Dr. Herrick's Glass On Exhibit

Beginning May 6 and running through September 16, the Grand Rapids Public Museum will have on exhibit in the West Building many of the outstanding pieces from the Greentown Glass collection of Dr. Ruth Herrick. Dr. Herrick was a medical doctor in private practice in Lowell, Michigan. In the early 1950's while on a weekend trip, she discovered the ruins of a small glass factory in Greentown, Indiana that was destroyed by fire in 1903. From that

moment on this uniquely styled glassware became almost an obsession with her. Most of Dr. Herrick's spare time was spent sifting through the factory ruins or traveling throughout the country in search of pieces of the Indiana-made glassware. Through her large collection of shards and the research she did in the area, Dr. Herrick was able to piece together enough information to publish a book in 1959. It was largely through her efforts that

Lowell City Council

Split Over Senior Housing Site

About twenty senior citizens showed up in support of a resolution on the agenda of the Lowell City Council's regular meeting on Monday, May 7. The resolution dealt with the rezoning of a parcel of land between Thomet Chevrolet and Showboat Automotive and behind the Big Four (old Vista Inn). The request asks for rezoning of the south 250 feet of the parcel which fronts on Bowes Rd. from its present agricultural status to multi-family.

The request comes from Fesewa Brothers, Inc. of Dewitt, Michigan, a construction firm that intends to build a federally subsidized senior citizen housing project on the site. The Lowell Planning Commission had already held a public hearing on the rezoning issue and sent it on to the council with its recommendation for approval.

Councilman David Carter expressed his strong disapproval of the site for senior citizen housing because of the safety factor involved with the project's occupants having to cross the heavily-traveled M-21 to do their shopping and banking. The senior citizens in the audience countered with the fact that they are capable of crossing a street and that if they could, they belonged in a nursing home anyway.

Councilman Art Warning also went along with Carter's thinking and disapproved of the site for varied reasons including the M-21 crossing problem.

Councilman Richard Heath pointed out that the site had been approved by the public, by a special senior citizen housing committee, and by the planning commission and he felt that if the council disapproved it, they would be "shirking their responsibility".

After considerable discussion, Councilman Robert Christiansen made a motion that the resolution be approved and Heath supported it. Carter requested a roll-call vote and both he and Warning voted no. It took Mayor Dean Collin's vote to break the tie and the motion carried by a 3-2 margin.

Carter immediately made a motion calling for the pursuit of a controlled crosswalk on M-21 at the site and Warning supported it. Christiansen and Heath said such action would be premature in view of the fact that the builder didn't even have his funding approved yet. Collins said that Carter's motion was clearly in minority and would not call for a vote stating that it was out of order.

In other council business, a public hearing was held regarding the 1979-80 budget for the City of Lowell. For the third year in a row, not a single comment came from the audience regarding the budget.

Lowell City Manager Ray Quada stated in his report, that the DPW had trouble over the weekend keeping the barricades up that close the Upper Bridge. Apparently vandals were hard at work both Friday and Saturday nights removing the signs and barricades, including the heavy telephone poles that block all traffic from crossing the bridge. Quada said that the city's engineering firm would be here to inspect the bridge sometime this week and told the council that they should be prepared to consider at least resurfacing the old bridge.

Quada pointed out that the recent Michigan Artrain visit

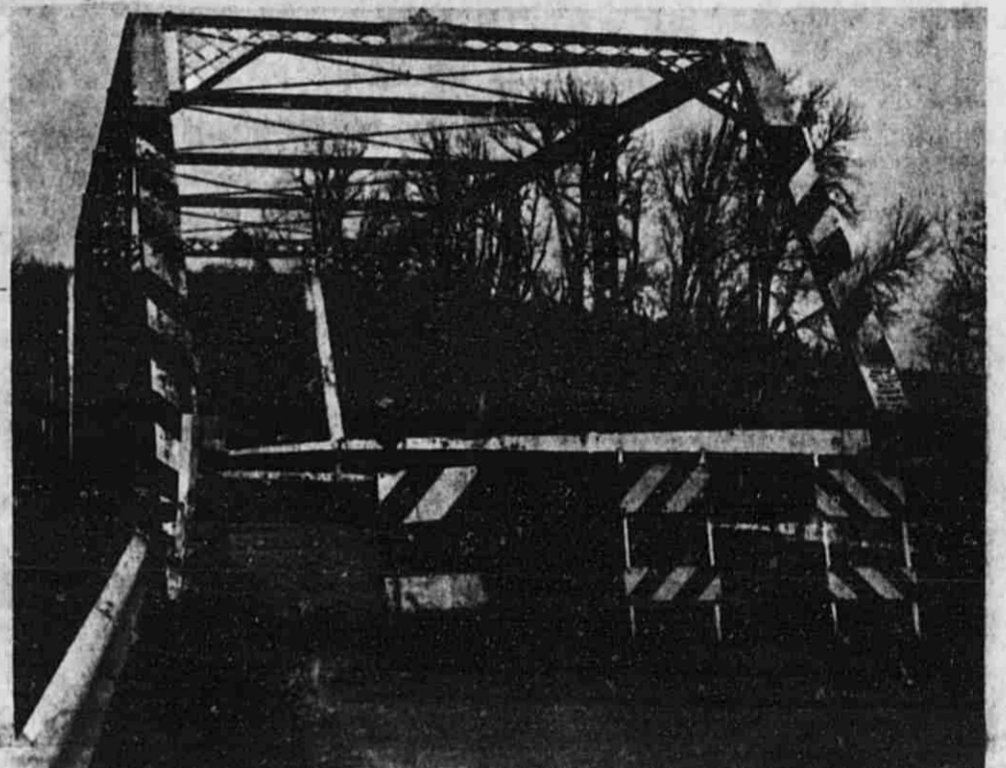
was again a big success with nearly 3,000 people touring it. He thanked the Lowell Area Arts Council and all others involved who helped make it the success that it was.

