## Biggest, Best Opener Ever

Biggest and best seems to describe it all. Opening night of Lowell's Showboat Week, Monday, July 23, found Riverside Amphitheatre jammed. The Robert E. Lee made its grand debut to cheers from the crowd and the traditional "Here Comes The Showboat".

Leslie Uggams, star of the production, wowed the first-nighters with her songs, her beauty, her dance routines and her warmth. Fighting the pesky bugs, she joked with the crowd and carried on in the old "show must go on" fashion. Dinah Shore was besieged with the pests in 1968 when she headlined. Miss Uggams held the audience enthralled for nearly an hour.

Showboat Week festivities began with the third annual Showboat Parade organized by George and Dode Dey. The parade contained 25 units, more than any other year. The Showboat Band led off at 7 p.m. from the staging area near the First United Methodist Church on E. Main, continued down Main and up Riverside Dr. to the upper Showboat dock. Mayor and Mrs. Dean Collins were followed by Natures Emporium's flower bedecked entry. Members of the Lowell Area Arts Council, dressed in turn-of-the-century costumes, heralded the approach of the Fallsburg Fall Festival.

Bob and Gay Pfaller drove their tiny Izzetta and contrasted with Bob Steward's vintage car. Miss Macker, Sally Breckon, was accompanied by "officials" of the recent Gus Macker Tournament and their "security force." Other beauties from the area participating were Miss Belding and her court, Miss Ionia Free Fair and the Kent County 4-H queen.

Add the Showboat Calliope, Endmen, Board of Directors and Chorus, and the parade stretched for half a mile. The 4-H Pumpkin Seed Clowns were a hit as was the Arabian-garbed riding club.

The first night production began with the christening of the brand new Robert E. Lee by veteran Endman Forrest L. Buck and Showboat President Chuck Lippert. "Bucky" was stunned when Lippert then asked him to unveil the official Robert E. Lee sign on the stern-wheeler's pilot house to reveal the best kept secret in Lowell. Forrest L. Buck, a part of Showboat for 44 years, was named Honorary Captain of the grand riverboat for as long as it rides the Flat River.

Showboat officials spirited Buck's wife Gerri aboard at the last minute. Bucky took one look at her and asked, "Mommie, what are you doing here?" Asked to make a short speech, all Bucky could say was, "This is my 44th year on the Showboat and this has got to be the very best ever!"

Contacted for his reaction on Tuesday, Bucky replied that he felt very proud and humble. "There are so many from years gone by who would have loved to be there last night. Runcie (C.H. Runciman) would have been the proudest man in the world," he said. Bucky plans to

Gate receipts for Monday night were double last year's. According to Barb Curtis, chairman of Ticket Booth sales, there were at least as many seats sold for Monday as there were two years ago when Pearl Bailey starred. With bus tours up as well as advance ticket reservations, Showboat 1979 promises to be a banner year. According to Doyle, King Milling had room for a million and a half bushels at the beginning of the season and that space is fast dwindling. On Saturday and Sunday alone, the company took in 314 thousand bushels, a record for the company. Grain is transported to the Milling Co. from as far away as the Thumb area of Michigan.

### STOP, THIEF!

After months and months of fund raising, and countless hours of construction and detail work on the Showboat thieves stole aboard the new Robert E. Lee last week and ripped the specially painted signs from some of the doors. Besides the cost of replacement and press for time to get new signs made and installed before Showboat Week began, the theft leaves everyone connected with Showboat appalled, angry and heartsick. Security around the stern-wheeler has been stepped up.

### EXPA-A-A-NISON

Work is well underway in the expansion of three local industries. Country Roads, Inc., located at 602 Ottawa Street, Lowell, is adding on an additional 4,000 square feet to their existing plant and expanding their public seating renovation operation.

Michigan Wire Processing, 138 S. Water, Lowell, is coming along with their construction which will add 3,000 square feet to their operation and house their annealing process. In addition, a covered loading dock will be built and 35,000 square feet of outside storage for inventory has been fenced at the old Kellogg Vinegar plant on South Broadway. Michigan Wire has also added personnel and more semi trucks.

Attwood Corp., 1016 N. Monroe, looks for completion of construction of their new addition by the end of September. Approximately 90,000 square feet is being added half of which will be used for warehouse and half will house the assembly division.
