for traffic going south and repave Spaulding Avenue since it is a direct route to the airport.

Michigan ARTRAIN's second visit to Lowell opened Tuesday with a flourish from the Saranac Band, a few words from the dignitaries and the ribbon cutting by Mrs. Dean Collins, wife of the mayor.

City Manager Ray Quada, general chairman for the Lowell ARTRAIN, introduced Mayor Dean Collins, Lowell Area Arts Council president Chris Van Antwerp and Michigan ARTRAIN director Jon Hohmann. ARTRAIN is being sponsored jointly by the City of Lowell and the LAAC.

After the official opening ceremonies, ARTRAIN will be open through Sunday from noon to 8 p.m. each day. Each car of the traveling art gallery and museum will be manned by volunteers who have been trained to answer visitor questions. Over 80 area men and women will give their time to the guide program this week.

ARTRAIN is located one-half block south of City Hall at the Monroe Street railroad siding and is always free to the public.

In addition to the guides, there is a full staff of resident artists on board ARTRAIN. They will be joined in the last car of ARTRAIN by local artists demonstrating their special areas of art and crafts.

A special art exhibit will be set up in City Hall featuring the work of Jim Lewi and Cliff Brody, community artists. The focus will be on photography and Sumi art. This is also free.

ARTRAIN was created by E. Ray Scott, director of Michigan Council for the Arts, in 1967 as part of a plan to make the arts more accessible to all citizens of Michigan, especially those who have no gallery or museum in their locale.

Saranac Doin's...

Budget Key Twsp. Topic First Aid Course Offered

All Ionia county townships held their annual meetings last Saturday to consider budget and services.

In Boston Township, officials and residents, concerned over the increase in the price of gravel and brine for roads, lowered the number of applications of brine to two for the summer of 1979 rather than the normal three. Brine is sprayed on the roads to control dust and in the past has cost \$600 for two or three applications. It now costs about \$1,000 per application.

Officials expressed dissatisfaction with the Ionia County Road Commission's work. According to Leon Walter, township supervisor, "They put brine on when they want, which is usually after it rains."

Two road construction projects which gained approval last year are still waiting on the drawing board due to legal snafus. For this reason, the township transferred the earmarked \$22,000 from last year's highway fund to the proposed new highway budget. That figure may not be enough to cover the project by the time it does get underway, officials noted, recognizing the inflation rate.

Wages for cemetery workers were upped by 25 cents per hour and a \$20 increase every two weeks for the sexton was approved.

Final approval of the 1979-80 budget will come at the next township meeting on April 10 at the Saranac Community Building at 7:30 p.m.

In Keene Township, the 1979-80 budget was considered by officials. With an increase over last year's budget of \$1,157, the proposed year's financing stands at \$42,725.

The major item in the budget is road maintenance and improvement. Dale Sprague, township supervisor, said that the budget reflects \$27,000 for road work, "but that was based on 2,500 yards of gravel. Since we decided to spread 3,000 yards, the amount will be somewhat more."

Officials approved a double application of brine during the summer of 1979 and plan to spend Federal Revenue Shaping Funds for part of the road costs.

Other topics discussed included fire protection with contracts renewed with the Saranac and Redding fire departments.

Salaries for township officers were increased by \$300 a year for clerk, treasurer and supervisor. Salaries will now be \$1,500 for clerk and treasurer, \$1,800 for supervisor and trustees will receive \$160 per year.

Repairing of joints, new blacktopping and the construction of bituminous shoulders will take place from Saranac to Turkey Trail, a distance of 3.6 miles, west of Ionia, at a cost of \$200,000, and from 2.7 miles east of M-66 to Pevamo Road, a distance of 7.7 miles, will similarly be improved east of Ionia, at a cost of \$500,000.

Bids on the projects will be opened in about a year, and it will take approximately two months for the jobs to be completed once work has started, says Jones—Dave Baross.