From the audience, John Troy suggested that the council form a committee to review the city's traffic problems. Carter made that a motion designating Troy, the city manager and three

citizens to serve on the committee. The motion carried unanimously.

The council adjourned to a work session on the 1979-80 budget.

Bridge Closed Until Inspected



The Upper Bridge on South Division Street has been closed to traffic indefinitely while the city's consulting engineers, Flabbeck, Thompson and Carr, inspect it and make recommendations for repair. The city will seek federal assistance to fund the repair work. Citizens are urged to use alternate routes until the safety of the bridge for traffic is fully assessed.

Lowell Teen Killed, One Injured

An early morning accident killed one Lowell teenager and critically injured another. The auto accident occurred Sunday about 4 a.m. near the small community of Alaska when a car driven by Rick Nelson, 16, of Lowell, left the roadway and flipped end for end.

Nelson was thrown from the car and laid alongside the road for more than three hours before being discovered by area resi-

dents. His passenger, Colin Deible, 17, of Lowell, was killed almost immediately, according to Kent Medical Examiner Dr. Ramon Lang. Lang established the time of death, pronounced Deible dead at the scene and said the youth died of a broken neck suffered, probably, when he was thrown from the vehicle.

Area residents finally discovered the accident and called

Kent County Sheriff's deputies at 7:25 a.m. Nelson is listed in critical condition at Blodgett Memorial Medical Center with possible internal injuries and numerous fractures.

Deible was a sophomore at Lowell High School and held a part time job at Powell's Shell Car Wash. His parents are Joyce and Bruce Starkweather, and Fred Deible. His funeral was held Tuesday.

Busy With Local Offenders

Donald Hayward of Kentwood was arrested by Lowell officers on April 26 for embezzlement over \$100 from the Lowell Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) organization, a felony offense.

An audit is underway to determine the exact amount Hayward allegedly embezzled. He was arraigned before Judge Joseph White in 63rd District Court last week. Hayward demanded examination and was released on \$3,000 personal recognizance bond. His preliminary hearing is set for May 11.

Craig Schneider of Lowell, arrested April 13 for opposing and resisting an officer, plead no contest to a reduced charge of assault and battery before Judge White in 63rd District Court last week.

Tilden Pinckney of Lowell was also arrested on April 13 by Lowell police officers on a charge of felonious assault.

Pinckney waived examination on the charge before Judge White last week and his case will now be heard in Circuit Court. Date for that trial is pending. He was released on \$1,000 bond to await trial.

David Whitmore of Lowell was arrested and charged with

leaving the scene of a personal injury accident, a high court misdemeanor. He demanded examination at his arraignment before Judge White in 63rd District Court. Whitmore was bound over to Circuit Court and released on \$300 personal recognizance.

CF Bike-A-Thon Date Set

The Cystic Fibrosis Foundation will be sponsoring a "Cyclin' for CF" Bike-a-thon on May 19th from 19 a.m.-12 p.m. The announcement was made by Mike Connell, Lowell's volunteer Chairperson for the 1979 CF Bike-a-thon.

The course will begin with registration at Lowell's Middle School parking lot. A participant may complete the course as many times as he wishes. The event is open to all persons who obtain prior sponsorship for at least 10¢/mile. A person may get as many sponsors as he can. All proceeds will go to benefit children stricken with Cystic Fibrosis and related lung-damaging diseases. Official CF "I DID IT" T-shirts will be awarded to all who bring in \$25 or more.

Cystic Fibrosis is a terminal, genetic disease which affects the lungs and digestive system of children. One in 20 persons (over 400,000 Michiganders) are carriers of the recessive CF gene. Research sponsored by the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation has increased the life expect-

tancy of CF children by more than 16 years in the past 17 years of activity.

what we now call "Greentown Glass" became well known and collectible. When she died in 1974, the major part of her extensive collection as well as the rights to her book were left to the Grand Rapids Public Museum.

The Indiana Tumbler and Goblet Company produced molded glassware for the mass market in its Greentown factory from 1894 until the fire in 1903. The glassware became famous for its distinctive colors, designs and shapes. Colors such as chocolate, Nile green, golden agate and transparent blue and amber were among those widely used. In addition to the many unusual designs, the factory produced numerous packer's receptacles in interesting

shapes, including the famous dolphin.

