Dr. Herrick's Glass On Exhibit

Beginning May 6 and running through Sepgember 16, the Grand Rapids Public Museum will have on exhibit in the West Building many of the outstanding pieces from the Greentown Glass collection of Dr. Ruth Herrick. Dr. Herrick was a medical doctor in private practice in Lowell. Michigan. In the early 1950's while on a weekend trip, she discovered the ruins of a small glass factory in Greenown, Indiana that was destroyed by fire in 1903. From that

moment on this uniquely styled glassware became almost an obsession with her.

Most of Dr. Herrick's spare time was spent sifting through the factory ruins or traveling throughout the country in search of pieces of the Indianamade glassware. Through her large collection of shards and the research she did in the area, Dr. Herrick was able to piece together enough information to publish a book in 1959. It was largely through her-efforts that

Goblet Company produced molded glassware for the mass market in its Greentown factory from 1894 until the fire in 1903. The glassware became famous for its distinctive colors, designs and shapes. Colors such as chocolate, nile green, golden agate and transparent blue and amber were among those widely used. In addition to the many unusual designs, the factory produced numerous packer's receptacles in interesting shapes, including the famous

Examples of these and numerous other pieces of this unique and widely collected glassware will be on exhibit during regular Museum hours. The Grand Rapids Public Museum is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday; 2 to 5 p.m. Saturday, Sunday and holidays.





In search of a new game, we learned how to play Cribbage. She had played as a child but had to re-learn and I had never played. Cribbage is a great two-handed card game and I must confess that

I've become quite addicted to it even though I'm not very good at This brings us to last Wednesday. We usually play a couple of hands of Euchre during the noon hour at the Ledger, but on this day only three of us stayed for lunch.

The conversation came around to Cribbage, so Maggie MacNaughton and I offered to teach Jay Vezino how to play. I played against Jay while Maggie coached him and he was picking the game up very fast.

About midway through the second game, Jay dealt me a hand that consisted of three fives and the jack of spades, after my discard to the crib. When I cut and Jay turned the five of spades, I knew that I had a lot of points but hadn't been around the game long enough to know that I held the coveted "29" hand.

After we had gone through the pegging process and I laid my hand down to count it, Maggie exclaimed, "Why, I think that's a perfect hand". We counted it together and sure enough, we came up with 29 points. Frank VanDusen is the closest thing to a Cribbage Expert' that we could think of, so we called him just to make sure that we had counted it right. Frank verified it and added that in a lifetime of playing cribbage, he had seen and held a lot of 28 hands, but had never witnessed a 29 hand. After doing some checking around, I'm finding out what a really

Presentation of 1979-80 Proposed Budget

Manager Quada then presented the proposed Budget for fiscal 1979-1980, and briefly outlined some of the goals for the coming year.
