Two Open Board Seats

Voters in the Lowell School District will elect two members to serve on the Board of Education in the June 11 Annual Election. Seeking two four-year terms on the board are Dr. James Dumas, Robert Elzinga, incumbent Roger Kropf and Mrs. Mary Yost.

The polls will open Monday on June 11 at 7 a.m. and will close at 8 p.m. All school electors who are registered with the city or township clerk within their area of residence are eligible to vote in this election.

Voting locations are: Precinct 1-Ruhciman Elementary School; Precinct 2-Bowne Township Hall (Alto); Precinct 3-Vergennes Township Hall (voters in Ada, Cannon, Grattan, Keene, Vergennes Twsps.) Absentee ballots will be available at the Lowell Board of Education office, 12675 Foreman SE (Middle School, west wing). If you qualify, ballots

Dr. James Dumas is making his first attempt at securing a seat on the Board of Education. He and his wife live with their five children at 6735 Alden Nash SE, Alto. Three of the children are currently attending the Lowell schools.


Born in Michigan City, Indiana, Dr. Dumas has resided in Alto for two years. He is a graduate of Grand Rapids Central High School and Junior College, and Illinois College of Podiatric Medicine. A member of the Michigan State Podiatric Association and several profesal organizations, he is

Dumas hopes to become more involved with the schools and the community. He points to his own children's education in the Lowell schools as compared with his own education and the education offered in other schools. He finds both strengths and

weaknesses. He feels that teachers in the system should have more freedom to teach subject matter in any way that will make real education take place for each

child. "I think we must trust the system and remove such stringent controls from the teachers. There should be a broader base to get students to learn and a better atmosphere for both teachers and students", says Dumas.

The important thing is that everything to do with the schools should be conducive to learning." he added.

Lowell police officers investigated 14 accident complaints in May, four of those involved injuries.



The Food and Drug Administration and the Energy Depart-ment advise that food should be efrigerated as soon as possible (but a boiling pot of soup does not have to be popped into the refrigerator immediately). Hot foods do make refrigerators work harder.

However, by the time a meal is served, anything left over has usually cooled to a point where it can be refrigerated without putting too much burden on the modern refrigerator.

FDA's advice is to put leftovers in the refrigerator as soon as you finish your meal and to refrigerate others foods before the temperature falls to 140 degrees F (at this temperature the container is hot, but not too . hot to touch).