Examples of these and numerous other pieces of this unique and widely collected glassware will be on exhibit during regular Museum hours. The Grand Rapids Public Museum is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday; 2 to 5 p.m. Saturday, Sunday and holidays.

Manager Quada stated that at the time that Grindlie Drive was changed, this piece of property was split almost in half and was never disposed of. It probably should have been vacated before, but has just been overlooked.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Carter that the vacation of the Grindlie Street parcel be approved, supported by Councilman Heath.

Request of D&K Shuttle Service To Increase Rates And Add One Vehicle

Council next discussed the request of D&K Taxi Service to raise service rates and the addition of one vehicle as a Taxi. Manager Quada stated that he had investigated the rate change and found it to be comparable to other communities, and recommended approval.

The following resolution was offered by Councilman Carter for adoption, supported by Councilman Warning.

Presentation of 1979-80 Proposed Budget

Manager Quada then presented the proposed Budget for fiscal 1979-1980, and briefly outlined some of the goals for the coming year. He commended the present and immediate past Council for their support of the Rehabilitation Grant program and the park land acquisition, the rejuvenation of City Hall and the completion of the Water Treatment Plant. He suggested a work-study session to go over the budget details.

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Carter that a Public Hearing on the proposed fiscal Budget for 1979-80 be set for the Regular Meeting date of Monday, May 7, 1979, supported by Councilman Warning.

Council concurred to set Monday, April 30 at 7:30 p.m. as a work-study session.

Manager's Report

Under the Manager's Report, Manager Quada stated that he will clarify the filling date for City Council candidacy.

He also commended George Watson for the quality of five years work for the City. George is leaving for other employment. He was well liked by all and will stay on the Parks Committee.

Manager Quada stated that he had received a request from the Headstart Mothers program to hold a Flea Market on May 12, at Richards Park, the funds to be used for the children's Headstart program. He recommended approval. Council concurred.

Manager Quada then announced that the City landfill would open on Saturday, April 22, and that it would be open only on Saturdays until further notice. He also suggested a rate change as follows:

IT WAS MOVED by Councilman Heath that the Bridge be restricted to passenger vehicles only, supported by Councilman Christiansen.

Under Citizen suggestions, Mr. Kenneth Haveman asked about the abutment that was hit by a driver in the last year, and never replaced, also being dangerous and in the same condition as the Bridge. Manager Quada stated that that would be considered at the same time as repair to the Bridge.

Mrs. Kathy Sheffer complimented the City on the remodeling and carpeting at City Hall, stating however, that handicapped people still do not have access to the building. Manager Quada stated that he is in complete sympathy for

those persons who cannot use the City offices, noting that he had looked into the possibility of installing a ramp, but that the grade that would be needed would be so long that it would be virtually impossible to install.

Council Remarks

Under Council Remarks, Councilman Heath asked Manager Quada that if by a recommendation of an engineer to close the Bridge, it could be done immediately, without the vote of Council.

Manager Quada replied that he would close the Bridge immediately if recommended by the engineer, to prevent any mishap.

Councilman Warning stated that the baseball field at Recreation Park looks good, and some trash barrels are needed.

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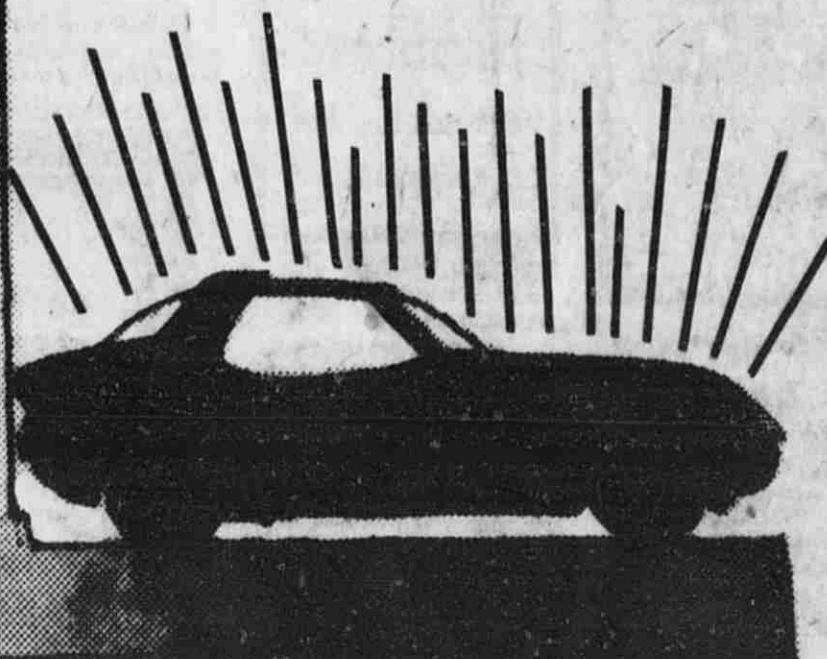


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
